[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Meeting come to order.  
[2] I believe we have enough seats. I  
[3] appreciate everybody coming out, and looks like  
[4] we got some kind of controversy in the city for  
[5] all these people to be here.  
[6] But anyway --  
[7] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** We love you.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Wait a minute. I'm  
[9] going to ask Priscilla to call the roll.  
[10] **MS. MURPHY:** Councilwoman Hadden?  
[11] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Here.  
[12] **MS. MURPHY:** Councilman Lowe?  
[13] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Here.  
[14] **MS. MURPHY:** Councilwoman Pittman?  
[15] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Here.  
[16] **MS. MURPHY:** Mayor, Councilman Spangler  
[17] is absent.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Spangler is sick. He  
[19] called a while ago and said he was sick, so --  
[20] We're going to start out with we're  
[21] going to approve the -- I want to get a motion  
[22] to approve the minutes of the July 2nd, 2007,  
[23] Council meeting.  
[24] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Motion.

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
[2] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Second.  
[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** All in favor?  
[4] Opposed?  
[5] To approve the July 26, 2007, Council  
[6] meeting?  
[7] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Motion.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
[9] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Second.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** All in favor?  
[11] Opposed?  
[12] We need to set up a new bank account  
[13] for our tree bank moneys that we're beginning to  
[14] bring in now. And there's been a suggestion at  
[15] the work session that we use Intercontinental  
[16] Bank, which is the bank we use and do all our  
[17] checking and everything.  
[18] Do I get a motion to that effect?  
[19] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** So moved.  
[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
[21] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** All in favor?  
[23] Opposed?  
[24] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Mayor, how much money  
[25] do we have in there?

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We have 31,000 as we  
[2] speak.

[3] **MS. MURPHY:** To put it somewhere. We  
[4] haven't put it anywhere.

[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That's right. We will  
[6] be putting it in tomorrow at the  
[7] Intercontinental; is that correct?

[8] **MS. MURPHY:** Yes. You have to go and  
[9] set up the account.

[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes, sir. Yes, ma'am.  
[11] I will.

[12] Autumn Park, Ms. Hadden?

[13] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Okay. Well,  
[14] we're still waiting to hear from the KaBOOM  
[15] program whether we're going to receive that  
[16] wonderful playground or not.

[17] The representative came from  
[18] Washington, D.C., since we've had our last  
[19] Council meeting and specifically wanted to meet  
[20] with the Maintenance supervisor and the head of  
[21] our Parks & Recreation Department.

[22] And we went over to the site at Autumn  
[23] Park. We actually moved the site, so we're  
[24] hoping that that's indicative that we are going  
[25] to get this playground.

[1] near Raymond Drive and then the part down near  
[2] McClave. They would then submit plans to the  
[3] City of Doraville for review, comments and  
[4] approval, so we would all be able to see what  
[5] would be going on with our park.

[6] The erosion and sedimentation control  
[7] plan phase, they'd develop and design erosion  
[8] and sediment control plan and details for the  
[9] two segments of stream requiring the  
[10] stabilization, submit those to the City of  
[11] Doraville for comments and approval, and then  
[12] prepare the plans for submittal to the other  
[13] agency involved.

[14] Now, there were some things that they  
[15] would not cover and some of them are not  
[16] applicable.

[17] Irrigation or lighting plans, those are  
[18] not applicable so they are not included in this  
[19] plan.

[20] We do not require a stream-buffer  
[21] variance, according to Mr. Entsminger, because  
[22] of where the playground would be located in the  
[23] park.

[24] Mr. Buice with our Stormwater  
[25] department would handle the permitting for FEMA

[1] She asked several questions of  
[2] Mr. Pittman and of Carol Stephens, and seemed to  
[3] be satisfactory. So I guess we just have to  
[4] wait now and hope that we're going to get it.  
[5] Still, it seems to drag on and on.

[6] The other thing about Autumn Park is we  
[7] have received some responses to an RFP that we  
[8] put out to perform some mitigation on our  
[9] stream-bank erosion. And we have received some  
[10] estimates on that from Entrix, Moreland  
[11] Altobelli & Associates, Hayes James and  
[12] Precision Planning, Inc.

[13] Mr. Entsminger had looked at some of  
[14] these briefly and basically seemed to feel that  
[15] Precision Planning, Inc. would probably be the  
[16] better ones to go with. He had some information  
[17] regarding work that they have performed in the  
[18] past that seemed very positive.

[19] And what this would be for would be the  
[20] grading plan phase. They would coordinate and  
[21] do the final submittal approval, meeting with  
[22] Wetlands & Ecological Consultants and the City.  
[23] They'd develop and design the grading plan and  
[24] construction details for the two segments of  
[25] stream requiring stabilization. That's the part

[1] or the submittals to them.

[2] So they were quite specific on what  
[3] they could do for us and what they couldn't do,  
[4] and it was a total of \$19,140. They estimated  
[5] that any reimbursable expenses incurred would be  
[6] at \$300.

[7] So I would like to make a motion this  
[8] evening that Precision Planning be accepted as  
[9] the people to help us move Autumn Park forward  
[10] with their planning, their grading phase,  
[11] erosion and sediment control plan phase.

[12] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.

[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any more discussion?

[14] All in favor?

[15] Opposed?

[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Contracts, Ms. Hadden.

[17] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Okay. Due to  
[18] recent events that occurred in our city, it was  
[19] suggested that Chief John King be put under an  
[20] employment contract.

[21] I think that will make everybody feel a  
[22] lot better. I think we'll feel like our  
[23] community is stabilized.

[24] And I did a little research, and I've  
[25] handed out to Council members and the Mayor

[1] tonight a very, very rough draft of an  
[2] employment contract for such a position.  
[3] Now, this is not dyed in concrete, and  
[4] I'd like to ask Chief King and his attorney,  
[5] J. Tom Morgan, if they would please look into  
[6] this also with other entities and come back to  
[7] Council at our first meeting in October and  
[8] present us with some recommendations for putting  
[9] Chief King under contract with the City of  
[10] Doraville.  
[11] Thank you.  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** John, how do you feel  
[13] about that?  
[14] **CHIEF KING:** Sounds good, sir.  
[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you, John.  
[16] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Are you going to  
[17] hang with us, Chief?  
[18] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am.  
[19] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Thank you.  
[20] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** We're going to  
[21] hang with you.  
[22] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** The reason that  
[23] we're asking them to come back to us in October  
[24] with that is we will only have one October  
[25] meeting.

[1] **MS. MURPHY:** One September.  
[2] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** We voted in  
[3] June --  
[4] **MS. MURPHY:** One September meeting.  
[5] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I'm sorry. One  
[6] September meeting, two in October. So this will  
[7] be the only September meeting that we know of  
[8] right now.  
[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you, Ms. Hadden.  
[10] Ms. Pittman?  
[11] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** I've been asked  
[12] by a couple of people what happened to our trees  
[13] on Winters Chapel.  
[14] Due to the really, really hot weather  
[15] we've had, Dekalb County recommended that we  
[16] wait until October, possibly November --  
[17] November's even better -- to plant those trees.  
[18] So we still have 84 trees at the tree farm  
[19] awaiting us.  
[20] So sometime in the end of October or  
[21] beginning of November, we're going to have a  
[22] tree planting party. They're going to furnish  
[23] everything. We just need the hands. So I'm  
[24] going to need a lot of help when this comes  
[25] around.

[1] And we're also going to combine the  
[2] dedication for the Hugo Arango Bridge. We have  
[3] a really nice plaque that we want to put up. So  
[4] we'll also be doing that sometime at the end of  
[5] October or November.  
[6] **MS. BARKER:** Yes. Councilwoman  
[7] Pittman, is that different from the plaque  
[8] that's already down there now?  
[9] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Yes, ma'am. All  
[10] they have now is a sign, and the sign has fallen  
[11] a couple times.  
[12] So what we want to do is put  
[13] something -- this is a really nice bronze  
[14] plaque. In fact, it's in there, anyone that  
[15] wants to look at it. We're going to put it on  
[16] the bridge because it'll be there forever.  
[17] We had to jump through hoops with  
[18] Dekalb County to be able to do that, but it'll  
[19] be there fifty years from now. It's not going  
[20] away. The sign might fall, and somebody might  
[21] decide at some point they don't want to put it  
[22] back up, and we don't want him forgotten, so --  
[23] **MS. BARKER:** And I wondered if --  
[24] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** -- this is  
[25] really important.

[1] **MS. BARKER:** -- the Council could  
[2] consider maybe instead of doing a Police Day  
[3] this year like we've been doing, just kind of  
[4] combine that, maybe do hot dogs over at the  
[5] police station when we get through planting.  
[6] You know, maybe if they would consider that,  
[7] you know, instead of the whole big Police Day,  
[8] so they could bring the community together, the  
[9] Police Department.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That was Patty Barker.  
[11] Anybody else that speaks, give your name and  
[12] where you live, first.  
[13] **MS. BARKER:** Oh, I apologize. Yes.  
[14] I'm Patty Barker.  
[15] **MS. FRAYSSE:** Could I add one thing,  
[16] too, it might be a good (inaudible)?  
[17] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** I'm sorry?  
[18] **MS. FRAYSEE:** The book sale for the  
[19] Friends of the Library. We were hoping to do it  
[20] in conjunction with the police event, so maybe  
[21] all three of these things could be set at the  
[22] same time.  
[23] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Yes, that's  
[24] certainly something we could consider. That'll  
[25] be a fun thing.

[1] Okay? That's it.  
 [2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Jill, come on in,  
 [3] please.  
 [4] I want to introduce Jill Chambers --  
 [5] she's our representative -- and J. Tom Morgan.  
 [6] Okay. Rick Powell, I believe you said  
 [7] you had all yours cleared up?  
 [8] **ATTORNEY POWELL:** We're going to take  
 [9] that off for tonight, Mayor.  
 [10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.  
 [11] John, come on up and give us a report.  
 [12] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Yea, John.  
 [13] **CHIEF KING:** First of all, I thank you  
 [14] very much. I cannot tell you how grateful I am  
 [15] to you-all.  
 [16] Especially the last couple weeks have  
 [17] been very difficult, not only for me but I think  
 [18] for everybody in the city.  
 [19] And I appreciate how things have  
 [20] started working themselves out, and I appreciate  
 [21] everybody's cooperation in getting the city  
 [22] moving forward and continuing a relationship  
 [23] with everybody involved. By no means do I want  
 [24] to burn any bridges with anybody.  
 [25] A lot of things are going on currently

[1] couple hours one day a week, and come in with  
 [2] your brain engaged because we will get just as  
 [3] much from you as you will get from our  
 [4] employees. Our employees are really excited  
 [5] about putting that process through.  
 [6] There's a lot of -- currently there's  
 [7] -- we've been able to clear the two homicides  
 [8] that we've had in the city. They were clear  
 [9] within 24 to 48 hours with arrests. We cleared  
 [10] those. We are in the process of helping  
 [11] Chamblee. They're still -- they've still having  
 [12] a tough time with them.  
 [13] We believe that -- that they're  
 [14] Hispanic on Hispanic, and that's causing a lot  
 [15] of problems being able to work those with --  
 [16] because they're very reluctant to come and talk  
 [17] with law enforcement and cooperate with us.  
 [18] We are in the process of re-looking at  
 [19] how we can do a better job for the community. I  
 [20] know you, Ms. Pittman, had talked about, you  
 [21] know, moving some personnel.  
 [22] What we're trying to do, Mayor, is  
 [23] create a permanent-beat basis. Basically, you  
 [24] know, in the past, we've divided the police  
 [25] department with a north zone and a south zone,

[1] in the city, sir, Mayor and members of City  
 [2] Council.  
 [3] We're in the process of getting the  
 [4] second iteration of the Citizens Police Academy.  
 [5] We really need people to -- I know the last  
 [6] couple weeks have probably put a damper on  
 [7] people's chances or desire to participate in the  
 [8] Citizens Police Academy, but I really invite  
 [9] everybody.  
 [10] And if you have an interest in  
 [11] attending the Citizens Police Academy, please  
 [12] drop us a line, because I think the more -- the  
 [13] more varied the audience, the more you will get  
 [14] out of it, the more we will get out of it as a  
 [15] police department.  
 [16] The first iteration, I don't think  
 [17] there's no way you could put that group together  
 [18] if they came from every corner of the city. And  
 [19] that first academy class was truly special, and  
 [20] we're a better police department because of that  
 [21] class, and we expect -- we want to continue  
 [22] growing.  
 [23] So please invite anybody that expresses  
 [24] an interest in participating in the Citizens  
 [25] Police Academy, please. The commitment is a

[1] and what we're trying to do now is divide the  
 [2] city in quadrants where you will have the same  
 [3] police officer assigned to that same  
 [4] neighborhood, and basically you will have four  
 [5] officers because we work 12-hour shifts.  
 [6] So our plan is to work a beat system  
 [7] where when you dial -- you know, when you call  
 [8] the police department, you will get the same  
 [9] officer unless he's already on another call;  
 [10] then the backup officer.  
 [11] We think that we can manage that.  
 [12] We're talking to our computer software provider  
 [13] to get adjustments, so when the call comes in to  
 [14] 911 and the call comes up, say, on Chestnut, it  
 [15] will pop up as beat 103, and car 103 will be the  
 [16] one responding every time. So that's the  
 [17] process that we're doing.  
 [18] We -- I'm in the process of getting  
 [19] some bids, and I've talked a little bit to  
 [20] Priscilla about it. We're waiting for the  
 [21] actual details. We currently lease a lot of the  
 [22] 911 system, and that is very expensive. That's  
 [23] what's costing us a lot of money.  
 [24] If we can work out the numbers, my plan  
 [25] is to try to buy some of that equipment,

[1] reducing the costs for 911. And if we can work  
[2] out the numbers, it will not cost the taxpayers  
[3] any money. So our plan is to buy the software  
[4] and the hardware, avoiding the lease that we  
[5] currently have, and that way, the only moneys  
[6] that will be used will be paid for salaries and  
[7] maintenance costs.

[8] This is a very preliminary report. We  
[9] will have more details as we sit down with the  
[10] software and hardware providers. But we're  
[11] trying to bring down the costs. I know that the  
[12] 911 system is a concern for a lot of people, and  
[13] we're trying to address those.

[14] We're still talking with Dekalb County  
[15] with the City Attorney and trying to come up  
[16] with a resolution to try to get control over the  
[17] cell phone towers with Dekalb County. We're in  
[18] the process. I think we're waiting for them to  
[19] call us so we can make an appointment.

[20] **ATTORNEY POWELL:** (Nods head  
[21] affirmatively.)

[22] **CHIEF KING:** It does not appear to the  
[23] police department that Dekalb County Police  
[24] Department has a major problem with this, but  
[25] now it is an issue that we have to build a

[1] bridge with the fire department. The fire  
[2] department is very concerned.

[3] And what we're -- what we are trying to  
[4] negotiate with them is if they give us control  
[5] over the cell phone towers, we will -- we will  
[6] install a special line that will be not used for  
[7] anything else but communicating between our 911  
[8] center and Dekalb County's 911 center to reduce  
[9] the delay and the droppage of calls.

[10] So those are the things we're trying to  
[11] negotiate with Dekalb County to try to meet them  
[12] and deal with their concerns but also get  
[13] control of the towers.

[14] Dekalb County -- the city of Chamblee  
[15] has all the towers responding to their 911  
[16] center, and Decatur has the same thing as we're  
[17] having to work with them.

[18] But Mayor, pending any questions of you  
[19] or members of the City Council, sir, that is --  
[20] that concludes my report.

[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any questions?  
[22] Okay. Thank you, John.  
[23] Committee reports.  
[24] Stuart, have you got a report?  
[25] **MR. ANDERSON:** Thank you. Oh, I will.

[1] (Inaudible.)

[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Now, he's on the  
[3] agenda, though.

[4] **MR. ANDERSON:** Planning Commission  
[5] report, we have a zoning -- rezoning and two  
[6] variances coming up. And I'm sorry to say this,  
[7] but we have very little information about those  
[8] two things because the City is not providing us  
[9] with our forms that the Planning Commission  
[10] provided to the City to be used for that  
[11] purpose.

[12] We do the best we can in these  
[13] hearings, but we'll see how it goes. Okay.

[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Priscilla, do you  
[15] want --

[16] **MS. MURPHY:** After they're filled out.

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do you have the forms?

[18] **MS. MURPHY:** I have whatever they  
[19] filled out when they applied for the  
[20] application.

[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** What else do you need,  
[22] Mr. Stuart?

[23] **MR. ANDERSON:** They've provided sets of  
[24] forms to be filled out by applicants, and they  
[25] haven't been filled out or they haven't been

[1] provided to the applicants who are still using a  
[2] variation on the things that we've been working  
[3] on or we've been having for the last couple  
[4] years.

[5] We'll make it work. It's all right.

[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Will you come by and  
[7] explain it to me tomorrow and we'll --

[8] **MR. ANDERSON:** Certainly.

[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- we'll get it worked  
[10] out.

[11] **MR. ANDERSON:** Actually --

[12] **MR. AMBROSE:** It's the forms I brought  
[13] to you two weeks ago on Friday.

[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Any other  
[15] committee reports?

[16] Mr. Grant, would you come up to the  
[17] podium, please, sir?

[18] State your name, please, sir.

[19] **MR. GRANT:** My name is Gordo Grant,  
[20] with the Ethics Committee. And what I would  
[21] like to just discuss here is the Ethics  
[22] Committee was tasked to have forms, complaint  
[23] forms approved by the City Council that would be  
[24] used and put into place.  
[25] And currently, these forms were given

[1] to the Council on our last meeting. And just to  
[2] stay on task with our committee, I was wondering  
[3] if I could kind of persuade or push these  
[4] forward and get possibly a first reading or even  
[5] an approval of the form.

[6] **ATTORNEY POWELL:** It wouldn't take a  
[7] first reading. The Council could just approve  
[8] the forms that we -- you'd worked on and I had  
[9] reviewed. So if they just approve them, you can  
[10] adopt them now.

[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Do you want --

[12] **MR. GRANT:** I do have extra copies of  
[13] the forms here.

[14] These are also the request for the  
[15] advisory opinion. These are basically if a  
[16] person, a member of the city would like to see  
[17] if their topic is of an ethical opinion there,  
[18] we can -- we can discuss that prior to them  
[19] filing a complaint.

[20] And Rick, we've reviewed these forms  
[21] well enough?

[22] **ATTORNEY POWELL:** Yes, right.

[23] **MR. GRANT:** You feel comfortable there  
[24] shouldn't be too much of a problem there?

[25] **ATTORNEY POWELL:** From the legal

[1] **MR. GRANT:** Yes, we have ethics forms.  
[2] If you want to file an ethical complaint, come  
[3] right up here to City Hall and the forms will be  
[4] there for you.

[5] So that goes ahead and that takes out  
[6] item number two, current process with that form,  
[7] since we do have the current forms.

[8] My next question would be directed  
[9] towards Mr. Powell.

[10] There was a question that we might be  
[11] changing the ethics ordinance itself or at least  
[12] some verbiage of it?

[13] **ATTORNEY POWELL:** Yes. And we will  
[14] present that at the next meeting. I will have  
[15] gotten it to the Council ahead of time for their  
[16] review, and so we're on top. We're going  
[17] forward with that.

[18] **MR. GRANT:** Perfect, perfect.

[19] And I would also like to bring to the  
[20] Council's attention that Susan has decided to  
[21] pursue another venue, and she has done the  
[22] ethical thing by departing from the committee.  
[23] So the Council has two people to replace, one  
[24] from District 2 and --

[25] Susan, what was your district?

[1] standpoint, as far as I'm concerned, they're  
[2] fine.

[3] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Well, I'd like to  
[4] make a motion that we accept these forms as  
[5] submitted this evening for the Ethics Committee.  
[6] That's a Request for Advisory Opinion form and  
[7] an Ethics Complaint form of the City of  
[8] Doraville.

[9] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Second.

[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any more discussion?

[11] Do you have anything else other than  
[12] the forms to bring?

[13] **MR. GRANT:** Other than the forms?

[14] Well --

[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, let me finish the  
[16] motion. I just wanted -- I'm talking about any  
[17] more discussion on these.

[18] **MR. GRANT:** On the forms, no, sir.

[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. All in favor?  
[20] Opposed?

[21] **MR. GRANT:** Thank you very much.

[22] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Nice job.

[23] **MR. GRANT:** Thank you.

[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you. That's very  
[25] good. Thank you.

[1] **MS. FRAYSSE:** Three.

[2] **MR. GRANT:** From District 3?

[3] So a person from District 2 and a  
[4] person from District 3. And the way they should  
[5] be seated as stated in the ordinance is by a  
[6] suggestion from the Council and then a majority  
[7] vote from the Council.

[8] And if I could request that those be  
[9] put in place or request be made and we'll try to  
[10] get these people in place probably about the  
[11] next meeting if that would --

[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I think that would be  
[13] better. We don't have anybody from District 3  
[14] here.

[15] **MR. GRANT:** Okay.

[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** So we could on -- you  
[17] say District 2?

[18] **MR. GRANT:** One from District 2 and one  
[19] from District 3.

[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I won't be able to  
[21] nominate because I nominated the last one, so  
[22] it'll be up to the Council on this particular  
[23] one.

[24] **MR. GRANT:** Okay.

[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. And I'll get one

[2] Okay?  
[3] **MR. GRANT:** Thank you for your time.  
[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Mr. McLendon. Earl

[9] Earl McLendon. I have a dental practice on

[12] **MR. McLENDON:** I'm sorry. My name is  
[13] Dr. Earl McLendon. I have a dental practice on  
[14] Buford Highway.  
[15] The question I have for the Council was  
[16] about the occupation tax.  
[17] When I first opened my practice in  
[18] 1995, it was one page; it was simple. You gave  
[19] the estimate of your income, and you got a bill  
[20] later on, and you had to send another form in to  
[21] confirm your income for that year.  
[22] But now it's kind of grown into an  
[23] occupation tax. And this last one I was looking  
[24] at, I was saying, wait a minute. What exactly  
[25] is an occupation tax? What are we taxing? And

[1] then when I looked at it a little bit further, I  
[2] realized it's a tax on the income.  
[3] So I called up here and I asked the  
[4] young lady in the tax office exactly how you go  
[5] about taxing the income for a business license.  
[6] And then it kind of dawned on me,  
[7] because I've been reading fair-tax books. I  
[8] deal with insurance on a regular basis. And I'm  
[9] starting to understand what I see is a problem.  
[10] If you keep taxing business and individuals in  
[11] an indiscriminate, uncontrolled way and then you  
[12] try to back up that taxation with insurance to  
[13] help people, you're going to help them to death,  
[14] because income tax is a death sentence. You  
[15] cannot survive income tax.  
[16] The way I see it, income tax takes away  
[17] your discretionary income. Twenty percent of  
[18] your income is your discretionary income. In a  
[19] capitalistic society, your money is your power,  
[20] and if you're giving it up -- and I'll tell you,  
[21] I don't even know if what is taken out is  
[22] correct or not because I don't know what I'm  
[23] supposed to be paying.  
[24] And so the Constitution says you're not  
[25] supposed to have a direct tax on the people by

[1] the government. These guys knew what they were  
[2] talking about. You will destroy a man if you  
[3] work him and then take what he earns from him  
[4] without any control.  
[5] The IRS and government has a hundred  
[6] percent limit on how much they can take from  
[7] you. A hundred percent limit. And then they  
[8] will come back with Medicaid and Medicare and  
[9] Blue Cross and Blue Shield and MetLife to help  
[10] you. But 50 percent of the people who are going  
[11] bankrupt are people with health insurance with  
[12] health problems.  
[13] Now, I'm just a country boy. I don't  
[14] know a whole lot about a lot of things, but I  
[15] know when somebody's stealing from me. It is  
[16] not adding up.  
[17] I'm just bringing it to the Council's  
[18] attention, and I think we've gotten into a  
[19] system where we have stopped thinking. We don't  
[20] even recognize when we're hurting ourselves now.  
[21] And I asked the lady up there, what are  
[22] you basing it on? And the book she gave me was  
[23] a North American Insurance Industry  
[24] Classification, which now includes Mexico,  
[25] United States and Canada. No borders.

[1] Why are we participating in something  
[2] like that? Why are we basing our business tax  
[3] in Doraville on a system that doesn't sound too  
[4] right? -- to me. I don't know.  
[5] And I asked her. I said, why are you  
[6] basing it on income? And she gave me the  
[7] classifications and the different rates that  
[8] they use, .004, .003, .002, depending on which  
[9] group you belong to. And in my group, it's .004  
[10] or \$400 flat, depending on which one is lowest.  
[11] And I said --  
[12] And then I've got to go get a  
[13] Department of Labor fourth quarter report. I've  
[14] got to give a profit-and-loss statement and I've  
[15] got to get it notarized.  
[16] I got too much to do already. I got  
[17] the State, the Federal, the State Unemployment,  
[18] the State Workmen's Compensation, and my staff  
[19] and my patients. And everybody keeps adding a  
[20] little bit more, a little bit more.  
[21] And then I wonder why is G.M. closing?  
[22] Because we're killing them. We are killing  
[23] them.  
[24] In my estimation, a business license is  
[25] like a driver's license. Nobody asks me what my

[1] income is when I go to get my driver's license.  
[2] They'll give me a fee for a driving a car, a fee  
[3] for driving a truck, a fee for driving a  
[4] motorcycle.

[5] And I'm thinking, why can't Doraville  
[6] do that? Make it simple. Keep it simple  
[7] because businesses have too much to do already.

[8] I was talking to a guy the other day.  
[9] He's got a liquor tax from the City, the County  
[10] and the State.

[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Sir --

[12] **MR. McLENDON:** I'm sorry.

[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- sum up your --

[14] **MR. McLENDON:** Okay. I'm just saying  
[15] that as a citizen, as a citizen, I'm just  
[16] concerned about the direction we're taking about  
[17] our government and our economy. Because in my  
[18] position, I'm watching taxes and insurance and  
[19] I'm seeing what it does to the people, and it's  
[20] killing them. Thank you.

[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Bonita Hoffmeister?

[22] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Honorable Mayor and  
[23] City Councillor, before you I have put the  
[24] Dekalb zoning ordinance, Section 27-732. I also  
[25] have put the descriptions of adult

[1] our community, and a dirty and unkempt gateway  
[2] does not bode well for our property and our  
[3] commercial area.

[4] The third item I have in front of you  
[5] is in front of the concrete planter on New  
[6] Peachtree, we have concrete blocks that are used  
[7] by the State to build the interchanges.

[8] They have set there for years. I would  
[9] like to see if we could get them removed. It is  
[10] not only are our gateways cluttered but our  
[11] roads into and from MARTA are unsightly because  
[12] of this.

[13] If we're going to have some concrete  
[14] structures, let's have some that are artistic.

[15] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I think Chief  
[16] King may be able to address the concrete  
[17] sculptures, but that may be something to do with  
[18] Homeland Security.

[19] **CHIEF KING:** Ma'am, those concrete --

[20] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** They're just a pile  
[21] of blocks.

[22] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am. And they're  
[23] strategically placed there. In case we ever  
[24] have to shut down the tank farm facility, we can  
[25] block vehicular traffic from going over the

[1] entertainment.

[2] While reviewing our zoning ordinance, I  
[3] noticed that the adult entertainment on the  
[4] south side of Buford Highway outside of I-285 is  
[5] not in compliance with Dekalb zoning ordinances.

[6] If you will read item (b)(1), (2) and  
[7] (3), they must be a thousand feet apart from  
[8] each other, they must be a thousand feet from a  
[9] school and they must be a thousand feet from a  
[10] residence structure.

[11] The properties off of Buford Highway --  
[12] and I know this is not in the city of Doraville,  
[13] but it is adjacent to us and it does impact our  
[14] image. And I would request that we pursue  
[15] seeing how the County is going to clean up these  
[16] violations.

[17] We have an adult video, we have two  
[18] strip joints and we have an adult theater, all  
[19] of which are not in compliance with Dekalb  
[20] ordinances.

[21] The second item I have on the agenda is  
[22] our interchanges. It's been a very dry summer,  
[23] so I haven't been before you like I normally am  
[24] every week, asking you to work with the State to  
[25] mow these interchanges. This is our gateway to

[1] railroad tracks or block the streets by using  
[2] our maintenance department to drag those and  
[3] block the street.

[4] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Okay.

[5] **CHIEF KING:** But if we could --

[6] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** If you could hide  
[7] them --

[8] **CHIEF KING:** Fair enough, ma'am.

[9] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Behind the bush.

[10] **CHIEF KING:** Anyway, I'll work on it  
[11] with the head of the Maintenance department and  
[12] see if we can do a better job.

[13] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** And on --  
[14] Mayor --

[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes?

[16] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** -- may I speak?

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes, ma'am.

[18] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** On  
[19] Ms. Hoffmeister's first item, adult entertain-  
[20] ment on Buford Highway, would we be able to get  
[21] Mr. Powell to draft a letter to the County  
[22] asking them to check into this and report to  
[23] us --

[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes.

[25] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** -- what they are

[1] going to do or what they have done with regard  
[2] to it? Okay.  
[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yeah.  
[4] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Okay.  
[5] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Yeah, because there's  
[6] numerous violations.  
[7] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I appreciate you  
[8] bringing this to our attention.  
[9] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Well, unless -- until  
[10] I read the zoning ordinance --  
[11] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Thank you.  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Karen Pachuta?  
[13] **MS. PACHUTA:** Very, briefly, Brian  
[14] Bates and I Friday announced the recall  
[15] campaign.  
[16] Councilman Lowe is up for reelection,  
[17] so he was not included, Mr. Hart qualified to  
[18] run for mayor so he is no longer included, but  
[19] we are continuing forward with Councilman  
[20] Spangler.  
[21] Brian Bates, myself, and Susan Fraysse  
[22] will have applications to sign outside City Hall  
[23] after the meeting.  
[24] It's a several-step process. Once we  
[25] get enough signatures for the application, we'll

[1] go back to Dekalb County.  
[2] When they issue the petitions, we will  
[3] then be getting signatures.  
[4] And signing the petition if we get

[2] And I would like to limit the citizens'  
[3] comments to three minutes if that's possible,

[8] have contacted 38 people and asked them to wear  
[9] white shirts and raise their hands. And please

[11] to "Mr. X" in this. We decided not to publish

[13] (Reading) Honorable Mayor, City  
[14] Councillors, Ladies and Gentlemen, we feel that  
[15] there is a pattern of process failures in the  
[16] governance of the City of Doraville.  
[17] Tonight we are delineating the failure  
[18] of the City to follow established procedures and  
[19] Roberts Rules of Order. This confirms a  
[20] precedent that appears unethical, ongoing, and  
[21] divisive.  
[22] The processes we are addressing concern  
[23] Peachtree Pavilion/H-Mart Properties' variance  
[24] petitions.  
[25] Previous April 2007, they petitioned

Page 36

[1] for a variance to reduce by 40 percent the  
[2] number of parking spaces required by our zoning  
[3] ordinances for their development. The Doraville  
[4] Planning Commission and Pond & Company  
[5] recommended denial of their variance at the May  
[6] 7, 2007 City Council meeting.  
[7] The developers then asked that their  
[8] variance petition be tabled.  
[9] At the May 21st, 2007 City Council  
[10] meeting, the City Council voted to table the  
[11] petition.  
[12] The petition was on the following  
[13] Council meeting agenda, June 4th, 2007. The  
[14] Mayor informed the Council that Peachtree  
[15] Pavilion/H-Mart had again requested the petition  
[16] be tabled. No motion or vote was conducted.  
[17] Thereafter, neither the Mayor nor the  
[18] Peachtree Pavilion/H-Mart representative brought  
[19] up the variance. It was never on the agenda.  
[20] The variance has still not been voted  
[21] on after at least seven City Council meetings.  
[22] The public has every right to expect  
[23] this variance to be addressed in a timely  
[24] manner. Instead, it was allowed to expire.  
[25] In the meantime, it is our

[1] understanding a land disturbance permit has been  
[2] issued to Peachtree Pavilion/H-Mart and was  
[3] signed not by the head building official, Chuck  
[4] Entsminger, as required by Doraville ordinances,  
[5] but by "John X" who is retired from Dekalb  
[6] County.

[7] "Mr. X" seems to have been sporadically  
[8] employed by Doraville as a subcontractor. Rumor  
[9] has it that "Mr. X" signed the land-disturbance  
[10] agreement for Peachtree Pavilion/H-Mart.

[11] Something specific took place that  
[12] established a relationship between Doraville and  
[13] "Mr. X" that one or more City officials assumed  
[14] gave them the right to bypass Chuck Entsminger's  
[15] authority.

[16] It also appears that "Mr. X" based the  
[17] land disturbance permit on Dekalb County  
[18] ordinances which may or may not necessarily meet  
[19] Doraville's ordinance requirements.

[20] In the current atmosphere of secrecy,  
[21] it has been impossible to learn exactly when  
[22] this subcontracted building official issued the  
[23] land disturbance permit and under what authority  
[24] and laws it was issued.

[25] Considering the public concern about

[1] **MR. ANDERSON:** No comment.  
[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Go ahead. You got  
[3] three minutes.

[4] **MS. BIRD:** Kay Bird, Northwoods.  
[5] Can you hear me back there? I'm not  
[6] sure this is on. We couldn't hear very well.

[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Just get closer to it,  
[8] ma'am. I'm sorry.

[9] **MS. BIRD:** I have a question that came  
[10] up this evening. I have another issue, but I  
[11] was wondering why Karen Pachuta was allowed to  
[12] present the recall petition publicly, and when I  
[13] presented a petition to be read during citizens'  
[14] comments on a public petition requesting that  
[15] the City Council put some effort into a renewed  
[16] proposal for the downtown center, I was --  
[17] proposal for a renewed downtown center including  
[18] a Publix and Kroger's, I was told to sit down  
[19] and that I couldn't complete my presentation. I  
[20] find this unacceptable.

[21] Now, this is an ante litem notice, and  
[22] this is addressed to Mr. Powell, and I'll hand  
[23] out copies to each of you.

[24] (Reading) Dear Mr. Powell, you're  
[25] hereby served notice it's your responsibility to

[1] this property development, we request a full  
[2] public disclosure of the details about when,  
[3] how, and under what authority this land  
[4] disturbance permit was issued.

[5] These system failures lend credence to  
[6] Doraville's reputation as unsophisticated, easy  
[7] to slide things past, and unattractive to  
[8] quality development. This in turn leads to  
[9] declining residential and business vitality.  
[10] These failures also lead to citizen distrust of  
[11] public officials, lack of confidence in the City  
[12] adherence to existing ordinances, policies and  
[13] procedures and even to Roberts Rules of Order.

[14] This has resulted in polarized,  
[15] ineffective and embarrassing administration of  
[16] our tax dollars, energy and intellectual  
[17] capital.

[18] Our deepest and serious request is that  
[19] there be an open display of all documents  
[20] pertaining to this recent land disturbance  
[21] permit and that an open meeting be held to  
[22] discuss this.

[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Who's next?

[24] **MR. ANDERSON:** No comment.

[25] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** No comment?

[1] know and properly advise the Doraville city  
[2] government about the zoning laws of Doraville  
[3] and of Georgia as they relate to any actions  
[4] which may have . . . taken or are intended to be  
[5] taken concerning a land disturbance permit to  
[6] Peachtree Pavilion/H-Mart and Associates.

[7] According to CLE article Growth  
[8] Management in Georgia, Thomas M. Mitchell,  
[9] written January 22nd and twenty -- it was  
[10] produced January 22nd and 23rd, 2007, Atlanta,  
[11] Georgia, found at www.lawseminars.com, says, "If  
[12] a local government fails to follow the minimum  
[13] requirements of the Zoning Procedures Law of  
[14] Georgia, the zoning decision is void," end  
[15] quote. This comes from Tilly Properties v.  
[16] Bartow County with citations following.

[17] Additional requirements for hearings on  
[18] proposed zoning decisions are identified in the  
[19] Official Code of Georgia Annotated, paragraph  
[20] 36-66-4 (2007), of which a copy is attached.

[21] The request by Peachtree Pavilion/  
[22] H-Mart for a variance was tabled by Mayor  
[23] Jenkins and the Doraville City Council in May of  
[24] '07. It has since been -- not been passed or  
[25] properly authorized. A tabled issue is not a

[1] passed issue. The minimum standards have not  
[2] been met in order to issue a land disturbance  
[3] permit.  
[4] Your immediate action to correct any  
[5] current or potential illegal land disturbance  
[6] permits is demanded in accordance with the laws

[9] Sincerely, Kay Bird.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Who's next? Come on up
