[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Meeting come to order.  
[3] Call the roll, please.  
[4] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[5] Alexander?  
[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Here.  
[7] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Here.  
[9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Here.  
[11] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Here.  
[13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
[14] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Here.  
[15] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[16] Spangler?  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Here.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** All right. We've got a  
[19] number of minutes to approve tonight. I'm going  
[20] to call them out, and I want one motion for all  
[21] these minutes. It'll take just a minute, so  
[22] everybody bear with me.

[4] We've had a lot of meetings and just  
[5] trying to get caught up on our minutes, and I'd  
[6] like to have a motion that we approve the  
[7] minutes.  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Mr. Mayor, I  
[9] don't have 9/17 or 10/6.  
[10] **CLERK BLACKMON:** 10/6 is a blue copy  
[11] from the past.  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Got it.  
[13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** So you would have  
[14] gotten it way before, and we've already voted on  
[15] it.  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** And which other?  
[17] **CLERK BLACKMON:** 9/17 probably should  
[18] have been a work session.  
[19] No work session unless then there was  
[20] one -- did he call out 9/17?  
[21] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** He did.  
[22] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Then you should have  
[23] gotten a copy. I have it on my desk. Do you  
[24] want me to give it to you now?  
[25] Let me go see. I'll be right back.

[2] (Brief break)

[3] ---  
[4] **CLERK BLACKMON:** That was the continua-  
[5] tion from the work session that went over, so  
[6] you won't have any that time, that day either.  
[7] That was my mistake writing the date down. That  
[8] was the continuation of the work session.

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So 9/17?

[10] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Yes. The rest of  
[11] everything you should have.

[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I'd like to have a  
[13] motion we approve the minutes.

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So moved.

[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I have a second?

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Second.

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?

[18] As I said to the people before, I want  
[19] to thank everybody for working on the Doraville  
[20] Days. Everybody worked good on that, all the  
[21] way through the Council, the citizens and the  
[22] businesses. And I thank everybody again for  
[23] this. Now, we got some awards we're going to be  
[24] giving out in a few minutes to some of the  
[25] people that worked with the library and also

[1] advertised in the newspaper.

[2] I don't know how many people showed up  
[3] for the September 25th meeting, but this is a  
[4] lot of stuff that was passed. And then of  
[5] course it vanished from the first meeting in  
[6] October because it had been taken off the agenda  
[7] because it had been passed at this little work  
[8] session meeting.

[9] I'm just very concerned. I mean a  
[10] reasonable person that understands the process  
[11] we've been using would say, "Well, here's our  
[12] agenda for the work session, and I'm very  
[13] interested in these issues," or this issue or  
[14] whatever, they would show up at the work session  
[15] and expect to be able to show up at the next  
[16] council meeting to see the actual vote.

[17] Well, if that was the case and they  
[18] showed up for that actual council meeting, guess  
[19] what? It's all done. What happened? Don't  
[20] know. Was it on any other published agenda?  
[21] Actually, no, it wasn't, because the only thing  
[22] that was published on the agenda was one line  
[23] item that said, "Discuss zoning issues."

[24] So I'm very concerned about this. I  
[25] mean it's -- it may or may not -- I'm not a

[1] with the schools on the arts, and we'll be doing  
[2] that.

[3] I'd like to have a motion we approve  
[4] the minutes.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So moved.

[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Second.

[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any more discussion on  
[9] it?

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I have a couple  
[11] of questions about two of the dates.

[12] First of all, September 25th, that was  
[13] confusing to me. I was unable to attend that  
[14] meeting. I forget exactly why.

[15] But anyway, the things that were  
[16] actually passed during that meeting were not on  
[17] the agenda for that meeting -- the public  
[18] hearing conduct ordinance, a zoning map language  
[19] ordinance, a zoning map ordinance, a home  
[20] occupation ordinance and a flood plain  
[21] ordinance.

[22] Now, all of these were listed on the  
[23] work session, work session agenda for September,  
[24] and they were not listed on the agenda for this  
[25] particular meeting. They were, I believe,

[1] lawyer. Maybe or maybe it doesn't go against  
[2] the letter of the open meetings law but it sure  
[3] seems to go against the intent.

[4] So I would say we -- I don't know what  
[5] to do about it, frankly, now that it's already  
[6] done, you know.

[7] Can we make sure this doesn't happen in  
[8] the future? I mean what can we do to make sure  
[9] that this type of thing doesn't happen where  
[10] we're -- you know, where ordinances are getting  
[11] passed and no one seems to know anything about  
[12] them until after the fact?

[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Murray, do you have any  
[14] input?

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No, sir. I've  
[16] addressed this in a memo to the Council.

[17] It's my official opinion as city  
[18] attorney that the items comported with the law  
[19] in accordance with the open meetings law.  
[20] Newspaper ads were published. The Zoning  
[21] Procedures Act was complied with.

[22] I have nothing else to add.

[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes, sir. Thank you.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** But the agenda --  
[25] you know, the way we've been doing agendas since

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[1] the beginning of the year is completely  
 [2] different. And no one voted to change the rules  
 [3] for the agenda. Nobody did anything. So like I  
 [4] said, I got a real problem with that.  
 [5] On October 3rd, apparently there was  
 [6] only one thing, and I have a question. On  
 [7] October 3rd, I was not able to attend that  
 [8] meeting. It said Star Towers permit renewal.  
 [9] Could you tell us what that was, what permit for  
 [10] Star Towers that was renewed?  
 [11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That was a 2 o'clock  
 [12] meeting where we called the people in on the  
 [13] moratorium.  
 [14] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
 [15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I can remember that  
 [16] one.  
 [17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** That permit was  
 [18] renewed?  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** The demolition  
 [20] permit.  
 [21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Demolition permit.  
 [22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So the original  
 [23] permit had expired?  
 [24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Right.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So we didn't make

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[1] them reapply for a new permit, or what did we  
 [2] do? What do we normally do with that?  
 [3] **CLERK BLACKMON:** We don't. They just  
 [4] renewed it.  
 [5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Council voted to renew  
 [6] it.  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay. Well,  
 [8] those are the questions. I wanted to bring  
 [9] those up and get them on the record. Thank you.  
 [10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?  
 [11] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I agree with  
 [12] Mr. Roche. I just want to say that I think that  
 [13] it appears to be that when we don't advertise  
 [14] the agenda items like we usually do, that we're  
 [15] trying to hide something from the audience.  
 [16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Agenda items are always  
 [17] advertised the way they're supposed to be, and  
 [18] legally.  
 [19] Anymore discussion?  
 [20] - - -  
 [21] (No response)  
 [22] - - -  
 [23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.  
 [24] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [25] Alexander?

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
 [2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
 [4] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
 [5] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
 [6] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [8] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
 [9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
 [10] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [11] Spangler?  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** No, because I  
 [13] did not attend all the meetings.  
 [14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
 [15] Doraville Days, items on the agenda for  
 [16] Doraville Days. And I've made my comments and  
 [17] I'm going to -- I think Pam has got some presen-  
 [18] tations to make. We'll do that at this time.  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I just want to  
 [20] make a brief comment before Brian takes over the  
 [21] mic and Lynn takes over the mic.  
 [22] For those of you that don't know it,  
 [23] the road race had 83 runners. Going into the  
 [24] day, we had only about 35 if I'm not mistaken.  
 [25] So they really came out wonderfully well that

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[1] morning of the Saturday.  
 [2] And so we have 83 runners. We were  
 [3] able to, if I'm not mistaken -- correct me if  
 [4] I'm wrong -- but \$1450 that we raised to be able  
 [5] to give to the Children's Healthcare of Atlanta.  
 [6] So congratulation to all of you for helping with  
 [7] Doraville Days, because that's a wonderful  
 [8] contribution to them. So thank you very much.  
 [9] - - -  
 [10] (Applause)  
 [11] - - -  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Without the help  
 [13] of volunteers, the event would not have been a  
 [14] success. And I know many of you out there spent  
 [15] time before and during the event and after to  
 [16] make Doraville Days a wonderful event, but there  
 [17] are a couple of groups that went over and beyond  
 [18] the general call of duty, and we want to  
 [19] publicly thank and acknowledge them for their  
 [20] efforts.  
 [21] And the very first group that we'll  
 [22] mention served as a tremendous asset for our  
 [23] library and their book sale, and that is the  
 [24] Honor Society for Cross Keys Elementary School.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** High School.

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Or High School.  
[2] Sorry. I just demoted them. I apologize. For  
[3] Cross Keys High School.

[4] They provided a significant number of  
[5] volunteers both in advance of the book sale and  
[6] during the book sale. I'm going to turn it over  
[7] to our library director, Lynn, to further  
[8] comment on the Cross Keys High School Honor  
[9] Society and their support of our event.

[10] **MS. WANTANABE:** Thank you. I'm Lynn  
[11] Wantanabe, the library director, and it's my  
[12] privilege to present some certificates to the  
[13] advisor that really spearheaded getting the  
[14] students to come help out.

[15] And this group of students, this is  
[16] actually their third time to help us out with  
[17] the book sale. They helped us out last October,  
[18] they helped us out in the spring and then they  
[19] helped us out this fall.

[20] I haven't counted up how many students  
[21] we have here. Let's see. Looks like between 17  
[22] and 19 students helped us out with a total of  
[23] 47-and-a-half volunteer hours Friday evening and  
[24] Saturday during the day.

[25] I'd like to invite Jan Helgeson to come

[1] Karen Ly, Tay Mai, Eduardo Mares, Kevin Mascada,  
[2] Jazmin Palma, Hafsa Qadeer, Natacha Richemulf,  
[3] Brian Valdez and Christian Valdez.

[7] **MS. WANTANABE:** And I want to say a  
[8] special thank you to Hieu Huynh who volunteered  
[9] over the two days, six hours. Thank you so  
[10] much.

[11] - - -  
[12] (Applause)

[13] - - -  
[14] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Thank you very  
[15] much. You'll see a trend here develop, and it's  
[16] going to be a great opportunity for the city to  
[17] create a new partnership and really work to  
[18] expand on that relationship with Cross Keys.

[19] The next group is also from Cross Keys.  
[20] As many of you know, we had the inflatable jump-  
[21] and-slides down by the Police Department.

[22] And we had six pieces of equipment? Is  
[23] that --

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes, exactly.

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And we needed

[1] up because I would like to make a presentation  
[2] to her. Jan Helgeson and Melanie Taylor.  
[3] Melanie Taylor is the advisor for the Honor  
[4] Society and Jan Helgeson is the vice president  
[5] of the Friends of Doraville Library as well as a  
[6] reading specialist at Cross Keys High School.

[7] And Jan, we want to give you this  
[8] certificate, and on behalf of Melanie, have you  
[9] accept hers too. A certificate of appreciation  
[10] and a special thank you to Jan Helgeson, Cross  
[11] Keys High School Advisor, for your hours of hard  
[12] work, volunteer service and support of the City  
[13] of Doraville, making Doraville Days Fall  
[14] Festival a huge success.

[15] **MS. HEGELSON:** Thank you.

[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

[17] - - -  
[18] (Applause)

[19] - - -  
[20] **MS. WANTANABE:** And for the record, I  
[21] would also like to read off the names of the  
[22] students that volunteered, and I will give these  
[23] to Jan to distribute to the students. Sonia  
[24] Alba, Montserrat Alba, Eric Barritia, Mayea  
[25] Garcia, Uyen He, Hieu Huynh, Thuy Le, Chris Ly,

[1] people to help monitor that and make sure the  
[2] kids took off their shoes and behaved  
[3] appropriately and didn't go up the slide the  
[4] wrong way and all that good stuff.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** And making  
[6] cotton candy and popcorn.

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And making cotton  
[8] candy and popcorn.

[9] And the Future Business Leaders of  
[10] Cross Keys, their advisor, Michael Greene,  
[11] called us up and they actually provided us with  
[12] I believe it was 12 volunteers on that Saturday  
[13] afternoon to help monitor the jump-and-slide  
[14] area.

[15] So between the Honor Society and the  
[16] Future Business Leaders, we've been able to tap  
[17] into almost 30 of their young up-and-coming  
[18] volunteers, creating a great partnership and  
[19] relationship with the city of Doraville. So I'm  
[20] going to turn it back over to Commissioner  
[21] Fleming to acknowledge them.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Jan, if you  
[23] will, I understand that Mr. Greene, Michael  
[24] Greene, is the advisor for Cross Keys High  
[25] School for the Future Business Leaders of

[1] America and he was not able to attend this  
 [2] evening. Would you mind coming back again,  
 [3] because we'd like to present him.  
 [4] And as I understand it also, he was the  
 [5] Teacher of the Year.  
 [6] **MS. HELGESON:** Teacher of the Year.  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Teacher of the  
 [8] Year, Michael Greene.  
 [9] **MS. TAYLOR:** Track coach.  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Track coach?  
 [11] The students that participated and  
 [12] helped out with Doraville Days were Tai Le, Jane  
 [13] Truong, Maritza Sanchez, Marilyn Ortiz, Kaijor  
 [14] Ndow, Maria Torres, Cindy Mandanarez, Kathy  
 [15] Mandanarez, Rumana Rimi, Elberth Romero and  
 [16] Jacqueline Mandragon.  
 [17] And we appreciate Cross Keys High  
 [18] School, Mr. Greene and yourself, Jan. Thank you  
 [19] so very much. We couldn't have done it without  
 [20] you.  
 [21] - - -  
 [22] (Applause)  
 [23] - - -  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** We also have two  
 [25] business partners that worked with the City in

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Our final group.  
 [2] As many of you watched us assemble and  
 [3] disassemble the tents our there in the rain on  
 [4] Friday afternoon, we had the maintenance guys  
 [5] out there, and we have thanked them and we  
 [6] continue to thank them for their efforts.  
 [7] But Pacesetters provided us with a  
 [8] group of temporary laborers, day laborers, that  
 [9] were out there Friday night and then came back  
 [10] at 6 o'clock on Saturday morning and were there  
 [11] until about 7 o'clock on Saturday night, and  
 [12] they provided those laborers to us at no charge.  
 [13] So without the efforts of those individuals,  
 [14] we'd probably still be taking down the tents.  
 [15] So we very much appreciate Tom Bidael with  
 [16] Pacesetter and the crew that they provided to us  
 [17] both on Friday and Saturday. It was very much  
 [18] appreciated, so thank them for us as well.  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Is he here this  
 [20] evening?  
 [21] Well, we want to thank them very, very  
 [22] much, because I, like Brian, was out in the rain  
 [23] too trying to help originally. And then I said,  
 [24] "This is a little bit too heavy for me. I think  
 [25] I'd better sit down and do something else." So

[1] helping make this a great event.  
 [2] The first one that we're going to  
 [3] recognize helped us with making sure that it was  
 [4] a clean event. So we're very pleased and thank  
 [5] very much the Just Trash individuals for their  
 [6] support of our event. Thank you.  
 [7] - - -  
 [8] (Applause)  
 [9] - - -  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** And the  
 [11] gentlemen that helped us were Kevin Copeland,  
 [12] Ryan Tabb, Luis Torres, Robert Hewtty and Miguel  
 [13] Arredondo.  
 [14] And a token of our appreciation also.  
 [15] **MR. COPELAND:** I appreciate this very  
 [16] much and I look forward to doing it next year  
 [17] with y'all.  
 [18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Good.  
 [19] **MR. COPELAND:** And if you have any  
 [20] other events before then, you give us a call.  
 [21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
 [22] **MR. COPELAND:** I appreciate it. Thank  
 [23] you.  
 [24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you.

[1] most appreciative to Pacesetter Personnel  
 [2] Service.  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Thank you. And  
 [4] thank everybody.  
 [5] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** And also, Jan,  
 [6] before you leave, we have a token of our  
 [7] appreciation to every one of the children,  
 [8] yourself and Mr. Greene, some cups for you.  
 [9] **MS. HELGESON:** Thank you very much.  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you.  
 [11] - - -  
 [12] (Applause)  
 [13] - - -  
 [14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I had talked about  
 [15] sidewalks at the last meeting. We're trying to  
 [16] get a lot of donations on the sidewalks and  
 [17] we're working on some grants. So as far as that  
 [18] goes, that's all I have on sidewalks.  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** You were going to  
 [20] tell us how many grants were submitted?  
 [21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** How many have we  
 [22] submitted, Luke, that actually --  
 [23] **MR. HOWE:** I'm working on one grant  
 [24] right now that involves like Safe, it's STR  
 [25] grant, but it involves facilitating safe ways to

[1] school, and Tilly Mill would be, you know, a  
 [2] good project for this.  
 [3] But for the Central Avenue, I'm still  
 [4] looking. And it's quite possible that we could  
 [5] formulate a legislative agenda and have it  
 [6] submitted as a potential earmark. That may be  
 [7] the quickest and less competitive route to  
 [8] getting grant money for sidewalks. So we'll  
 [9] pursue both avenues.  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** So as it  
 [11] stands right now, we don't have a grant for the  
 [12] Central --  
 [13] **MR. HOWE:** Well, you know, they're not  
 [14] always open.  
 [15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** No grants, no  
 [16] applications have been made?  
 [17] **MR. HOWE:** Well, there has to be a  
 [18] grant before you can actually --  
 [19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Put in application for  
 [20] it.  
 [21] **MR. HOWE:** -- apply for one.  
 [22] **MR. ROCHE:** Okay. Well, the Council  
 [23] voted, allocated \$150,000 for this project and  
 [24] there has been no progress.  
 [25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** There has been

[1] already been through them. There's no reason to  
 [2] spend 30 minutes on every item or even 15  
 [3] minutes. Ten minutes is plenty. Some of them  
 [4] don't even need to go that long.  
 [5] So that being said, Mr. Spangler,  
 [6] you're number four.  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, at the  
 [8] work session, I brought up the idea of having  
 [9] two meetings per month instead of a work session  
 [10] and a meeting. I feel like we can get a lot  
 [11] more motions passed. And if it's something that  
 [12] comes up that we still need more information on,  
 [13] all we got to do is postpone it for another two  
 [14] weeks. I think that we can cut the time of the  
 [15] meetings, probably not by half but at least by a  
 [16] quarter.  
 [17] So I want to make a motion tonight to  
 [18] cancel the work sessions and have two regular  
 [19] voting meetings per month.  
 [20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I have a second?  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Second.  
 [22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Discussion?  
 [23] ---  
 [24] (No response)  
 [25] ---

[1] progress, and we've used some of the money we  
 [2] have without going into the \$150,000 to do the  
 [3] rest of the Park Avenue sidewalk. And as soon  
 [4] as we get a chance, we'll start on the other  
 [5] sidewalk.  
 [6] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Mayor, I  
 [7] thought that the \$150,000 was solely for Central  
 [8] Avenue, that the Park Avenue extension was set  
 [9] for this year.  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** That's correct.  
 [11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, let me put it  
 [12] this way: we have not had time to start on the  
 [13] other sidewalks as we speak.  
 [14] I put out a little article, if you  
 [15] picked one up outside, that is kind of a  
 [16] beginning of redoing our Council meetings, how  
 [17] we control them. And we have got to the point  
 [18] that we spend so much time on these Council  
 [19] meetings, and there's really no reason for it,  
 [20] actually. Most cities even have a time limit  
 [21] for the councilmen. I've tried to stay away  
 [22] from that, but it seems like I'm going to have  
 [23] to get to it.  
 [24] And I'm going to say this now: each  
 [25] one of these items that's on this agenda, we've

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call for the motion.  
 [2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [3] Alexander?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** No.  
 [5] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
 [6] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
 [7] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
 [9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** No.  
 [11] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
 [13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [14] Spangler?  
 [15] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
 [16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** What have we got?  
 [17] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Motion carried 4 to 2.  
 [18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
 [19] The next agenda will be a full voting  
 [20] meeting, which will be the Thursday before the  
 [21] first-of-the-month meeting or the mid-month  
 [22] meeting, whichever it might be. We'll have two  
 [23] agendas.  
 [24] Okay. Number five is Pam.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Mayor, we

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[1] might want to add also that this meeting will  
[2] start at 7 o'clock instead of at 6:00, like the  
[3] regular meeting.  
[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, did you put that  
[5] in your motion?  
[6] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** No, sir, I  
[7] didn't. Do I need to change the motion?  
[8] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You can just make  
[9] another motion.  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Just make  
[11] another motion to start that meeting as well at  
[12] 7 o'clock.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You make a motion that  
[14] both meetings will start at 6:00 p.m. rather  
[15] than 7:00.  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** No, Mayor.  
[17] They start at 7:00 instead of 6:00. One is 6:00  
[18] and one is 7:00. Both of them will start at  
[19] 7:00 p.m. That gives the audience plenty of  
[20] time to be at the meeting.  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I second that.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.  
[24] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[25] Alexander?

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
[2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
[3] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
[4] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
[5] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
[6] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
[8] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
[10] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[11] Spangler?  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. 7:00 p.m.  
[14] Okay, Pam.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Just needed an  
[16] update on the Ethics Committee and how they're  
[17] doing.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I have no update.  
[19] **CLERK BLACKMON:** They have been  
[20] forwarded information from myself as far as the  
[21] new ordinance that was passed, and Attorney  
[22] Weed, with some guidelines for them, and I have  
[23] not heard anything since.  
[24] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Is Mr. Grant  
[25] here this evening to give any type of update?

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[1] **CLERK BLACKMON:** No.  
[2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you very  
[3] much.  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, at the last  
[5] meeting, we talked about providing legal counsel  
[6] for the Ethics Commission to make sure that, you  
[7] know, their current procedures are --  
[8] **CLERK BLACKMON:** I did inform them that  
[9] they need that and that it was requested it not  
[10] be anyone in association with the City, and he  
[11] said okay, but I have not heard anything as far  
[12] as if they have pursued it.  
[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay. I spoke  
[14] today to Steve Fincher from Fincher Denmark  
[15] Williams. I explained the situation that, you  
[16] know, we couldn't use our regular city attorney  
[17] for this and that basically what would be needed  
[18] would be to review our procedures to make sure  
[19] that they're -- or their procedures to make sure  
[20] that they're legal, educate them as to the  
[21] ramifications of open meetings and closed  
[22] meetings and open records and provide legal  
[23] counsel as far as the specific complaints, you  
[24] know, in terms of the law part.  
[25] I told them that I was going to present

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[1] it tonight that we --  
[2] Since we don't have anyone specifically  
[3] laid out or specifically designated, I would  
[4] like to make a motion that we hire Fincher  
[5] Denmark Williams to provide legal counsel to the  
[6] Ethics Committee to do the three things I just  
[7] talked about as long as it does not go over  
[8] \$5,000.  
[9] It shouldn't be \$5,000, but, you know,  
[10] we just want to set a high end. We have the  
[11] money in the budget for this. You know, I think  
[12] it's time we get this thing moving.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That's a lot of money,  
[14] Mr. Roche.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, it's not  
[16] happening now, Mayor, and the money's in the  
[17] budget for exactly this type of thing. I mean  
[18] we could go to GIRMA and pay them a lot more. I  
[19] don't care. But we have not yet gotten legal  
[20] counsel for the Ethics Committee.  
[21] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** In my opinion,  
[22] Mayor, this would be money well spent to educate  
[23] the Ethics Committee.  
[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I agree with you there.  
[25] That's not my point.

[1] \$5,000 is a lot of money.  
 [2] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** No, I don't think  
 [3] it's going to be anywhere near \$5,000. I just  
 [4] wanted to set a high end to make sure that, you  
 [5] know, we knew.  
 [6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** And another thing. I  
 [7] wish the Council would consider not necessarily  
 [8] somebody like Fincher Denmark & Williams. We  
 [9] got local city attorneys from Chamblee and other  
 [10] places that would be glad to do that.  
 [11] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We've been asking  
 [12] for them and asking for them but nothing seems  
 [13] to happen, so --  
 [14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Nobody has asked me for  
 [15] a city attorney. Nobody has asked me for an  
 [16] attorney.  
 [17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** They don't know  
 [18] that they need one, Mayor.  
 [19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** They should know now.  
 [20] Didn't we --  
 [21] **CLERK BLACKMON:** I did inform them of  
 [22] that last week.  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay. So when  
 [24] they request legal counsel, what are we going to  
 [25] do?

[1] they were stellar references.  
 [2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do you have somebody  
 [3] you wanted?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I just would  
 [5] have thought that we would have discussed this  
 [6] as a council before one councilperson contacted.  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, I  
 [8] specifically didn't bring it up to the rest of  
 [9] the Council because I didn't want someone to  
 [10] think that we were trying to get together and  
 [11] pick one place -- one group over another.  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** We did say,  
 [13] though, when we discussed this before, that we  
 [14] did need to go outside of our local --  
 [15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We all agree.  
 [16] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** -- attorneys.  
 [17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We all agree to that.  
 [18] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And we also  
 [19] made reference, I believe, to some of the firms  
 [20] that we did interview. We didn't specifically  
 [21] choose a firm. But I would feel comfortable  
 [22] with any -- other than the one that represented  
 [23] us in one of the suits that we had against us, I  
 [24] would be willing to entertain any one of the  
 [25] firms.

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You've got a motion on  
 [2] the table, don't you?  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yeah.  
 [4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Did you get a second?  
 [5] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I'm going to  
 [6] second that motion. I think we need to move  
 [7] forward on this. We've wasted too much time as  
 [8] it is. And this is one of the firms that we did  
 [9] interview along with the firm that Mr. Murray is  
 [10] with, and so I wouldn't have a problem with any  
 [11] one of the firms that we interviewed.  
 [12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.  
 [13] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I guess why  
 [14] didn't we pick someone like Sweeney Thompson or  
 [15] someone else closer?  
 [16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, that was my  
 [17] question, Maria.  
 [18] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I don't know.  
 [19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I don't know why we  
 [20] just picked that particular one.  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** They just  
 [22] happened to be top of my list, and I had called  
 [23] them. During the course of making the selection  
 [24] process, I had checked with several references,  
 [25] and all the references I got for this group,

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And I'd be happy  
 [2] to amend the motion to change to use a different  
 [3] firm.  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But I think it  
 [5] needs to be done quickly, not --  
 [6] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I mean we've  
 [8] set on this too long.  
 [9] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Mr. Roche, I  
 [10] would be more than happy to support you if it  
 [11] were Thompson Sweeney. That was one of the  
 [12] three firms.  
 [13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, I'll amend  
 [14] my motion we use Thompson Sweeney if they're  
 [15] available, you know, if they feel like they can  
 [16] do it within the time frame -- or the budget.  
 [17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Do you --  
 [18] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I just happen to  
 [19] know that, you know, Fincher Denmark Williams is  
 [20] available and they can definitely do it within  
 [21] the budget.  
 [22] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, I do  
 [23] second your motion.  
 [24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Will you second  
 [25] that? Will you second the change in the

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[1] motion?

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** No.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yeah. Well --

[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You won't?

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Wait. Where are

[6] we now? We need to --

[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Actually, you have a

[8] motion and a second. You had discussion. So if

[9] you want to seek a modification of the original

[10] motion, someone could make a friendly amendment

[11] to the motion that also requires seconding and

[12] you take a vote.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I guess my

[14] question would be why Sweeney blah-blah-blah?

[15] Why them instead of --

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Well, I just

[17] --

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- someone else?

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I mean, you

[20] know, "attaboy" to you for taking it on

[21] initiative, but I don't feel like that one

[22] person should make the decision for Council.

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** But I wasn't

[24] making the decision for Council. I just found

[25] someone that was available. So just because I

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[1] did bring up -- so if I'd said Sweeney, you'd

[2] have said, "No, no. Let's use Fincher Denmark

[3] Williams?"

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** No. I think

[5] we need to discuss who we want.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I mean I don't

[7] care really. I just want somebody. I mean it's

[8] getting --

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I personally have

[10] some questions regarding the other firm.

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, again, the

[12] reason I brought up Fincher Denmark Williams is

[13] because during the hiring process I checked I

[14] think six different references for Fincher

[15] Denmark, and all of them were just -- they were

[16] very, very happy with them, they would hire them

[17] again, and so I basically picked them on the

[18] basis of those six references.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And I appreciate

[20] that, and I still have concerns regarding the

[21] firm. So I would feel more comfortable --

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Could you tell us

[23] what they are and then maybe we could --

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I don't think

[25] that's appropriate in this forum.

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** No, I don't think so

[2] either.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'll amend my

[4] thing to use Sweeney and -- I'm sorry -- I don't

[5] --

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Thompson &

[7] Sweeney.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Now, there are no

[9] connections with Thompson Sweeney as far as

[10] members of the Council or people that work here

[11] or --

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Mr. Weed, yo  
u

[13] don't have a previous relationship with Thompson

[14] Sweeney, do you?

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I do not.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** You did with

[17] Fincher & Williams.

[18] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Okay. Thank

[20] you.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Just so we get,

[22] you know --

[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second on

[24] Thompson Sweeney?

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I'll second that.

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?

[2] - - -

[3] (No response)

[4] - - -

[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.

[6] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[7] Alexander?

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.

[9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.

[11] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.

[13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.

[15] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.

[17] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[18] Spangler?

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.

[20] And I would like someone to get in

[21] touch with them tomorrow to brief them on the

[22] situation and see how quickly they can give us

[23] some help.

[24] **CLERK BLACKMON:** I can do that.

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Can you please

[1] let Council know when you get a response?  
 [2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Yes.  
 [3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Donna?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Sir, if I can,  
 [5] I would like to add this to the agenda pending a  
 [6] couple of meetings that need to take place  
 [7] before I discuss it, please.  
 [8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
 [9] Maria?  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** As discussed  
 [11] in the work session, I have concerns regarding  
 [12] the ethics ordinance, that you have to be a  
 [13] resident of the city to file an ethics  
 [14] complaint, and that would only allow two of the  
 [15] city employees that privilege. We only have, to  
 [16] my knowledge, two employees of the city that  
 [17] live in the city.  
 [18] I guess Mr. Weed did not get direction  
 [19] from Council to address the ethics ordinance.  
 [20] Obviously, I'm not going to rewrite an  
 [21] ordinance, but I did -- I wanted discussion.  
 [22] I would like to take employees out,  
 [23] address their behavior and their following of  
 [24] the ethics ordinance and the employee manual  
 [25] which we are supposed to be getting something

[1] complaint. They can go through the regular  
 [2] scenario that the other employees go through.  
 [3] But at this time, until Mr. Weed  
 [4] researches this more, I don't feel like -- you  
 [5] know, I agree with him on the business owners.  
 [6] I don't think that they should have a right.  
 [7] They should have some way of voicing a complaint  
 [8] but not an ethics complaint, I don't feel.  
 [9] So I would make a motion that we take  
 [10] the two employees out with the right to do the  
 [11] ethics complaint.  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Ms. Alexander,  
 [13] would you please read the original paragraph in  
 [14] regard to what this ethics ordinance is for,  
 [15] what you just commented?  
 [16] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Oh, the  
 [17] intent?  
 [18] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes, please.  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** It says the  
 [20] citizens and businesses of the City of  
 [21] Doraville, the City, are entitled to have fair,  
 [22] ethical and accountable local government which  
 [23] has earned the public's full confidence for  
 [24] integrity.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** The intent of

[1] on.  
 [2] I would like to add -- on page 2 of 21,  
 [3] add subcontractors as part of the people that  
 [4] are subject to the ethics ordinance.  
 [5] And then also on page 12, if we do take  
 [6] employees out, the ethics ordinance -- the  
 [7] complaints could be filed by residents of the  
 [8] city.  
 [9] And I believe that the business owners  
 [10] should have that right, because they have a  
 [11] vested interest in the city because they do pay  
 [12] taxes also. And that's one of the spirits of  
 [13] this. It says the citizens and businesses of  
 [14] the city of Doraville are entitled to have fair,  
 [15] ethical and accountable local government, but  
 [16] yet we're not allowing the business owners to be  
 [17] able to file ethics complaints.  
 [18] I know we had concerns -- Mr. Weed had  
 [19] great concerns about opening the barn door, so  
 [20] to speak. So I still think that this addresses  
 [21] some issues and then does make it more  
 [22] equitable. So that's up for discussion.  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I would make a  
 [24] motion that we do dismiss the two present  
 [25] employees from being able to bring an ethics

[1] this ethics ordinance is to be able to protect  
 [2] those that have just been mentioned. So I am  
 [3] with the same feeling, that the businesses  
 [4] should be allowed to file an ethics complaint  
 [5] unless we go back and rework the entire ethics  
 [6] ordinance, which I do not feel that we should  
 [7] do.  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I agree with  
 [9] Maria as far as taking the two employees out,  
 [10] but I disagree. Like Mr. Spangler, I think the  
 [11] businesses, if they have complaints, there's  
 [12] other avenues that they could take. I'm not  
 [13] sure that I feel comfortable with them being  
 [14] added into the ethics.  
 [15] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Mr. Weed,  
 [16] regarding the employees, if they're residents of  
 [17] the city, we can't preclude them from filing an  
 [18] ethics complaint whether or not it's business-  
 [19] related -- employee-related or not, can we,  
 [20] because that's potentially considered a vested  
 [21] right as a resident of the city?  
 [22] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, the answer to  
 [23] your question is no and the other answer is yes.  
 [24] The only right that the citizenry would  
 [25] have with regard to utilizing the ethics

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[1] ordinance is whatever right the Mayor and  
[2] Council gives to the citizenry by virtue of  
[3] adopting the ordinance.  
[4] Bear in mind that no ethics ordinance  
[5] is required by state law or the federal  
[6] constitution or federal law. So if you vote --  
[7] if you have an ethics ordinance, it's entirely  
[8] up to the Council. If you want one, you have  
[9] one, and you can make modifications to it.  
[10] Now, with regard to a person who is an  
[11] employee and a resident, since you've got the  
[12] ability to create the ordinance to begin with,  
[13] you've got the ability to curtail, expand  
[14] whatever rights whatever individuals have  
[15] underneath that ordinance.  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Well, we're  
[17] dealing with potentially two different  
[18] scenarios, one where an employee feels aggrieved  
[19] as an employee and one where a resident feels  
[20] aggrieved as a resident. If you take one right  
[21] away, are you not taking both?  
[22] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I wouldn't say so.  
[23] I think what I would say is a right  
[24] that is given can be taken away, to begin with.  
[25] And then, secondly, I would say that as

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[1] long as there's a proper method to address the  
[2] grievance of the person, which pathway they go  
[3] down, they're going to get to the same end, and  
[4] so maybe the road they take is less relevant in  
[5] how they get to their destination.  
[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Could we modify  
[7] the procedures? We're going to look at the  
[8] procedures again, anyway, for the Ethics  
[9] Committee. The part of it would be if it's an  
[10] ethics complaint made by an employee, one of the  
[11] first things that the Ethics Committee would do  
[12] would be to determine if it's appropriate to be  
[13] handled through the -- if it's an employee  
[14] matter, simply handle it through the grievance  
[15] process that all employees have access to.  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Uh-huh.  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** If it's not an  
[18] employee matter, than it would be just an ethics  
[19] complaint as a citizen.  
[20] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, it's completely  
[21] possible to do that, and some ethics ordinances  
[22] choose that route. In fact, I believe  
[23] Hapeville's got a method similar to that.  
[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Because I mean  
[25] being an employee of the City shouldn't take

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[1] away your rights as a citizen of the city, and  
[2] just because you happen to live in the city  
[3] doesn't mean that if you have a problem with  
[4] some other department of the city, whatever --  
[5] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Would that apply  
[6] to an employee who is not a citizen?  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** No.  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So an employee  
[9] who is a resident of the city would have an  
[10] extra recourse that an employee who is not a  
[11] resident of the city would not have.  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Not from an  
[13] employee standpoint, no.  
[14] From an employment standpoint, the  
[15] employee manual would rule, basically. If you  
[16] have a problem with someone and it's basically a  
[17] personnel matter or some sort of type of a  
[18] personnel matter or a grievance, they could deal  
[19] with that grievance through the employee manual.  
[20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Understood. But  
[21] the employment manual doesn't address us. If  
[22] the complaint is regarding me or Ms. Alexander,  
[23] then the employment manual does not address a  
[24] grievance, or a concern, or a frustration or a  
[25] gripe against an elected official. That is a

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[1] route that is taken via an ethics board.  
[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** But they don't  
[3] report city employees to the Mayor.  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** But if we  
[5] aggrieve an employee, you know, through  
[6] behavior, or comments or actions, they have no  
[7] recourse aside from suing?  
[8] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, as the attorney  
[9] for the City, I would actually say that's a good  
[10] thing, you know.  
[11] When you decide to expand a group of  
[12] rights to people, you have the ability to do  
[13] that as a legislative body. But before you do  
[14] that, you're also expanding the liabilities of  
[15] the City. Every time you expand rights of  
[16] individuals, you expand a potential for the  
[17] government to violate those rights and therefore  
[18] you are increasing exponentially the liability  
[19] and the risk that's now on the City.  
[20] To me, as your lawyer, I would so  
[21] advise you that if you're going to make modifi-  
[22] cations, then let the personnel system do what  
[23] the personnel system does, because you are  
[24] definitely going to find situations where an  
[25] aggrieved employee will exercise rights

[1] underneath that, but if they happen to be a  
[2] citizen, they'll exercise whatever rights they  
[3] have via the ethics ordinance.

[4] The other thing I would mention, too,  
[5] is if the Council is doing something wrong,  
[6] there are whistleblower protections. If  
[7] Councilman Fleming -- I'm going to pick on you  
[8] just because I'm looking at you. If Councilman  
[9] Fleming were absconding with money and Scott  
[10] Haeberle found out about it, he would be  
[11] protected by blowing the whistle on the  
[12] Councilman or any one of you if he found out  
[13] about that. So there are other rights out there  
[14] available to employees other than just those of  
[15] the ethics ordinance.

[16] Now, can you modify the ethics  
[17] ordinance to do exactly what you're talking  
[18] about? Sure, you can. There's nothing illegal  
[19] about it. But as your lawyer, I would advise  
[20] you to think about the risks that are inherent  
[21] with the expansion of the rights.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Would you  
[23] recommend, Mr. Murray -- or Mr. Weed --

[24] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I've been called worse,  
[25] Councilman. I've been called worse.

[1] anyone.

[2] **ATTORNEY WEED:** They don't have to be.  
[3] In other words, if it were the "city attorney's  
[4] world," I would suggest that that would be  
[5] perfectly fine with me.

[6] But once again, if you want to expand  
[7] folks' abilities to address grievances, you can.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Well, no. But I  
[9] think Ms. Alexander's question is they are held  
[10] to a standard ethically as documented here but  
[11] they don't have a recourse to file an ethics  
[12] complaint for the people that set the law to  
[13] hold them accountable ethically.

[14] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Councilman, all I can  
[15] say is legally you can do that. And whether  
[16] it's a good idea or not, that's always up to the  
[17] Council to decide.

[18] What I worry about for you is risk.  
[19] That's what you pay me to do is worry about  
[20] liability and risk.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And there  
[22] would be a great amount of risk in doing this.

[23] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That is my opinion.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Would there be  
[25] less risk to pull them out of the ethics

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I'm sure.

[2] Would you recommend, then, those two  
[3] residents that are also employees, treat them as  
[4] all other employees and let them come through  
[5] the process through the employee manual?

[6] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That's my advice.

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And that's the  
[8] motion.

[9] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I think that's the  
[10] safest thing for the City.

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** That's the  
[12] motion I made. Okay.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So why would  
[14] we not, then, subject their behavior under the  
[15] guise of the employee manual?

[16] Why do they have to be included in this  
[17] document if their behavior is already going to  
[18] be addressed in the employee manual and a  
[19] citizen that had a problem with an employee  
[20] could file a complaint with the department head  
[21] or the Mayor regarding that employee?

[22] Why do they have to be subject to this  
[23] document?

[24] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Are you asking me?

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I am asking

[1] ordinance altogether and have them fall  
[2] exclusively under the employment manual?

[3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, in my opinion,  
[4] because essentially if a citizen was aggrieved  
[5] of something an employee did, they also could go  
[6] and issue a complaint to the supervisor, the  
[7] department head, to the Mayor or even ultimately  
[8] to the Council, and I would assume the Council  
[9] and on down the line, someone would address that  
[10] complaint. So I think there is protection of  
[11] the citizenry against the employee through the  
[12] chain-of-command process that we have.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** But what happens  
[14] when that doesn't work? That's been a problem  
[15] recently -- that, frankly, all that's happened,  
[16] and it flat hasn't worked.

[17] The Ethics Commission or the ethics  
[18] ordinance gives the Mayor and the Council the  
[19] opportunity that if that part fails, that we  
[20] still have some sort of recourse.

[21] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Currently under the  
[22] policy, the Council could vote to discipline or  
[23] terminate any employee. They don't have to do  
[24] it through the Mayor, they don't have to do it  
[25] through a manager or department head. The

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[1] Council's got the direct-line authority over  
[2] every employee right now. So right now, if a  
[3] citizen were aggrieved, they could come before  
[4] the Council and say, "Oh, Joe Schmoe did  
[5] something to me," or, "He's taking money. Do  
[6] something about it." And, you know, they would  
[7] take their chances of getting sued, but they had  
[8] the courage to come forward to address you and  
[9] could, and I would assume you'd do something  
[10] about it at a minimum, you'd investigate it.  
[11] Now, once again, you can do all of  
[12] these things, and if you decide to do them, I  
[13] will craft an ordinance that effectively does  
[14] this.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But what we  
[16] want, Mr. Weed, is we want the most effective,  
[17] less liable product that we can get. Or that's  
[18] what I want.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** And is it your  
[20] opinion with what Mr. Spangler just said --  
[21] because I think we're all wanting that,  
[22] obviously. But in your opinion, do you feel  
[23] that we should not include the businesses even  
[24] though, I mean, in the very beginning, the  
[25] intent is to include the businesses?

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[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** As your lawyer, is it  
[2] legal to include the businesses? Yes.  
[3] Then the next question you've got to  
[4] decide is, who are the businesses? Are you  
[5] going to modify the occupation tax permits so  
[6] that they have to identify a human being that  
[7] will represent the company that starts the  
[8] ethics process? How are you going to build the  
[9] machine?  
[10] And you can do that, but you're going  
[11] to have to think about that. If it's a  
[12] partnership, can either partner represent the  
[13] company or does it have to be one of them  
[14] designated? If it's McDonald's and you're a  
[15] franchise, who represents the home office in  
[16] Saskatchewan, Canada, or are you going to have  
[17] them designate a local person to represent the  
[18] company when it files its ethics complaint?  
[19] So what I'm worried about with regard  
[20] to businesses is how expansive that could turn  
[21] out to be, because if you include one business,  
[22] you've got to include them all.  
[23] Can we do that? Can we structure an  
[24] ordinance to do that? Yes, we can.  
[25] But that's the working of it, and it's

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[1] not that easy, but you can modify the occupation  
[2] tax permit to designate somebody and that person  
[3] will be the person who carries it through the  
[4] system.  
[5] In answer to your question directly, do  
[6] I think it's a good idea to expand it to  
[7] businesses? No, ma'am, I don't. That's my city  
[8] attorney role. Once again, I want to try to  
[9] limit your risk.  
[10] Is it the right thing to do morally,  
[11] ethically for the citizenry? Maybe it is, but  
[12] that's not my decision.  
[13] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And it would  
[14] be not only the business owner or the partner  
[15] and the business owner. It would be all the  
[16] employees also.  
[17] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You have to decide.  
[18] You'll have to decide that.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Right. You  
[20] know, potentially -- so potentially, if you  
[21] walked in in McDonald's and you kind of were a  
[22] little ill or said something that they took the  
[23] wrong way, then they could bring an ethics  
[24] complaint against you.  
[25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Arguably, they could,

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[1] yes, sir. They have to get some -- they have to  
[2] say that they're representing the business, and  
[3] we would have to define what "the business" is.  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** What if you  
[5] opened the door the wrong way? They could  
[6] potentially --  
[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Who knows?  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Mr. Spangler, you had a  
[9] motion.  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes, sir, I  
[11] did.  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I really feel like  
[13] rather than making a motion changing one  
[14] particular item, let's set up a committee and do  
[15] a study on it rather than change it one item at  
[16] a time. But that's just a suggestion.  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, it's not  
[18] really making a change. I mean it's just an  
[19] amendment. I think Mr. Weed could do an amend-  
[20] ment or whatever.  
[21] You wouldn't have to change the whole  
[22] ordinance, would you, Mr. Weed?  
[23] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No, sir. I mean we do  
[24] have to write another ordinance, of course, to  
[25] amend it, but that's can be a two-pager.

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** It would be  
[2] more simple than having a committee and going  
[3] through and --

[4] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, I won't go that  
[5] far, Mr. Spangler. I mean that's up to the  
[6] Council to decide. If you want to open this  
[7] thing up and look at the entire engine, you can  
[8] do that. If you want to change the hub caps, we  
[9] can do that.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, Mayor,  
[11] you want me to withdraw my motion?

[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** No. I'm saying don't  
[13] you think rather than do it piecemeal, a little  
[14] bit at a time --

[15] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, I think  
[16] that --

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- we do the whole  
[18] thing at one time?

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I don't know  
[20] what else you need to change on it.

[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I don't know.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I mean I'm not  
[23] for making the City more liable, so I certainly  
[24] wouldn't entertain adding the businesses and the  
[25] employees of the businesses to be able to bring

[1] ordinance.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** But they could  
[3] file an ethics complaint as a citizen but not as  
[4] an employee; is that correct?

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** No.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** No.

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** They can't  
[8] file one at all.

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Not at all.

[10] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Under what's being  
[11] proposed, no.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But they can  
[13] go through --

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** The grievance  
[15] procedure.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** -- the  
[17] grievance steps.

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I still think  
[19] that if we look at the policy itself, I mean the  
[20] procedure, I mean if I'm the Ethics Commission  
[21] or committee and I receive an ethics complaint  
[22] against, since we're picking on Councilwoman  
[23] Fleming, whatever, the first thing the Ethics  
[24] Commission would do would be to say, "Is this an  
[25] employment matter or is this a citizen matter?"

[1] an ethics complaint against any City employee or  
[2] any member of government.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** So what is your  
[4] motion?

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** You know, my  
[6] motion originally was to simply take the two  
[7] employees that are citizens and not allow them  
[8] to do a citizens' ethics complaint but rather go  
[9] through the steps in the manual to address their  
[10] complaint.

[11] **ATTORNEY WEED:** If I might,  
[12] Mr. Spangler, not to single out the two  
[13] employees, because they could be 20 or 30. I  
[14] know you don't care how many. If we could just  
[15] broaden it to say "employees" and leave it at  
[16] that.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** That's fine.

[18] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I know that's your  
[19] intent.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** That's fine.

[21] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I know that's what you  
[22] mean.

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So now no  
[24] employees can file ethics complaints against us  
[25] but they are subject to the guidelines in this

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** It won't be  
[2] coming from an employee.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'm saying the  
[4] way it is today, if you have an employee that  
[5] lives inside the city, those two people --  
[6] there's only two people, apparently. I'd have  
[7] to stop and think who they are.

[8] Anyway, those people, if one of those  
[9] two people -- like I said, we're just narrowing  
[10] it down to what's possible right this minute --  
[11] just those two people -- if either of those two  
[12] people files an ethics complaint, the first  
[13] thing the Ethics Committee would do would be to  
[14] say, "Is this a personnel issue, personnel  
[15] grievance that would be handled through the  
[16] grievance process or is this something that is  
[17] an ethics complaint as a citizen? Is it because  
[18] they're a homeowner or because they feel like  
[19] they're being picked on because their car is  
[20] parked on the grass or something like that?"

[21] That's a different thing than being an  
[22] employee of the City.

[23] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Right now, the Ethics  
[24] Panel can't do that.

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.

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[1]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** Could the ordinance be  
[2] modified to allow them that initial judgment and  
[3] route the employee one way or the other?  
[4] Certainly.

[5]           **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I think that  
[6] would solve the problem, both issues.

[7]           **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** So there seems  
[8] to be some confusion. I'm not really big on  
[9] doing a committee and doing all that, but could  
[10] we maybe do a little further research and bring  
[11] it up the next time? Because there's a little  
[12] bit of question here, and I don't really want to  
[13] vote on it until I'm clear on it.

[14]           **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** That's fine.

[15]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, I'll  
[16] withdraw my motion and ask that we do a little  
[17] more study on this.

[18]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** I can give you a couple  
[19] of different ethics ordinances and maybe a  
[20] couple of different options and you can think  
[21] about that.

[22]           **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** That's good.  
[23] Thank you.

[24]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Very good.

[25]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** When can you

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[1] monitor the foreclosure public notices and  
[2] e-mail you guys when we have another list come  
[3] out.

[4]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And I believe  
[5] Mr. Weed was supposed to work on a couple/three  
[6] addresses for us?

[7]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, sir. The Mayor,  
[8] the Chief and I met last week and discussed it.  
[9] And we haven't completely formulated a list yet,  
[10] but we had an official meeting on it and we're  
[11] working towards that.

[12]           In fact, I've got a trial at 1:30  
[13] tomorrow on the Xu Dong property to abate the  
[14] public nuisance there.

[15]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** What about  
[16] there was a couple other parcels we talked  
[17] about. Did you --

[18]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** We're developing a list  
[19] right now, and I've --

[20]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** So that you --

[21]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- got a file.

[22]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** -- didn't work  
[23] on the -- there's two specific places that we  
[24] talked about, one on Clay and also the Star  
[25] Towers property?

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[1] get those to us, Mr. Weed?

[2]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Later this  
[3] week. By the end of the week.

[4]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay, Maria.

[5]           **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I will table  
[6] my agenda item --

[7]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do we need a motion on  
[8] that?

[9]           **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** -- for  
[10] further review.

[11]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

[12]           **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Item number 8  
[13] was property maintenance. We went over this at  
[14] the work session, how to address properties that  
[15] are in foreclosure that the grass needs cutting,  
[16] there are safety issues or whatever. Mr. Weed  
[17] made it very clear that we're going to have to  
[18] follow proper procedure and go through the  
[19] Quality of Life unit and issue citations and go  
[20] through the court system.

[21]           I guess the best thing would be for us  
[22] to be diligent, as we already are, and as soon  
[23] as you see a property that looks abandoned, to  
[24] go ahead and notify QOL so they can put it on a  
[25] list and start monitoring it. And I'll try to

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[1]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** The one on Clay, we've  
[2] already got a file started on that, but we  
[3] haven't done anything on Star Towers yet other  
[4] than we talked about it at our tripartite  
[5] meeting last week to come up with a plan of  
[6] action.

[7]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** I have the name of the  
[8] lawyer that's working on the Clay Drive  
[9] property. I'll get it to you tomorrow.

[10]           **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** And I believe  
[11] Star Towers has been cited?

[12]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes, they have been  
[13] cited.

[14]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** I did talk to Officer  
[15] Martin with regard to that property because  
[16] there's some issue about -- and I talked to  
[17] Rhonda about this, too, previously -- about just  
[18] because a person's got a permit, like a  
[19] demolition permit or even a construction permit,  
[20] that doesn't give them carte blanche to let the  
[21] property go. And so those cases are being  
[22] worked.

[23]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes, they are.

[24]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And I agree  
[25] with you, Ms. Alexander. I think we need all

[1] the help we can get. Anybody, any residents  
[2] that sees any of these properties, all they have  
[3] to do is call City Hall or call one of us and  
[4] let us know. We'll start working toward getting  
[5] the procedures in place.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And I did receive  
[7] a copy of the warnings issued against Star  
[8] Towers. There are several issues.

[9] And I think the 10 days ends either the  
[10] 8th or 9th. I don't have that.

[11] **CHIEF KING:** I'll get it up to you,  
[12] sir.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So on that day,  
[14] then all these things need to be corrected.

[15] **CHIEF KING:** We actually give them five  
[16] days, sir.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Is it five? I  
[18] could have sworn it was 10.

[19] **CHIEF KING:** It's five because this is  
[20] a reoccurring, ongoing problem, sir.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So much the  
[22] better. Thank you.

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** So Chief, are  
[24] we giving them a fine each time?

[25] **CHIEF KING:** I can't give them a fine,

[1] time frame is, quote/unquote, "reasonable  
[2] notice" which could be a day's notice.

[3] If you use your local code, there's a  
[4] 10-day notice rule in the local code.

[5] So how many days' notice depends upon  
[6] which tool you pull out of the tool box, whether  
[7] it's State law, local code, whatever.

[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Mr. Roche?

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes. Add gender  
[10] identity/expression to the non-discrimination  
[11] ordinance.

[12] Can I borrow a tee shirt for just one  
[13] second? At the bottom of this, it says  
[14] "Celebrating our Diversity."

[15] One way to be diverse is to not  
[16] discriminate against people, and last go-around  
[17] we added protections for gender identity and  
[18] essentially all this -- I'm sorry. That's  
[19] gender preference.

[20] Essentially all this does is add gender  
[21] identity.

[22] I'll read this first paragraph, Equal  
[23] Employment Opportunity. "The success of the  
[24] City depends upon the full and effective use of  
[25] all its human resources. The City will

[1] sir. All I can give them is a citation.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, a  
[3] citation's the same thing.

[4] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, sir.

[5] And we're working with the city  
[6] attorney and the court to try to come up with  
[7] what -- you know. We're mailing those citations  
[8] to their corporate office, and hopefully we'll  
[9] get a response, either us or the Mayor's office  
[10] will get a response.

[11] Basically, we want them to start doing  
[12] something.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Right.

[14] **CHIEF KING:** I think that's the wishes  
[15] of the Council.

[16] **ATTORNEY WEED:** And just for your  
[17] edification -- and we talked about it at the  
[18] work session, for people in the audience who  
[19] didn't hear us talk about it before, very  
[20] briefly -- which nuisance abatement tool you  
[21] use, the time frames may vary.

[22] For a public nuisance, one such as you  
[23] have a hotel and one whole half of the building  
[24] is gone and people are in there renting rooms,  
[25] something that's a public nuisance, then the

[1] therefore provide equal employment opportunities  
[2] without regard to race, color, religion, sex,  
[3] national origin, age, disability, veteran or  
[4] familial status, sexual orientation, gender  
[5] identity and any other characteristic protected  
[6] by law."

[7] And this relates to all aspects of  
[8] employee employment, blah-blah-blah-blah.

[9] Atlanta, Georgia, and Decatur has  
[10] already passed something very similar to this.  
[11] This is a list of all the other municipalities  
[12] and et cetera that have done this.

[13] And I ask that we waive the first  
[14] reading and pass this ordinance. I make a  
[15] motion that we waive first reading on -- I don't  
[16] know what it's called -- the ordinance to  
[17] protect gender identity.

[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Second.

[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I guess I had  
[22] spoken to Councilman Bates and the city attorney  
[23] and Councilman Pittman and Fleming today, and I  
[24] just had some concerns on page 5.

[25] I do understand there's a stipulation

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[1] in here where the employee is to notify the City  
[2] of their intent, but there's no, I guess, caveat  
[3] of our being prepared. And again, I thought we  
[4] were going to have some training before we  
[5] passed this, and I just -- enlighten us.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, I want to  
[7] back up a little bit.

[8] We had a meeting. I don't remember the  
[9] exact date. At the meeting was the Mayor,  
[10] myself, Attorney Weed, Chief King; Cole Thaler  
[11] who is from Lambda Legal, who specializes in  
[12] this particular stuff. And Mr. Bates will have  
[13] to help me with --

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Jeff Graham.

[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Jeff Graham from  
[16] Georgia Equality and Carol Stephens.

[17] And at the end of the meeting, we  
[18] decided three things. First of all, we decided  
[19] we would go ahead and add this language to the  
[20] employment manual that's being worked on by  
[21] Attorney Weed. We also agreed that Mr. Thaler  
[22] and -- I'll never remember his name -- we're  
[23] going to provide people that basically do  
[24] sensitivity training. So we have those names,  
[25] which I did pass along to the Mayor, and the

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[1] Mayor was going to schedule employee sensitivity  
[2] training. And my part was the easy part. All I  
[3] had to do is bring up the motion at the meeting.

[4] So yes, there will be training.

[5] One of the first things that  
[6] Mr. Thaler said -- and Mr. Thaler is an attorney  
[7] and, again, he does specialize in this -- is  
[8] that basically, essentially you start with the  
[9] ordinance. You know, like everything else, we  
[10] start with the ordinance. Or not everything,  
[11] but with most things you start with the  
[12] ordinance and then you develop your policy as  
[13] you go.

[14] We're in the process of rewriting our  
[15] employee handbook, anyway, so it's fairly simple  
[16] to just incorporate this into that. And I know  
[17] there are some questions going back and forth,  
[18] but, you know, personally I'm satisfied that I  
[19] don't think there's going to be anything really  
[20] weird going on and people changing clothes every  
[21] half hour and all that sort of thing -- except  
[22] maybe on Halloween, so --

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I do not wish  
[24] for our city to discriminate against anyone, and  
[25] I am in favor of the ordinance, but this is just

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[1] identifying employees, and we have public  
[2] facilities that I'm concerned about.

[3] If we are going to be a city of  
[4] nondiscrimination, I feel that we should have  
[5] unisex bathrooms in all city buildings including  
[6] the pool area as well as the arena area, and if  
[7] there are locker rooms in any of the buildings,  
[8] the City buildings, there should be a unisex  
[9] locker room as well.

[10] The reason why I say this, I am very  
[11] concerned about the public welfare as well,  
[12] particularly the children that are involved in  
[13] the pool area as well as at the arena.

[14] So I would suggest that I know that we  
[15] start with an ordinance and then we go on to  
[16] policy. This is addressing our employees. But  
[17] we as a council need to be thinking about our  
[18] buildings and our infrastructure and how we're  
[19] going to accommodate the gender-preferenced  
[20] people as far as that so we do not discriminate  
[21] against them.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, we would  
[23] handle that as a separate thing from this.

[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. You made a  
[25] motion?

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Uh-huh, and I've  
[2] got a second.

[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Call the roll.

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I --

[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Excuse me.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So we still  
[7] -- I mean I understand your point, Mr. Weed, but  
[8] I believe Mr. Thaler, am I correct, suggested a  
[9] time period?

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** In speaking with  
[11] Mr. Thaler today, he indicated that putting a  
[12] notification time period was acceptable, not  
[13] required. So if the Council wants to add in a  
[14] time period on the notification clause, I  
[15] believe that that's acceptable.

[16] Mr. Weed, can you --

[17] **ATTORNEY WEED:** It's not a legal --  
[18] What you're about to do is expand a group of  
[19] rights to potential employees and employees.  
[20] There's no precedent for it other than some  
[21] other jurisdictions have done it. It's not  
[22] mandated.

[23] It's your choice. And because it's  
[24] your choice, you can create a time frame or not  
[25] and you can put in that time frame however much

[1] time you care to.  
[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Our ordinance  
[3] is more expansive than those other ordinances  
[4] that were used as examples?  
[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That is my opinion.  
[6] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, that's not  
[7] the opinion I got from Mr. Thaler.  
[8] I would be happy to add in a 30-day  
[9] notification that any employee that wishes to  
[10] present as a different gender would have to give  
[11] 30 days' notice to their supervisor before doing  
[12] so. Would that make it okay?  
[13] So I'm not sure how we do this in terms  
[14] of motions and everything because I made -- the  
[15] motion was a first reading, so --  
[16] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, let's talk that  
[17] over briefly.  
[18] My opinion is since you've got -- you  
[19] have these duplicative agendas, you've already  
[20] had the first reading because it already  
[21] appeared on one agenda and you already discussed  
[22] it. So I don't even think you have to waive  
[23] first reading, although that's a motion and a  
[24] second. We can either redo that or not. So I  
[25] think you've got that part covered.

[1] simplest. I missed that part.  
[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So we don't  
[3] want to put the Mayor or the department head?  
[4] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I would rather not have  
[5] notices going around to different people. I'd  
[6] rather have the Mayor as the chief executive  
[7] officer getting the notice, personally. That's  
[8] my recommendation.  
[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And we're going  
[10] to add 30 days' notice.  
[11] Do I need to restate all that?  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You got it, Rhonda?  
[13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** I got it.  
[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We need a second.  
[16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Oh, yeah. We don't  
[17] have a second. I'm sorry.  
[18] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** I think  
[19] Mr. Bates seconded it.  
[20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Oh, I seconded  
[21] the first reading.  
[22] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Right.  
[23] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I have not  
[24] seconded a second motion. So I will second the  
[25] new motion.

[1] But then with regard to making a  
[2] modification, you might want to just go ahead  
[3] and pass that motion and then make another  
[4] motion to adopt. And when you make a motion to  
[5] adopt, say, "With the change of including a 30-  
[6] day time frame," and then I'll whip out the  
[7] change tomorrow and send it in.  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay. I'll  
[9] withdraw the original motion for the first  
[10] reading and I will make a motion that we modify  
[11] the current version to add a 30-day notice where  
[12] an employee must give 30 days' notice to his  
[13] manager.  
[14] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** It says in  
[15] writing to the Mayor, so can we --  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And in writing to  
[17] the Mayor.  
[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Mayor and  
[19] department head?  
[20] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I'd like to leave it as  
[21] the Mayor because he's the central --  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** That's fine.  
[23] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- focal point.  
[24] I didn't mean to cut you off.  
[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Whatever is

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.  
[2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[3] Alexander?  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
[5] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
[6] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
[7] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
[9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
[11] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
[13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[14] Spangler?  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And I'd like to  
[17] make a motion that we adopt this ordinance with  
[18] the changes that were made a minute ago.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I thought  
[20] that's what --  
[21] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** That's what we  
[22] just did.  
[23] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** -- we just  
[24] did.  
[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Oh, did we? I'm

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[1] sorry. I thought -- okay.  
[2] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Oh, I heard it that you  
[3] withdrew your first motion, that was --  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- okay, and then you  
[6] made a different motion.  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I thought I  
[8] needed two motions. Sorry. But thank you very  
[9] much.  
[10] The second thing that I had was move  
[11] citizen comments to the beginning of the  
[12] Council/work session meetings.  
[13] I had a discussion with a citizen a  
[14] couple months ago or maybe six weeks ago who had  
[15] attended a meeting in a different jurisdiction.  
[16] He was very impressed by the --  
[17] It was Norcross, wasn't it,  
[18] Mr. Livingston?  
[19] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** Yes.  
[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And he was very  
[21] impressed by what they do is at the very  
[22] beginning of the meeting, the citizens are  
[23] allowed to come up, and they have their three  
[24] minutes or their five minutes or whatever and  
[25] they can discuss or give their opinions on

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[1] whatever was on the agenda or whether it was on  
[2] the agenda or not.  
[3] And that way, when the meeting began,  
[4] the council was already kind of fully briefed on  
[5] what people were thinking, et cetera, et cetera.  
[6] And then during the course of the  
[7] meeting, there was --  
[8] Were citizens actually allowed to make  
[9] comments during the course of the meeting?  
[10] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** No. Just at the  
[11] first.  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Just at the  
[13] beginning of the meeting.  
[14] So I discussed it with the Mayor I  
[15] think a week later after one of those Friday  
[16] afternoon meetings. And I guess I thought I had  
[17] a buy-in on that but maybe I don't. But --  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, I --  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- we discussed  
[20] this during the work session.  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I wanted to look at it,  
[22] yes.  
[23] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We discussed this  
[24] at the work session. To be honest, I figured  
[25] since it was a work session, now people have had

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[1] a week to think about it.  
[2] I can see a lot of benefits to it.  
[3] You know, a lot of people have  
[4] expressed frustration to me that by the time we  
[5] get around to citizen comments, it's 11:30 and  
[6] everyone's asleep and trying to get out of here,  
[7] et cetera, et cetera. And by then, we've  
[8] already made our votes and passed everything,  
[9] and it's kind of late in the day to make citizen  
[10] comments, so --  
[11] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** My suggestion  
[12] -- I think I expressed this at the work session  
[13] -- was to have citizens sign up for particular  
[14] agenda items that they want to speak on so they  
[15] can speak on it as we go through the agenda  
[16] rather than at the beginning, because at the  
[17] beginning, they don't really know what we're  
[18] potentially going to be saying. And I think if  
[19] we could follow the format of having them sign  
[20] up for each agenda item when they walk in the  
[21] door, then if we're talking about recycling,  
[22] they can express themselves about that, which  
[23] does not limit someone that feels like they  
[24] really have to have a comment about it. That's  
[25] just my suggestion.

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I would tend to  
[2] concur with Ms. Pittman. My concern with having  
[3] citizens' comments only at the beginning -- and  
[4] I understand there would be an opportunity  
[5] during discussion items, would be if we say or  
[6] do something stupid up here, which happens  
[7] somewhat frequently; at least on my end, it does  
[8] -- there wouldn't be an opportunity for anybody  
[9] to comment on it at the end of the meeting.  
[10] I think we need to provide that  
[11] opportunity for the citizens to express their  
[12] concerns, their frustrations, their accolades,  
[13] their thoughts to us after we're done  
[14] pontificating up here rather than before.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, actually I  
[16] made a speech to someone two days ago --  
[17] actually, last Friday. It was a business  
[18] situation, and I talked about evolutionary  
[19] change versus revolutionary change.  
[20] And I would be okay. Since number four  
[21] passed and we're back to two meetings a month,  
[22] you know, I guess for the moment let's try and  
[23] see how that works, and then if we're still  
[24] having problems, then we can do adjustments  
[25] later.

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I really do

[3] like Ms. Pittman's suggestion about signing up

[4] for the agenda item because that way we can get

[5] feedback from them before we make any of our

[6] motions.

[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** During. During.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I'm sorry?

[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** During when we're --

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Absolutely.

[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** And then still

[13] at the end for the final comments as well.

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And I agree

[15] too, Mr. Roche.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** That's fine.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** If we had

[18] citizens' comments at the beginning of the

[19] meeting, you know, some of the citizens may not

[20] be aware of what is actually going to be

[21] discussed during the agenda.

[22] But I still think that they should be

[23] allowed to, at any point in time, like

[24] Ms. Pittman said, get on the agenda for that

[25] particular item and then everybody should be

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.

[2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[3] Alexander?

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Councilmember

[6] Bates?

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.

[8] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.

[10] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.

[12] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.

[14] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[15] Spangler?

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Mr. Scott?

[18] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** The planning and zoning

[19] fees, we did introduce that concept. It's

[20] something we're still working on and still

[21] researching, the existing fees that you have in

[22] the city codes. So at this time, there would be

[23] no action required on that item. We will bring

[24] it back to you again when we have a more

[25] cohesive set of items to present to you that

[1] able to comment again.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Anything we can

[3] do to improve, you know, being able to get

[4] feedback from citizens.

[5] So if would you like to make that

[6] motion --

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Sure.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- I'll second

[9] it.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I'd like to

[11] make the motion that we allow citizens to sign

[12] up according to the agenda items that they want

[13] to speak on, which does not limit them to

[14] speaking if they feel they have the necessity an

[15] speaking at the end with comments about what

[16] transpired.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Three minutes or

[18] five minutes?

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** My preference

[20] would be three minutes.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'll second that.

[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?

[23] ---

[24] (No response)

[25] ---

[1] could be adopted.

[2] The next item is building permits. And

[3] as we went through last time, we need in our

[4] tool bag an array of tools to manage the

[5] permitting process and to not only do that but

[6] expand our database of information that we have.

[7] The structure location plan

[8] requirements for receiving a residential

[9] building permit application. This is a

[10] necessary tool particularly with our parti-

[11] cipation in FEMA and it is one of the tools that

[12] we can link planning and zoning with building

[13] inspections and permitting.

[14] Right now, we have failures that are

[15] occurring or potential failures as a result of

[16] not having accurate information.

[17] You guys did receive two drafts of

[18] this. I want to draw attention, if you have the

[19] two drafts, that on page three, the last

[20] sentence under three right above the item A,

[21] "Unsealed, e.g., hand-drawn, instruments will

[22] not be accepted." That is the corrected

[23] version, that previously there was a

[24] typographical error that said "instructions"

[25] rather than "instruments."

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Scott, correct me  
[2] if I'm wrong, but this is residential only; is  
[3] that correct?  
[4] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Correct. We already  
[5] have effective management tools in place for the  
[6] nonresidential applications.  
[7] **MR. ANDERSON:** No hand-drawns for  
[8] residential? It has to be professional?  
[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Excuse me just a  
[10] minute. Did you read the notice I put out?  
[11] Would you come up to the microphone and  
[12] identify yourself, sir? Mr. Crawford?  
[13] **MR. CRAWFORD:** I didn't say anything.  
[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** It wasn't.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Mr. Anderson.  
[16] **MR. ANDERSON:** It was me.  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** It was Mr.  
[18] Anderson.  
[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Oh. Go ahead.  
[20] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** This is a reasonable  
[21] expectation. It is something --  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I apologize, Mr.  
[23] Crawford.  
[24] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** -- that we ask for from  
[25] our nonresidential folks. Well, again, we want

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[1] to be for certain that we're issuing permits  
[2] that are correct and that follow through in the  
[3] field as being correct.  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So this would  
[5] preclude hand-drawn sketches.  
[6] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That is correct.  
[7] There is really no way for an  
[8] individual to calculate impervious for any  
[9] certainty. There's no way for an individual to  
[10] locate the hundred-year flood plain or other  
[11] very important items with any degree of  
[12] certainty.  
[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, if someone  
[14] already has a house and they just want to put a  
[15] shed in the back yard, do they have to go out  
[16] and get a full-blown --  
[17] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That's correct. That  
[18] is correct. They would be required.  
[19] We don't have any archival data on  
[20] existing structures in the city, and that,  
[21] again, is a failure because we are merely  
[22] guessing when we issue a permit. We don't know  
[23] for any certainty due to the age of these  
[24] structures where that house is actually sitting.  
[25] Is the existing structure nonconforming to begin

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[1] with?  
[2] We do have to enforce the distance  
[3] requirements between the principal structure and  
[4] the accessory structure. We have to ensure that  
[5] there's no more than two accessory structures --  
[6] a detached garage and, say, perhaps a utility  
[7] building. So there's --  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I got that.  
[9] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** -- a wide parameter.  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Let me rephrase  
[11] that. I mean my house is fairly recently built,  
[12] so I have the little plat, drawing or whatever.  
[13] And if I decided I wanted to put a little shed  
[14] back there, can I just say, "It's going to go  
[15] there," or do I have to go and pay to have a  
[16] whole new drawing done with it?  
[17] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** If you have existing  
[18] data from a survey source, you should be able to  
[19] go to that surveyor and have a minor revision  
[20] done to it to update that item.  
[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay.  
[22] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That is not the  
[23] majority of the structures in the city.  
[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I understand.  
[25] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And what would

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[1] be the expense of, say, having the surveyor add  
[2] that?  
[3] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Well, I don't know. On  
[4] replats, I'll tell you that I have a residential  
[5] building lot myself which is not unlike the  
[6] 10,200 square feet that's pretty much in the  
[7] city, and I paid an individual about \$350 to do  
[8] an as-built survey.  
[9] And again, this is an item not just for  
[10] us but also you have to think of it as well for  
[11] future purchasers of that dwelling, is that they  
[12] come and through the open records requests  
[13] review building permit applications and obtain  
[14] information. As you know, closings in Georgia  
[15] now occur very routinely without any sort of  
[16] instruments that plot or locate the structure.  
[17] So it is a long-term benefit not only for us as  
[18] a city but for our residents as well.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Are we going to  
[20] start storing these so that --  
[21] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Yes, sir. Uh-huh.  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So you need us to  
[23] pass this; correct?  
[24] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Yes, sir.  
[25] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** This does not

[1] include putting a deck on the back of your house  
[2] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That would include.  
[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I mean I think  
[4] it's the right thing to do, but I mean I'm just  
[5] a little concerned about that, but I don't know  
[6] how else --

[7] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Well, there's so many  
[8] dynamics to permitting and there's so many  
[9] dynamics to your zoning code, and the other  
[10] intervening factors such as FEMA participation  
[11] that, you know, really we're at this point, and  
[12] we have progressed as a city. It's required in  
[13] most other metropolitan areas. It's a protec-  
[14] tion not only for us as a city but the homeowner  
[15] as well.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I mean I don't  
[17] see how we can not do this. I guess I'm just a  
[18] little concerned about the impact it may have on  
[19] some people.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Okay. My  
[21] question is say like you had to go and you had  
[22] to do this, and it cost you \$350 because you  
[23] wanted to have your driveway expanded. Okay?  
[24] So then six months later, you want to add a  
[25] storage shed put on the back of your lot, so

[1] edu- -- and would there be any grace period  
[2] before this went into effect? Because we're  
[3] going to have a lot of shocked homeowners when  
[4] they come in here to get a permit to build a  
[5] deck and they have to find out they have to  
[6] spend another \$400 to get a survey done.

[7] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** You know, my preference  
[8] would be effective upon adoption, and I'll tell  
[9] you why: because every day, we're encountering  
[10] greater and greater difficulty, and the degree  
[11] of the information that myself, that the City  
[12] Clerk and also, too, the Building Inspector are  
[13] finding is extreme -- is of extreme concern to  
[14] me. So you know, I would not provide for any  
[15] sort of grace period. That would be my  
[16] recommendation to you.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And this would  
[18] be for new projects from the point of adoption  
[19] on, any new project whether it be a deck,  
[20] storage building, driveway?

[21] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Yes, sir.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Okay. So  
[23] anything that's already been done with the hand-  
[24] drawn maps or plats, whatever you want to call  
[25] them, would be okay.

[1] would you have to do it again?

[2] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Yes, sir. You would go  
[3] back to that individual who prepared the item,  
[4] and they could do a brief revision to the  
[5] existing data that they already have plotted.

[6] And I mean as your -- as you may not be  
[7] aware, right now the situation is the individual  
[8] goes out in the field and looks at existing  
[9] situations but those situations are not  
[10] accurately reflected on any sort of survey. So  
[11] from a perspective of potential liability for  
[12] the City, we're just -- we don't have accurate  
[13] information, and we are wanting to permit things  
[14] based upon the best available information that  
[15] we can get.

[16] Again, that would be a sealed item. So  
[17] that sealed item would go back to the individual  
[18] who prepared the item.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I'll move that we  
[20] pass the ordinance as written.

[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?  
[22] Second?

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'll second it.

[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So we need to

[1] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Well, anything that has  
[2] already been completed.

[3] In other words, a permit that is in  
[4] progress obviously would have some sort of  
[5] vesting, a received application.

[6] But when we're talking application,  
[7] yes, we're requiring it for new construction,  
[8] also to additions or renovations. So if  
[9] somebody came in tomorrow and wanted to make an  
[10] application to add onto their house, this would  
[11] be a requirement.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I would be more  
[13] comfortable if we allowed a one-year term of the  
[14] plat design or the drawing because there may be  
[15] some homeowners that want to do more than one  
[16] item but right now they're just doing a driveway  
[17] and then two months from now they want to do a  
[18] deck on their back yard, that's attached to  
[19] their home.

[20] I just feel that they should be able to  
[21] use the same drawing that they did initially and  
[22] that should, for instance, hold over for a  
[23] period of one year. I don't know. Something  
[24] other than -- like Mr. Spangler said, it was  
[25] everything that they do, they'll have to go back

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[1] and be spending more money to get an updated  
 [2] drawing done.  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Or perhaps,  
 [4] Ms. Fleming, if they knew they were going to do  
 [5] several things or three things, then maybe they  
 [6] could have it all done at one time and then come  
 [7] before the City Clerk and get each permit and  
 [8] use the same document.  
 [9] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** There would be nothing  
 [10] to preclude, as you say, phased development.  
 [11] They would identify that, you know, they have a  
 [12] deck, a garage or whatever, you know, they're  
 [13] doing this throughout the next 14 months or  
 [14] whenever they're going to do these items. They  
 [15] include them on a survey.  
 [16] There'll be nothing that would preclude  
 [17] phase. So yes. I mean those folks who are  
 [18] planning major renovation projects would have an  
 [19] opportunity to do this all at one time.  
 [20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Just curious, I  
 [21] mean. I'm looking for a rough estimate or no  
 [22] estimate at all. We budgeted about \$500,000  
 [23] income this year for building permits. About  
 [24] how much of that would normally be for  
 [25] residential? 10%, 5 percent, 40 percent, 90

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[1] percent?  
 [2] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Yours is such a  
 [3] different developed metropolitan area than I'm  
 [4] used to working in. I'll be honest with you.  
 [5] Everything I am seeing is renovation. We have  
 [6] not seen a new residential building permit since  
 [7] I've been here.  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
 [9] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Without knowing more  
 [10] information on your past situation, I wouldn't  
 [11] want to project that. I don't think I could  
 [12] provide you with correct information.  
 [13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So other than  
 [14] adding on, like you said, a deck or adding a  
 [15] wing or adding a structure, I mean they wouldn't  
 [16] -- if they wanted to renovate the inside the  
 [17] house, obviously they wouldn't need the -- would  
 [18] they need this drawing?  
 [19] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** The interior would have  
 [20] no impact on it --  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
 [22] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** -- as long as they're  
 [23] not changing the footprint.  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Ms. Blackmon,  
 [25] do you have to have a permit to replace a

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[1] driveway?  
 [2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Yes.  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So replacing a  
 [4] driveway would --  
 [5] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So my project  
 [6] just went up \$400.  
 [7] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Well, one of the items  
 [8] that we discussed last time is the city is a  
 [9] stormwater utility. At some point, we're going  
 [10] to have to have effective management of how much  
 [11] of these lots are impervious.  
 [12] Your residential districts are very  
 [13] weak right now. They just talk about the  
 [14] building footprint. Well, what about all the  
 [15] blacktop areas? What about all the accessory  
 [16] structures, et cetera? We're going to need to  
 [17] manage that. And how many of these properties  
 [18] already are over that threshold? Without  
 [19] accurate information, we really can't tell that.  
 [20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Can I make a  
 [21] friendly amendment to say that this would take  
 [22] effect at the beginning of the year, at least  
 [23] give people two months' notice?  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I'm not inclined  
 [25] to accept it. I appreciate the concern, but the

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[1] longer we push this off along with our  
 [2] ordinances and our zoning and things like that,  
 [3] the worse it's going to be or the more  
 [4] exacerbated it's going to be.  
 [5] - - -  
 [6] (Applause)  
 [7] - - -  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** That's fine. I  
 [9] guess I tend to agree with you. My only point  
 [10] is that suddenly waking up -- you know, people  
 [11] are going to wake up tomorrow and suddenly, as  
 [12] you've said, we've got additional --  
 [13] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I --  
 [14] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'm just trying  
 [15] to look for a way to soften the blow a little  
 [16] bit instead of slamming it.  
 [17] I agree with you completely. It's just  
 [18] a matter of --  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And I appreciate  
 [20] that, and I'm caught because I am going to be in  
 [21] that scenario as well down the road.  
 [22] I just don't see putting it --  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'll withdraw the  
 [24] amendment. No problem.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And what was

[1] your -- what did you ask the --

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I was just going

[3] to say that would, you know, give people

[4] basically 60 days of lead time before this took

[5] effect, just so they will know instead of waking

[6] up tomorrow and "surprise."

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, could we

[8] put a letter out to all the residents, you know,

[9] give a couple weeks' notice?

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We need to do

[11] that anyway.

[12] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** I think that if you

[13] adopt this, it would be in our best interest to

[14] load a signed copy of the ordinance onto the web

[15] site. That's an effective communication tool.

[16] And I don't think that a letter to each home

[17] owner -- again, we're assuming we're actually

[18] going to reach the home owner. The web site is

[19] the best way to provide information.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But you know,

[21] how many of us home owners are going to read it

[22] on the web site? You know, I mean in the past

[23] they have not had to do so.

[24] So yeah, I'm all for giving them a

[25] little bit of notice and maybe a little bit of a

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Could you do

[2] all three?

[3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I'm sorry, sir?

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Letter to the

[5] home, advertisement in the newspaper and on the

[6] web?

[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You could.

[8] And the only other thing I would

[9] suggest is that you might want to say at this

[10] meeting, we put it in the ad and we put it on

[11] the web site, that, you know, "Our failure to

[12] contact you --" Of course ignorance of the law

[13] is no excuse.

[14] Help me write the letter.

[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** You put it in the

[16] letter and say, "If you don't receive this

[17] letter, it's not our fault."

[18] **ATTORNEY WEED:** "Sorry. It's not our

[19] fault."

[20] That's exactly what I'll do.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And then

[22] obviously the newsletter will reflect this too.

[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. On the motion,

[24] where are we?

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** And I guess I

[1] notification.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I agree. I

[3] think maybe the web site's a great idea but also

[4] a letter to the home owners because there are

[5] people that do not go to the web site.

[6] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Can I make a suggestion

[7] on that?

[8] I admire your consciousness. What I'm

[9] worried about a little bit is enforcement. You

[10] know, we can send it out to the residences but

[11] if someone finds themselves -- well, they can

[12] always say, "I didn't get the letter."

[13] So what I would recommend is running an

[14] ad in the newspaper and posting it on the web

[15] site because the newspaper is usually considered

[16] to be adequate notice for virtually anything,

[17] and, that way, you've done -- certainly you've

[18] done what the law would require even though the

[19] law doesn't require you to do that. It's above

[20] and beyond, anyway.

[21] But why I'm worried about sending

[22] individual letters to homes, you know, I'm just

[23] worried that someone's going to turn up and say,

[24] "I didn't get a letter. How can you enforce

[25] this against me?"

[1] assume under Section 3, you get a set of

[2] drawings in here from a State-certified

[3] engineer, you're going to go down each one of

[4] these 20-something tic items and you're going to

[5] tic off if they don't have those items on the

[6] drawing?

[7] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** You're correct. And

[8] it'll be our duty to notify that individual of

[9] the items that need corrected. And I personally

[10] feel that having conversation with the person

[11] who prepared the item is probably the most

[12] effective way to getting it corrected.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So anyone

[14] that comes for a building permit has to be given

[15] a copy of this.

[16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** (Nods head) I can

[17] also post it at the front counter, a permanent

[18] one that's there.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** With all of the

[20] items that are listed, as Ms. Alexander

[21] mentioned, on page 3 or 3 and 4, these items

[22] should only be checked off on the first go-round

[23] as far as I'm concerned.

[24] And that land survey, if you're looking

[25] for all of these things because you're concerned

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[1] about the land area for that home or the flood  
[2] plain or the stormwater, then I can't understand  
[3] why you would need it again for an additional  
[4] item that they wanted to build.  
[5] You know, I just feel that the survey  
[6] should at least be available for at least a year  
[7] if not -- I mean because the stormwater's not  
[8] going to change in a year, or the impervious  
[9] structure or the land development there is not  
[10] going to change in a year's time.  
[11] I just would feel more comfortable if  
[12] they only had to provide one and then came back  
[13] with an amendment to it, maybe.  
[14] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Well, for  
[15] example, item B, "The recorded subdivision name,  
[16] phase, pod and unit shall be shown." Well, our  
[17] subdivision was built in like 1960. I don't  
[18] think they even had phases.  
[19] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Again, that's if  
[20] present.  
[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So if  
[22] present.  
[23] So "shall," as several people in the  
[24] audience would say, means "must."  
[25] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** If any.

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[1] And again, you can't do something that  
[2] isn't present. It might not be a part of a  
[3] recorded subdivision.  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** So would it  
[5] make a difference, I mean if she did what she  
[6] said? I just kind of like that idea.  
[7] Nothing's going to change, right, in a  
[8] year?  
[9] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** If somebody is  
[10] proposing phase development and they represent  
[11] all those items and they, for example, put an X  
[12] over those items that they want to do at this  
[13] point in time, I don't have a problem with that,  
[14] and they phase it out over the next so many --  
[15] you know, the year or coming year.  
[16] "This time, my building permit is for a  
[17] driveway. Later on, I'm going to be coming back  
[18] for a deck, et cetera." So as long as it's  
[19] actually depicted, phasing is -- that's not a  
[20] concern to me because it achieves our objective  
[21] regardless.  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
[23] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I like that  
[24] idea better.  
[25] **CLERK BLACKMON:** But they all need to

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[1] be listed on the first one we get; correct?  
[2] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Correct.  
[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, but once  
[4] you get the -- I mean whoever your engineer is,  
[5] whoever does the drawing, once they get that  
[6] first drawing, like I said, if I want to build a  
[7] shed, I wouldn't think they were going to charge  
[8] me the whole amount just to say draw an X right  
[9] there, because I just pull up the old drawing.  
[10] It's like a Word document. You just make your  
[11] change and --  
[12] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That's correct.  
[13] **ATTORNEY WEED:** If this is helpful,  
[14] most alcohol beverage ordinances have -- the  
[15] state law has certain distance requirements to  
[16] certain locations. Many alcohol beverage  
[17] ordinances make the people every year that they  
[18] resubmit an application, they still have to  
[19] resubmit a survey. They don't have to  
[20] completely redo the survey but they've got to  
[21] have an update to see if a church got built  
[22] right next door to them.  
[23] And that's really for their protection  
[24] because they're grandfathered in if they were  
[25] there before the church, for example. But

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[1] nobody knows that, and the church might try to  
[2] close them down unless you have the survey to  
[3] begin with. And that never costs as much as the  
[4] original survey in my experience.  
[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I mean the first  
[6] go-round, yes, it will be more painful, but  
[7] after that --  
[8] Where are we? Did we second it?  
[9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** I have a motion and a  
[10] second but we have not voted.  
[11] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** What was the  
[12] motion?  
[13] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** To pass it.  
[14] **CLERK BLACKMON:** To pass the ordinance.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** To adopt the  
[16] ordinance.  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But there were  
[18] some changes that were discussed.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** No changes.  
[20] **CLERK BLACKMON:** As is.  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Are we ready? Call the  
[22] roll.  
[23] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[24] Alexander?  
[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.

[1] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
 [2] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
 [3] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** No.  
 [5] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
 [6] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [7] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
 [9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [10] Spangler?  
 [11] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** No.  
 [12] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Motion carried 4 to 2.  
 [13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you. Thank you.  
 [14] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Did we skip  
 [15] item 12?  
 [16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Yes. You skipped --  
 [17] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Subdivisions.  
 [18] **CLERK BLACKMON:** -- subdivision  
 [19] guidelines.  
 [20] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Oh, okay. I apologize.  
 [21] The other item before you is  
 [22] subdivision guidelines. Right now, in effect,  
 [23] you don't have any. There's been an ad hoc  
 [24] process through the years of taking from parts  
 [25] of the Dekalb County ordinances and other

[1] issuing authority there are certain thresholds  
 [2] that I want to be careful that we not meet.  
 [3] For the most part, three building lots  
 [4] would not exceed the one-acre threshold, and so  
 [5] we've got some safety factors built in there on  
 [6] a minor plat.  
 [7] We did not provide for dedication of  
 [8] right-of-ways on minor plats, for example.  
 [9] Those are things that would be handled on major  
 [10] subdivision plats that would go to the City  
 [11] Council. A minor plat would be an item that  
 [12] will be reviewed administratively with the  
 [13] assistance of Dekalb County for tax I.D.'s,  
 [14] addresses, et cetera, but it is reviewed  
 [15] administratively in-house and then approved for  
 [16] recording, again based on the parameters that's  
 [17] been set forth in the definition. So it is  
 [18] fairly restrictive.  
 [19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Comments from the  
 [20] table?  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Give me an  
 [22] example of a minor plat.  
 [23] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** A minor plat. Three  
 [24] building lots where there is no need for septic,  
 [25] there is no need for right-of-way dedication,

[1] jurisdictions, that's not really been a  
 [2] management process.  
 [3] Since I've been here, approximately a  
 [4] month, I've had over five questions on minor  
 [5] plats. This is becoming more and more common  
 [6] with in-fill development, which we're going to  
 [7] continue to experience. And so we simply need  
 [8] to adopt a process for subdivision regulations  
 [9] beginning with the minor plat.  
 [10] And the minor plat we define in the  
 [11] definition phase that we adopted recently with  
 [12] M1/M2. We also added several definitions. This  
 [13] is just one of the first items in the  
 [14] definitions, which is minor subdivision, and of  
 [15] course there's a major subdivision. There's a  
 [16] provision for a residential subdivision, a  
 [17] combination plat, which is taking two tax  
 [18] parcels and adding them together.  
 [19] So this is the first step in what will  
 [20] be a much more lengthy version of your own  
 [21] unique subdivision regulations, which then we  
 [22] will use as guidelines to review applications  
 [23] for lot splits.  
 [24] Most of the minor subdivision was  
 [25] really drawn from the fact that as a local

[1] there is no need for the creation of a new  
 [2] street. So you have a simple -- you have a  
 [3] piece of property in the city that would meet  
 [4] the codes to split it out into three lots  
 [5] without obtaining any variances whatsoever. It  
 [6] would simply be drawn out by a surveyor,  
 [7] presented to the city planner, reviewed in-house  
 [8] based on the criteria here. When it was ready  
 [9] for approval, then it would be signed off and  
 [10] they would go and record it.  
 [11] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And the maximum  
 [12] size of the property that would qualify for a  
 [13] minor plat is?  
 [14] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Well, we put kind of a  
 [15] contingency. And the reason that I rested with  
 [16] three, that's really reflective of your R-1  
 [17] zoning which is a 10,200 square foot minimum so  
 [18] it would safely accommodate an R-1 minor  
 [19] subdivision.  
 [20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** How would  
 [21] assemblage be addressed?  
 [22] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Taking tax parcels and  
 [23] adding them together? That would be a  
 [24] combination plat.  
 [25] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And is that --

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[1] that's excluded --

[2] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That is --

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** -- via this?

[4] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** That is going to be

[5] another step in your subdivision development. I

[6] have not written that section yet. We have

[7] defined it in the terms but we have not written

[8] that section yet.

[9] So that would be like your grandmother

[10] had two pieces of property that were always two

[11] historical tax parcels. And you get the house

[12] in the will and you just want one tax parcel and

[13] one address and you have no intention of

[14] building on the remaining lot. So you could

[15] join them together and make them one tax parcel.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** What about

[17] assemblage for redevelopment?

[18] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Assemblage for

[19] redevelopment would be handled under nonresi-

[20] dential if you're talking in terms of commercial

[21] properties.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Residential.

[23] Assembling three houses, creating a minor

[24] subdivision, putting in six.

[25] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Okay. So, well, if it

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[1] met the thresholds of a minor plat, it could be

[2] reviewed under minor plat.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And again, the

[4] maximum acreage or the maximum size that's

[5] deemed for a minor plat is --

[6] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** There was no -- I did

[7] not put forth an acreage threshold. It was

[8] based on your zoning ordinance that was in

[9] effect. I was looking at an R-1 scenario.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So in theory,

[11] someone could assemble several properties, they

[12] could subdivide it such that each property met

[13] the R-1 threshold of 10,200 square feet and they

[14] could put six or eight or ten --

[15] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** It's more than three

[16] building lots now.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So there is --

[18] there is a building lot maximum of three.

[19] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** There is a building lot

[20] maximum, yes, sir.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So within that

[22] three building lots, as long as they met the R-1

[23] conditions, it would still be considered a minor

[24] plat.

[25] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Yes, sir.

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Okay.

[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion at

[3] the table?

[4] - - -

[5] (No response)

[6] - - -

[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Can I have a motion?

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** May I hear what

[9] Ms. Hoffmeister has to say or no? Would you

[10] prefer not?

[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Come on up to the

[12] microphone.

[13] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Bonita Hoffmeister,

[14] Oakcliff Estates. I just have a question, and

[15] I'm going to direct this to Scott.

[16] In the Cherokee subdivision, we have a

[17] lot of homes that are a hundred-foot frontage.

[18] And if this is passed, then could you take two

[19] of those homes and make three lots? which would

[20] definitely drive down the value of all the homes

[21] surrounding it because I do know we have several

[22] parcels in there where developers have already

[23] tried to come in and put very poor quality

[24] parcels in that area with Dekalb.

[25] So that's my question to Scott.

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[1] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** You had I think you

[2] said parcels that are a hundred foot of road

[3] frontage?

[4] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Yeah.

[5] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** Well, three, the

[6] minimum lot width would be 85, so that's 240.

[7] That's not achievable without a variance.

[8] So the minor plat does not provide for

[9] any administrative variance, which is currently

[10] under the Mayor's purview. And once it reaches

[11] the realm of requiring a City Council variance,

[12] it's out of the realm of a minor plat.

[13] In other words, it puts the City

[14] Council in control of major subdivisions,

[15] particularly deviations from the code for

[16] variances.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you,

[18] Mayor.

[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I have a motion on

[20] the ordinance?

[21] - - -

[22] (No response)

[23] - - -

[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You want to defer the

[25] ordinance?

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, I've been  
[2] making all the motions tonight. Someone else  
[3] needs to make a motion.

[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, I mean if we  
[5] don't want to pass it, somebody make a motion to  
[6] put this one on the next agenda for more study,  
[7] whatever you want to do. Otherwise, make a  
[8] motion to pass it or defer it, whatever you want  
[9] to do.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** I'll make the  
[11] motion to pass it.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Second.

[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.

[14] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[15] Alexander?

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.

[17] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.

[19] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.

[21] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.

[23] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.

[25] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[1] - - -  
[2] (Applause)

[3] - - -

[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay, Murray.

[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Item 14, Mr. Mayor, was  
[6] a report on the Department of Justice  
[7] submission. It's been given to the Clerk and is  
[8] available for the public to peruse.

[9] That concludes that item.

[10] Item 15, the low-flow ordinance, that  
[11] first appeared before Mayor and Council on June  
[12] 8th of 2008. I gave a report on the basic  
[13] parameters of that at the work session. I'm  
[14] happy to give a very short commentary if you  
[15] want one. You've already had first reading.

[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Was there a  
[18] maximum as far as the monies that they were to  
[19] spend on this in one of these drafts?

[20] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes. I think what  
[21] you're referring to is -- these are the  
[22] exemptions. Number 4, if the cost to install  
[23] the low-flow plumbing fixtures exceeds \$1,000  
[24] per toilet, that's exempt from the requirements.  
[25] That's in residential. And if the amount

[1] Spangler?

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.

[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

[4] You don't have one more, Scott?

[5] **MR. HAEBERLIN:** I think that's it.

[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Mr. Mayor, I've  
[8] received the report on the Department of Justice  
[9] submission --

[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Let me -- just a  
[11] minute. Let's take a 10-minute break.

[12] - - -  
[13] (Brief recess)  
[14] - - -

[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I'd just like to make  
[16] the statement that I'm very pleased and proud  
[17] that we've got a person of Scott Haeberle's  
[18] ability. He has really cleared up a lot of our  
[19] ordinances in a short time, and he's always  
[20] straight to the point. He will say, "I will not  
[21] recommend this." And most of the time, I'll say  
[22] as far as I know at this moment, he's right.

[23] So I just want to say that I'm proud  
[24] that we have Mr. Scott Haeberle on board as a  
[25] planner.

[1] exceeds \$2,000 per toilet in a commercial  
[2] building, then they don't have to do it either.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I make a motion  
[4] to adopt the low-flow plumbing fixture building  
[5] regulation ordinance.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Second.

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Mr. Weed, I've  
[8] got a couple of questions.

[9] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, sir.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** On page 4 it  
[11] states, "Before a buyer can connect to water  
[12] service from Dekalb County, the buyer must fill  
[13] out an application." Who provides that  
[14] application?

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** We will.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And that would be  
[17] a form that the Clerk or the Inspector's office  
[18] would have?

[19] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Correct.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Okay. And then  
[21] on page 5, it's got an effective date of August  
[22] 1 of 2008. So Ms. Fleming, pending your  
[23] approval, I would request that we make this  
[24] January 1, 2009. That would give the  
[25] Inspections Department time to create the said

[1] required form.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I amend the

[3] motion. Actually, we have the nonresidential at

[4] January 2nd in this ordinance, so I would like

[5] to include residential and nonresidential for

[6] January 2nd.

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Thank you.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Second. I

[9] second that amendment.

[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We've got a motion and

[11] a second. Anymore discussion?

[12] - - -

[13] (No response)

[14] - - -

[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.

[16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[17] Alexander?

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.

[19] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.

[21] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.

[23] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.

[25] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** It should have been

[2] sent to you by e-mail. I'm sorry if it wasn't.

[3] But you can --

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I've never seen

[5] it.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I haven't

[7] either.

[8] **ATTORNEY WEED:** It's the exact same

[9] ordinance you've already had the entire time.

[10] It just doesn't have any of the local offenses

[11] on it.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.

[13] **ATTORNEY WEED:** It's identical

[14] information.

[15] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Did it exclude or

[16] take out the fifth item down, creating a

[17] hazardous condition, which is a local city

[18] ordinance, or is that still listed?

[19] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No. Actually, that

[20] should have been taken out and it was not. I

[21] think that's the only --

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And where there's

[23] a conflict or not necessarily conflict but

[24] duplicitous in 40 code such as the first one,

[25] abandoned vehicle, does that create --

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.

[2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[3] Spangler.

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.

[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Mr. Mayor, item 16, the

[6] fine and bond schedule, at Councilman Fleming's

[7] request, we did modify the proposed bond

[8] schedule. We took out of all of the references

[9] to the local codes, and now the bond schedule

[10] just deals with the Title 40 and Title 16

[11] criminal offenses; therefore, we'd recommend you

[12] go ahead and pass this.

[13] I am authorized to say that the judges

[14] have reviewed this and they haven't offered any

[15] commentary with regard to changing any of the

[16] bond or fine schedules at this time.

[17] As a separate item next month, after

[18] you've had some time to study it, we'll

[19] reapproach you with the local ordinance

[20] violations after we get your feedback on which

[21] ones you'd like to adjust, and we'll run that by

[22] the judges, and hopefully next month we'll pass

[23] that part of it too.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So we're

[25] going to get a copy of that?

[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No. In fact, I think

[2] law enforcement officials would actually tell

[3] you that they would prefer to have both options

[4] in a code.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Okay. Thank you.

[6] **ATTORNEY WEED:** And looking at this,

[7] actually I find two other local code sections

[8] that we want to remove as well. On the last

[9] page of the chart, disorderly house and failure

[10] to pay cab fare.

[11] I know I've marked those. I apologize.

[12] My staff did not cover that, but I am responsi-

[13] ble for that, ultimately.

[14] And then the one that you pointed out

[15] earlier, creating a hazardous condition. Those

[16] three need to go out.

[17] However, in either case, the chart is

[18] the chart; the state offenses are the state

[19] offenses.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So why are

[21] you just honing in on Section 40 and not Section

[22] 16 of the Georgia Code?

[23] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I am not.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** You're not.

[25] You're including Section 16 also.

[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I thought you

[3] just said you were just doing Section 40.

[4] Sorry.

[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** If I did say that, I'm

[6] sorry. The criminal offenses should be the

[7] Title 40 motor vehicles offenses and the

[8] relevant traffic offenses of Title 16. 16 is

[9] the criminal code and 40 is the motor vehicle

[10] code.

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Rhonda, can you

[12] make copies of that before we -- because I want

[13] to see a clean --

[14] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Do you want this part

[15] also?

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** No, just the

[17] chart, please.

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** If we saw

[19] something was really standing out, we could

[20] always fix that, you know, line item later on, I

[21] guess.

[22] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Of course.

[23] Now, you don't really have much option

[24] to do much with the Title 40 and the Title 16

[25] codes --

[1] **CHIEF KING:** That would be a city code,

[2] ma'am.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Where are we?

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** We're waiting

[5] for copies, sir.

[6] **CLERK BLACKMON:** They're in collated

[7] order, four pages (presenting).

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So I'll move to

[9] accept the ordinance with the fine and bond

[10] schedule to be amended removing the three local

[11] ordinances as identified -- creating a hazardous

[12] condition, disorderly house and failure to pay

[13] cab fare.

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Second.

[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?

[16] - - -

[17] (No response)

[18] - - -

[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.

[20] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[21] Alexander?

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.

[23] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.

[25] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.

[2] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- which was why

[3] Councilman Fleming wanted to go ahead and move

[4] forward with those and hold the ones you can

[5] control, which are the ones you can --

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** So anything

[7] that's a stand-alone City ordinance has been

[8] pulled out.

[9] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Okay.

[11] **ATTORNEY WEED:** With the three

[12] exceptions I mentioned earlier.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Captain Brown is

[14] not here.

[15] Captain Atkinson, do you know what

[16] truck ordinance violation is in the State code?

[17] **CHIEF KING:** I can answer that. That's

[18] the truck inspection that the laws -- the Title

[19] 40 codes that cover the vehicle inspections, we

[20] adopted those years ago to give the Department

[21] of Transportation the ability to inspect those

[22] trucks and charge those cases in our city

[23] municipal court.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** So that

[25] doesn't address our trucks on Oakcliff.

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.

[2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.

[4] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.

[6] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember

[7] Spangler?

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.

[9] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Mr. Mayor and members

[10] of the Council, item 17 we've talked about

[11] before.

[12] Essentially the State law indicates

[13] that for a local ordinance violation, the

[14] maximum fine that you can adopt is \$1,000.

[15] Currently, your current code has a different

[16] fine, and this ordinance makes a correction of

[17] that condition and it utilizes the appropriate

[18] State law fines and other penalties.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Move to pass the

[20] ordinance.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Second.

[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?

[23] - - -

[24] (No response)

[25] - - -

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[1]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.  
[2]           **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[3] Alexander?  
[4]           **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
[5]           **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
[6]           **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
[7]           **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
[8]           **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
[9]           **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
[10]          **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
[11]          **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
[12]          **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
[13]          **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[14] Spangler?  
[15]          **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
[16]          **ATTORNEY WEED:** Mr. Mayor and members  
[17] of the Council, number 18 was taken care of at a  
[18] special meeting. However, up until tonight,  
[19] your rules required that it appear again on this  
[20] agenda. But it was passed last week; therefore,  
[21] there is no action to be taken on item 18.  
[22]           Item 19, we've already given you  
[23] direction, and that item was put on the agenda  
[24] by myself and the Mayor only for that purpose,  
[25] so nothing needs to be done with regard to that.

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[1]           With regard to item 20, the MIS  
[2] contract, I've been in contact with Todd Bair  
[3] who is the legal representation for MIS, and we  
[4] have worked diligently to come up with a  
[5] contract that I think both I am satisfied with,  
[6] as a city attorney, and that I believe MIS, as  
[7] the contractor, is satisfied with.  
[8]           Bear in mind that this contract we're  
[9] talking about only deals with the financial  
[10] services.  
[11]           There's only one caveat to the contract  
[12] that you have been given a copy of, and I'm  
[13] supportive of the legal format that it's in.  
[14]           One of the paragraphs with regard to  
[15] validity has a notation with regard to  
[16] successors to the officials that are listed on  
[17] the signatory line of the contract. I'm a  
[18] little worried that that might conflict with the  
[19] one council cannot bind another council, but  
[20] it's a minor point but I think it's an important  
[21] point.  
[22]           I've discussed it with Ms. Murphy, and  
[23] I'm sure she's going to want me to discuss it  
[24] with her lawyer, but it's an important enough  
[25] point that I need to mention it to you.

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[1]           I think after you resolve that, in my  
[2] opinion, the contract's ready to go forward.  
[3]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And what did  
[4] you say about the I.T. contract?  
[5]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** My understanding and my  
[6] instructions was the I.T. portion of the  
[7] contract, we would deal with that on a different  
[8] date.  
[9]           Apparently, there was an independent  
[10] audit of the I.T. services. Mr. Murphy was  
[11] given a copy of that audit, was asked to respond  
[12] to it. I have not been informed if he responded  
[13] or not. He may well have; I don't know. But  
[14] I'm waiting for further instructions from  
[15] Council to proceed on with regard to that  
[16] contract.  
[17]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But is there a  
[18] contract in progress?  
[19]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** Actually, I would say  
[20] yes. And the reason why I answer yes is  
[21] because the way MIS proposed their contracts was  
[22] they were two different contracts with the same  
[23] terms other than one was geared towards the I.T.  
[24] function, one was geared towards the finance  
[25] function.

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[1]           Obviously, we're not going to have to  
[2] redo most of the terms because the lawyer on the  
[3] other side and I have come to at least a legal  
[4] agreement about those terms. So if you do  
[5] decide to pursue the I.T. contract, it's 90  
[6] percent done at this point.  
[7]           **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And I'd like to  
[8] pursue that one, too. I have a question on  
[9] this.  
[10]           I see we have this provides for a bond  
[11] of a million dollars, and the last page talks  
[12] about the rates and there's one rate if we pay  
[13] for the bond and another rate if MIS Consulting  
[14] buys their own bonding.  
[15]           Where are we at with deciding about  
[16] who's paying for what on the bonding? I know  
[17] we've talked this out, but I don't know if it's  
[18] ever been really resolved.  
[19]           **ATTORNEY WEED:** With regard to this  
[20] contract, I've been informed by Mr. Bair that  
[21] MIS is prepared to provide the bonding.  
[22]           **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But at the  
[23] same time, there's some other contractors that  
[24] we have asked that they also be bonded. And has  
[25] there nothing been done about those?

[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Councilman, you ask me  
[2] that every meeting and I tell you the same thing  
[3] at every meeting.

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, and I  
[5] will ask you until I get --

[6] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Sir, I can't tell you  
[7] anything but the truth, which is I've pulled out  
[8] every contract that the City's done. Some of  
[9] them have relevant bonding provisions and some  
[10] of them do not. Some of them, it would not be  
[11] appropriate to have a bond on them because there  
[12] are different types of contracts.

[13] With regard to the contracts where it's  
[14] appropriate to have bonding, any contract that  
[15] doesn't currently have a bonding, I will present  
[16] to the Mayor and Council. In fact, I proposed  
[17] to put that on the agenda in consultation with  
[18] the Mayor. He elected that we wouldn't put it  
[19] on this agenda because of the 26 items.

[20] However, I can assure you that I am  
[21] working on it. And the Council, whatever you  
[22] want to bond, we'll bond. Whatever you don't  
[23] want to bond, we won't bond. That's your  
[24] decision, not mine.

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And another

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- no matter what  
[2] unless --

[3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You can always renew  
[4] it.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right; of course.  
[6] So I guess I'm curious as to why the  
[7] validity would be a problem. I mean it's not  
[8] like we're going to have a new council between  
[9] now and then.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Someone ma  
[11] y  
resign.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, that's  
[13] true, but, still, does that -- normally, if a  
[14] council person resigns, does that mean all of  
[15] our contracts are no good and we've got to start  
[16] all over again or how does that work?

[17] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, the general rule  
[18] of law, of course, is that one council can't  
[19] bind another.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.

[21] **ATTORNEY WEED:** The way these contracts  
[22] are structured, the Council can elect to modify  
[23] the contract at any point.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.

[25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** So with that, if there

[1] thing I'll ask at every meeting, too, is what  
[2] about the other contracts? Have we done  
[3] anything with the other contracts? Have we  
[4] reviewed any of the other contracts from the  
[5] vendors or is MIS the only one that we've  
[6] reviewed?

[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** In the six months that  
[8] I've been here, I have reviewed 10 contracts,  
[9] and with regard to the probably 50 or 60  
[10] contracts that preceded me, no, I have not  
[11] pulled all those contracts and reviewed them. I  
[12] feel that I have been authorized to do that and  
[13] I promise you that I will.

[14] I am doing the best job I can with the  
[15] City's work and making it as cost-effective as I  
[16] can for you. And I will get to it. You have my  
[17] personal assurance. I will get to it as  
[18] promptly as I can.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** On the validity,  
[20] I guess my question is how does that relate to  
[21] number 13, term and termination?

[22] According to the term and termination,  
[23] if I'm reading this right, this will end as of  
[24] December 31st of next year --

[25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That is correct.

[1] is a clause that implies that you have lost your  
[2] ability to do that, that's what I'm concerned  
[3] about.

[4] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** But there's also  
[5] a clause here that says no matter what, we can  
[6] give 60 days' notice and terminate the contract.

[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Correct.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So no matter  
[9] what, there's always that out.

[10] **ATTORNEY WEED:** True. But I'd rather  
[11] that the contract not have any kind of -- any  
[12] possible conflicting provisions in them, which  
[13] is why I recommend the change.

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So what would you  
[15] say? We're changing the validity to --  
[16] What change would we make?

[17] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Essentially, most of  
[18] that first sentence would be eliminated.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And there  
[20] wouldn't -- technically, there wouldn't be any  
[21] successor anyway; right?

[22] **ATTORNEY WEED:** There might be. Once  
[23] again, if one member of the Council changed,  
[24] that is essentially a successor to the party  
[25] representing the City, so it's possible.

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So if someone  
[2] resigned, this contract is no good?  
[3] I mean it just seems like that would  
[4] cause chaos, I mean.  
[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No, sir, I didn't say  
[6] that.  
[7] If someone resigned, the next person  
[8] who came in might want to bid the contract out,  
[9] might -- like MIS, might want to do something  
[10] different, and they might try to get the  
[11] contract changed, which they would have the  
[12] right to do.  
[13] Now, that may not pass. But legally  
[14] they'd have as much right to try to make that  
[15] happen, and the only way that we can guarantee  
[16] that they would have that right would be to make  
[17] sure there's no terms that say that right is  
[18] taken away from them.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So they'd have to  
[20] make a motion and --  
[21] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Go through -- yes, of  
[22] course. Yes; right.  
[23] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Is that in  
[24] every contract that we have, to include yours as  
[25] well?

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[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Of course.  
[2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Okay.  
[3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, ma'am. That's a  
[4] state law.  
[5] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** What was the  
[6] length of this contract?  
[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** It's one year.  
[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Till the end of  
[9] next year.  
[10] I guess I don't remember -- last year,  
[11] we had some people resigning, and I don't  
[12] remember this coming up, but that's okay.  
[13] So other than taking out that first  
[14] sentence, you're basically okay with it?  
[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I am. It's legally  
[16] sufficient. If you want to approve it, I  
[17] recommend approval.  
[18] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** How does Ms.  
[19] Murphy feel about it?  
[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I got a comment on item  
[21] number 5. Ms. Murphy and I have talked about  
[22] this. Not exactly what I had talked to her  
[23] about. The last paragraph says, "as necessary  
[24] in consultant's discretion," and is to after-  
[25] hours access with permission by the Mayor to

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[1] perform the services. But the first part of it  
[2] gives her permission to come in any weekends,  
[3] nights or any time.  
[4] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Correct, Mr. Mayor.  
[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That was not the  
[6] intentions that Ms. Murphy and I had talked  
[7] about.  
[8] **ATTORNEY WEED:** And I discussed that  
[9] earlier with Mr. Bair. That modification comes  
[10] from him.  
[11] The reason why I had let that go  
[12] through without discussing it further was  
[13] because clearly if you set her hours, whatever  
[14] hours they are, she can only change those hours  
[15] with your permission.  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
[17] **ATTORNEY WEED:** And so the second part  
[18] of the sentence has to be read in context with  
[19] the first part. So you still have the  
[20] authority, Mayor, to say what hours Ms. Murphy  
[21] is going to be here.  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. There'll be  
[23] certain times during the audits and during the  
[24] budget that I will ask Ms. Murphy to stay late.  
[25] But other than that, my intention was during

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[1] working hours, and I think some of the other  
[2] Council approve of that, too.  
[3] But you're saying this last paragraph  
[4] says that I have the option at any time that she  
[5] stays, that she gets permission. Is that --  
[6] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, sir.  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So back to number  
[8] 18, if we remove the first sentence, would that  
[9] -- how would you feel about that, Mrs. Murphy?  
[10] **MS. MURPHY:** That doesn't seem to  
[11] bother me. I've spent most of the day with my  
[12] attorney on the phone. I pretty much feel like  
[13] I've conceded to pretty much everything that the  
[14] City wanted or that Murray suggested, because I  
[15] had to learn more about the state law or  
[16] possible state law and what should be in  
[17] government contracts and what shouldn't be.  
[18] The contracts that I got copies of  
[19] through open records request don't have -- some  
[20] have some of these similar things and some of  
[21] them don't. So pretty much I've tried not to  
[22] feel like I'm being picked on or anything.  
[23] And it would have helped me a lot more  
[24] if the Council had decided what the bonding  
[25] requirements or what they were going to require

[1] of their contractors instead of just sending  
[2] something to me saying, "Okay. What do you  
[3] suggest you be bonded for?", that kind of thing.  
[4] And even last week at the work session, my  
[5] attorney sent questions to Murray Weed that I  
[6] was hoping that he would ask the Council last  
[7] week about what the Council thought about the  
[8] bond and what it should be, things like that, to  
[9] give more guidance as to what the Council does  
[10] want to do.

[11] But I'm pretty much okay with the  
[12] contract like it is, and tossed around different  
[13] ideas and learned about the state laws. I guess  
[14] there's a whole lot more contracts that are  
[15] going to have to change with the city.

[16] But I did want to point out, I wasn't  
[17] sure if the million dollars was what you-all  
[18] wanted, and it does say in here that it says up  
[19] to a maximum bond amount of a million dollars.

[20] I think it says that I will be provided  
[21] with what your bond amount is going to be or  
[22] something like that, doesn't it, Murray, or  
[23] what's required?

[24] **ATTORNEY WEED:** One of the versions  
[25] said that; that's correct.

[1] -- I believe it's 40-8-5, but the short version  
[2] is anyone who's entrusted with public funds as a  
[3] public official should definitely be bonded.

[4] And the list that we have essentially  
[5] would be the Chief, the Clerk, the Mayor,  
[6] Ms. Murphy, and probably the deputy clerks who  
[7] regularly handle money. If you've got people  
[8] over Recreation who are actually taking money at  
[9] a gate in the sense of if you're taking money in  
[10] places other than City Hall, those people should  
[11] be included as well.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Then, we need

[13] to include the pool company because they take  
[14] cash at the gate at the swimming pool.

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You can include whoever  
[16] you want to, but if the state law deals with  
[17] public officials doing it more so than just  
[18] private contractors. However, Ms. Murphy's got  
[19] a dual role. She's also the finance director.  
[20] She's essentially a department head, which is  
[21] unlike most of your contractors who are outside  
[22] vendors. She's in a very different type of  
[23] position of authority, and most of your  
[24] contractors you just buy something from. So  
[25] she's actually a public official as opposed to

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, it says  
[2] bonding determined as sufficient by the City up  
[3] to a maximum of a million dollars.

[4] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That's what it says.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So if we decide  
[6] it's two hundred fifty, then it's two fifty.

[7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That's correct.

[8] Mr. Bair had originally recommended a  
[9] half million.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right, right.

[11] **ATTORNEY WEED:** And he'd recommended  
[12] half a million for both I.T. and also half a  
[13] million for finance.

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay. So if we  
[15] took out -- would you be okay with taking out  
[16] the first sentence of paragraph number 18?

[17] **MS. MURPHY:** I believe so, yes.

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Now, are we  
[19] going to require all other --

[20] And again, I do need to know which  
[21] people need to be bonded, in your opinion.

[22] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, sir. I sent a  
[23] memo on that, and I'm happy to go over it again  
[24] as many times as you want me to.

[25] But essentially what state law provides

[1] the carpet cleaning guy.

[2] So the answer to your question is if  
[3] people are public officials like Carol Stephens,  
[4] for example, and she is collecting money at a  
[5] venue, definitely she should be included. If  
[6] it's a contractor, we should include that  
[7] bonding in the form of -- as part of their  
[8] contract.

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, the pool,  
[10] we're only budgeting \$9,000 a year of income, so  
[11] it would take a long, long time for them to  
[12] steal \$500,000.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** I didn't  
[14] suggest \$500,000. We're just trusting people  
[15] that we don't know to collect cash and turn in  
[16] all the receipts.

[17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, then, maybe  
[18] they need a different amount.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But again, on  
[20] the bonding, I think that's wide open. I think  
[21] that it should be anybody that has any kind of  
[22] contact with any kind of government equipment as  
[23] far as cleaning or whatever should be bonded.  
[24] Any vendor we use should be bonded.

[25] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Can I make a

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[1] suggestion that we bring up the bonding and put  
[2] that on the agenda for the next meeting?  
[3] And then as far as this particular  
[4] contract, apparently if we remove one sentence,  
[5] everyone is in agreement. So I'd like to make a  
[6] motion that we approve this contract minus the  
[7] first paragraph -- I'm sorry -- minus the first  
[8] sentence in paragraph 18.  
[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I have a second?  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Second.  
[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** More discussion?  
[12] - - -  
[13] (No response)  
[14] - - -  
[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.  
[16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[17] Alexander?  
[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** No.  
[19] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
[20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** No.  
[21] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
[23] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
[24] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
[25] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
[2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[3] Spangler?  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I'd also like to  
[6] make a motion that we proceed with the MIS  
[7] contract for the computer services.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** The I.T. service.  
[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I.T. services,  
[10] computers.  
[11] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** What?  
[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** To go ahead and  
[13] start the process.  
[14] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Oh, to start  
[15] the process.  
[16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Do you have a  
[18] plan on if he's going to fix the items that need  
[19] fixing first or do the management?  
[20] I didn't think that there was a clear  
[21] scope of what his tasks were going to be. I  
[22] believe that was part of his sentiment in his  
[23] response to the Mimsware report.  
[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, clearly a  
[25] lot of work needs to be done.

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[1] I was considering bringing up our  
[2] overall strategy for I.T. in the next month or  
[3] so. I wanted to see what happened with the  
[4] annexation first before we got into that.  
[5] But as far as who actually does the  
[6] work, I mean the person who knows where all the  
[7] bodies are buried in this case would probably be  
[8] the best person to have. If we lost access to  
[9] that experience and knowledge of our own system,  
[10] I think we'd be in big trouble.  
[11] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Based on the  
[12] scope of the work that was needed, including  
[13] Mr. Murphy's response -- and thank you for  
[14] providing that -- I would feel much more  
[15] comfortable in having that go out for bid so  
[16] that we have a very thorough understanding of  
[17] what the cost associated with the items are  
[18] whether that be with MIS Consulting or with  
[19] another firm. I think it's prudent for us to  
[20] get the additional information so that we can  
[21] make an educated decision on that information.  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And what's the  
[23] RFP going to say?  
[24] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** It's going to use  
[25] a combination of the Mimsware report and, if

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[1] Mr. Murphy would allow it to be provided, his  
[2] responses.  
[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, again,  
[4] what's going to go in the RFP is another topic,  
[5] basically.  
[6] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** That's why I  
[7] would suggest that we not move forward with the  
[8] contract at this time until we have a thorough  
[9] discussion of what we're looking for on I.T.  
[10] services.  
[11] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** We can look for  
[12] a lot of things for the I.T. services, but if  
[13] this Council doesn't approve the money to fund  
[14] it, then --  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** It's not going  
[16] to get done.  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** -- we're still  
[18] in the situation that we are.  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** You're absolutely  
[20] right, Ms. Fleming.  
[21] The question is we don't know how much  
[22] it's going to cost us. We don't have an  
[23] understanding of what the scope and the entirety  
[24] of the cost as recommended by either Mimsware or  
[25] MIS Consulting.

[1] Without having comparative data, we're  
[2] relying upon one person to tell us the cost of  
[3] that. I just think that's inappropriate.

[4] We should go out and have a thorough  
[5] understanding of what the costs are going to be  
[6] and have that compared apples to apples from  
[7] multiple sources so that we've got an under-  
[8] standing of what we need to either -- are we  
[9] sufficient in our coverage or are we lacking  
[10] significantly and to help prioritize what needs  
[11] to be addressed first and foremost.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** But I think the  
[13] whole point of this particular contract -- and  
[14] maybe I'll need to say it better -- is that the  
[15] current contract, the current professional  
[16] services that the City needs to operate on a  
[17] daily basis is essentially maintaining the  
[18] systems that we have today, and if we lose that,  
[19] we're going to be in big trouble.

[20] I agree completely.

[21] The problem that we have is we don't  
[22] have an overall strategy for our accounting and  
[23] our MIS needs today in going forward. And to  
[24] just say, "Go out and fix this, and just go out  
[25] and fix that," does not solve the problem,

[1] guess I'm not really sure what to do next.

[2] And some of the stuff that you're  
[3] worried about the prices of what these things  
[4] are going to cost, I think people here think  
[5] that this is a big contract for MIS or  
[6] something.

[7] There's been rumors that it's been  
[8] hundreds of thousands of dollars a year, when  
[9] that in fact is not the case.

[10] And all the hardware that's been bought  
[11] for the City has been bought through places like  
[12] Dell with government pricing, things like that.  
[13] They're not something that MIS has marked up and  
[14] made any profit on or anything like that.

[15] I think what I would like to see or not  
[16] sure is we turned in these responses, haven't  
[17] heard much of anything yet, and it hasn't been  
[18] that much time.

[19] But there are some things that we could  
[20] give prices on or get prices from these various  
[21] government contract places for the hardware and  
[22] things like that that the Council could make  
[23] decisions on. And if you can make the decisions  
[24] and send it out for RFP, it seems like you could  
[25] get recommendations from Ronnie or myself and

[1] because until we have an overall strategy, we'll  
[2] just be throwing more money at the problem  
[3] without an overall plan to make everything --  
[4] you know, that's truly going to work.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Retaining the  
[6] existing firm without an overall strategy is not  
[7] going to fix the problem either.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** The overall  
[9] strategy at this point is to continue to  
[10] maintain the systems that we have.

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And correct me if  
[12] I'm wrong, but there were instances where that  
[13] was not being done.

[14] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, because we  
[15] didn't give them authorization to do it.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** And again I'll  
[17] reiterate, we have to give someone authorization  
[18] to update the antivirus software that's supposed  
[19] to be updating automatically?

[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Can you add something  
[21] to that?

[22] **MS. MURPHY:** I just have a couple of  
[23] questions.

[24] We did turn in the I.T. response and we  
[25] got no response so far from the Council, and I

[1] say, "Yes, we want to do this," or "No, we need  
[2] to look at sending it out for official RFP for  
[3] something else," because it may be that it's not  
[4] just one RFP; it could be more than one. Or  
[5] there could be things that we could get done  
[6] more cost effectively just by communicating  
[7] better between what we're trying to do or what  
[8] we're not doing and what the Council thinks that  
[9] we're doing.

[10] And also amongst you, you are unclear  
[11] about whether this position needs to be bonded  
[12] or not or how much bond. Again, that's going to  
[13] be an issue too if you send it out for RFPs,  
[14] that type of thing.

[15] It would help whoever's bidding on it  
[16] or whoever's trying to get the contract to know  
[17] what to do next or what it is the City's looking  
[18] for, and that's been the problem all along or  
[19] part of the problem all along.

[20] So even now, I mean you asked for the  
[21] response to the I.T. audit but you didn't bother  
[22] to talk about it or what the problems were, what  
[23] your feelings were or what you thought the  
[24] problems were. You go ahead and make decisions  
[25] for some reason without even discussing it with

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[1] the vendors or what's going on.  
[2] I mean I would hope that you wouldn't  
[3] do employees that way or other vendors, I mean,  
[4] because you're spending the City's money whether  
[5] it's \$50,000 a year or hundreds of thousands of  
[6] dollars a year. It's still that you can't just  
[7] make decisions blindly without knowing some  
[8] information and keep wasting or spending the  
[9] taxpayers' money.  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** That, Ms. Murphy,  
[11] is exactly why I think it needs to go out for an  
[12] **RFP:** so that we can make sure that we're  
[13] spending the residents' money in a fiscally  
[14] responsible manner.  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** The way to spend  
[16] the money in a fiscally responsible --  
[17] I mean one of the things that I brought  
[18] up in my campaign and a lot of people realize is  
[19] that Doraville -- the accounting and the IT  
[20] needs a total makeover. We need to look at our  
[21] accounting system. We need to look at our chart  
[22] of accounts. We're talking already about having  
[23] separate fund balances. All that needs to be  
[24] looked at.  
[25] Our entire process, the purchasing

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[1] process -- the process itself, forget about the  
[2] computers; that process needs to be looked at.  
[3] We need to know how much money can I spend if  
[4] I'm a supervisor versus a department head? At  
[5] what point do I need to go up and get a -- that  
[6] if it's more than \$2,000, I have to go to my  
[7] department head, et cetera.  
[8] There's a whole raft of things that  
[9] need to be decided. We need to understand what  
[10] applications we need. We need to understand  
[11] that we need applications that will talk to each  
[12] other so that when someone goes over there and  
[13] pays a fine, the money automatically flows into  
[14] our checking account and it automatically flows  
[15] into our accounting system so that we capture  
[16] these numbers accurately so that people like  
[17] department heads have right-now numbers so they  
[18] know exactly where their spending is, and it  
[19] involves the budgets, et cetera, et cetera.  
[20] There's a whole large thing that we haven't even  
[21] begun to talk about here.  
[22] But what we can do at least for the  
[23] moment is at least retain somebody that can keep  
[24] the system back here that's basically held  
[25] together with duct tape and paper clips until we

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[1] can get that done. And if we lose that  
[2] resource, if we lose that one person who has all  
[3] this information about, like I said, where all  
[4] the bodies are buried and which releases are on  
[5] which applications and which servers are where,  
[6] we're going to be in big trouble.  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** And shame on  
[8] us for allowing us to become that dependent on  
[9] one person.  
[10] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I agree  
[11] completely, but the point is to get rid of that  
[12] person is not the way to do it.  
[13] The right way to do it is to start from  
[14] the overall process and decide what our needs  
[15] are, and then once we have decided what our  
[16] needs are, begin to put together a plan to get  
[17] to there.  
[18] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Did anybody --  
[19] after Mr. Murphy passed out the information to  
[20] all of us, did anybody get with him to see what  
[21] was needed?  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Nobody commented at  
[23] all, did they?  
[24] **MS. MURPHY:** Not to my knowledge.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I didn't get any

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[1] comments from anyone.  
[2] **MS. MURPHY:** His e-mail is on there and  
[3] his phone number and --  
[4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And this has  
[5] been an ongoing --  
[6] **MS. MURPHY:** It's been an ongoing  
[7] thing, a lack of communication. It almost feels  
[8] like some Council people come on board with old  
[9] agendas of other Council people, like they've  
[10] heard other things and they want to get rid of  
[11] certain people: out-with-the-old/in-with-the-  
[12] new scenario.  
[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Right.  
[14] **MS. MURPHY:** And some of the things  
[15] that happened -- and I don't have the answers  
[16] right in front of me about the I.T. audit.  
[17] During some of this time right before the audit,  
[18] we tried to get some of the things in the budget  
[19] to be changed or replaced but the Council wanted  
[20] to wait until after the I.T. audit was finished  
[21] to have the items upgraded and things like that.  
[22] So some of that, that was asked for and  
[23] denied during the budget process in June to have  
[24] some of this stuff done. It just happened to be  
[25] a coincidence that it wasn't in place or that

[1] something wasn't changed before the I.T. audit  
[2] came.

[3] And it's not that Ronnie has a problem  
[4] getting bids or getting what the City wants done  
[5] or the department heads want done or whatever.  
[6] It's just making sure we have the budget and the  
[7] permission from the Council.

[8] I mean I almost feel like if he went  
[9] and done something, that the Council would be  
[10] just as mad or upset than like you're thinking  
[11] now, he didn't do anything. And he's thinking  
[12] that he gets no response from the Council at  
[13] all; they want this stuff, but then they have no  
[14] comment.

[15] I mean sort of some of the same thing  
[16] happened with the web site, the vendor that we  
[17] used for that. That took years -- years -- and  
[18] a whole lot of money to develop a web site.  
[19] \$60,000 and years' worth of time. And it was  
[20] just pure lack of communication about what the  
[21] goals were for the City and what to do, and the  
[22] department heads working together and being able  
[23] to get what they need out of their services.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay. And for  
[25] lack of direction --

[1] overall direction, I think we'd be frankly  
[2] throwing money away because we'd just go out and  
[3] buy stuff and try to plug it in together and it  
[4] doesn't work, and then that costs more money.  
[5] You know, nothing's standardized. I can spend  
[6] all day long talking about this, you know.

[7] And in the meantime, it's almost like  
[8] paying someone to come and mow your lawn once or  
[9] twice a week and then blaming that person for  
[10] the weeds when we never told them to pull the  
[11] weeds.

[12] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Could we  
[13] possibly -- I make a motion to bring Mr. Murphy  
[14] in at the next meeting and let's discuss this  
[15] and see where we need to go from there as far as  
[16] what is needed in the budget.

[17] And again, you know, I think he's been  
[18] an asset, but it may be that we need to add  
[19] someone else in addition to him to do some of  
[20] what needs to be done. And I think if he could  
[21] come in and talk to us, that would be fair, to  
[22] me.

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Would it be  
[24] appropriate for Mimsware, the firm that prepared  
[25] the I.T. audit, to come in and present their

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I'm sorry. I  
[2] was just going to say, you know, I do recall  
[3] Mr. Murphy coming to the previous Council and  
[4] asking for direction, and the funding was not  
[5] there to do some of the things, I believe, that  
[6] were needing to be done or was not allowed to be  
[7] there.

[8] I would like -- at the work session, is  
[9] my thought -- to have him come in and let's  
[10] discuss some of this. And it may be we need to  
[11] put out an RFP to add someone else on board, not  
[12] just --

[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Next meeting, not work  
[14] session.

[15] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Well, next  
[16] meeting.

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I'd say that's a good  
[18] idea. Let's do it that way rather than spending  
[19] all night tonight.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I can only say  
[21] this once every four months, but I do this for a  
[22] living. I mean I understand the process.

[23] The audit itself did not surprise me at  
[24] all. In fact, I'm surprised it wasn't worse off  
[25] than it is. But until such time as we have an

[1] findings in conjunction?

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Well, findings  
[3] is fine. I've read those reports. But I think  
[4] what we need now is recommendations of how to  
[5] solve some of our problems, to cure some of the  
[6] errors or whatever the case may be and the cost  
[7] behind it before, you know, we do anything else.

[8] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** And I'd like  
[9] to ask Ms. Murphy, do you remember how much  
[10] money that was asked for in the budget for the  
[11] I.T. services that we --

[12] **MS. MURPHY:** Well, it wasn't for the  
[13] I.T. services. That last part that we tried to  
[14] ask for in June when y'all were about to approve  
[15] the budget was seventy additional thousand  
[16] dollars, particularly in the Police Department,  
[17] and it was turned down due to waiting for the  
[18] I.T. audit, I believe.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But what was  
[20] this money to be budgeted for?

[21] **MS. MURPHY:** To replace -- to do some  
[22] of those things that are recommended in that  
[23] audit.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Okay.  
[25] **MS. MURPHY:** A good many of those

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[1] things that were recommended in the audit.  
[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, I'll  
[3] withdraw my motion in favor of Councilman  
[4] Pittman's motion.  
[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second on  
[6] Donna's?  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Second.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.  
[9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[10] Alexander?  
[11] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
[12] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
[13] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
[14] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
[15] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
[16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
[17] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
[18] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
[19] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
[20] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
[21] Spangler?  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** John?  
[24] **CHIEF KING:** Yes.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** How do you want to

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[1] handle this? I guess we'll have to get to you  
[2] and Murray.  
[3] **CHIEF KING:** 22, sir? Lieutenant  
[4] Hardy's situation?  
[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes.  
[6] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, sir. We have a  
[7] situation that basically is an appeal to a  
[8] decision.  
[9] But what I would probably like to start  
[10] with is if Mr. Weed can set the legal parameters  
[11] and then allow Lieutenant Hardy to have his say.  
[12] And then if you have any questions, I could  
[13] either answer or Mr. Weed could answer them. I  
[14] think that's what Lieutenant Hardy and I talked  
[15] about.  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** John, let me ask.  
[17] Mr. Weed, is this qualified to be an  
[18] executive session or not?  
[19] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, sir, it is.  
[20] However, it does qualify, in my opinion, if my  
[21] understanding of what may occur, under 15-14-3,  
[22] the Council may go into executive session to  
[23] discuss personnel matters that involve the,  
[24] quote, "employment, employment compensation,  
[25] hiring, disciplinary action or dismissal or

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[1] periodic evaluation or rating of a public  
[2] officer or employee."  
[3] I think that I don't know exactly the  
[4] content of what the Lieutenant would like to say  
[5] to the Council but it probably fits underneath  
[6] one of those categories.  
[7] I have to forewarn everyone, however,  
[8] that anything that the Lieutenant says would  
[9] constitute, quote/unquote "evidence" that has to  
[10] be issued in a public forum. However, the  
[11] Council can always deliberate in private in  
[12] executive session.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I don't know what it's  
[14] about, either. So maybe John can explain it to  
[15] us?  
[16] **CHIEF KING:** Basically, the situation  
[17] that I find myself with with Lieutenant Hardy,  
[18] as you know, Lieutenant Hardy has provided a  
[19] very long time, twenty --  
[20] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Twenty-three, I  
[21] think.  
[22] **CHIEF KING:** Twenty-three, last count,  
[23] of years of service to the City.  
[24] And I do not want to go into the  
[25] details of medical condition, but the situation

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[1] that I'm in is that he does not qualify for the  
[2] physical requirements to perform as a sworn  
[3] police officer, leaving me the option to  
[4] reclassify him.  
[5] The issue here is my decision to  
[6] reclassify him will affect his pay. He is very  
[7] close. He's got enough time to retire, but the  
[8] problem is that he does not qualify for  
[9] Medicare.  
[10] Correct me if I'm wrong.  
[11] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** That's correct; at  
[12] this point.  
[13] **CHIEF KING:** At this point.  
[14] He has a very short period of time, but  
[15] I cannot grant him that time to continue at his  
[16] current pay without the Council approving that.  
[17] So technically what is occurring is  
[18] Lieutenant Hardy is appealing my decision to  
[19] reclassify him from a sworn officer to a  
[20] nonsworn, causing obviously an adjustment in  
[21] pay.  
[22] You know, I have suspended that  
[23] decision because I wanted Lieutenant Hardy to  
[24] come make his case to the Council. Then when  
[25] the Council makes a decision, then we will take

[1] that accordingly.  
[2] I don't have a lot of flexibility.  
[3] I've discussed this with the city attorney and I  
[4] just barely mentioned it to the Mayor because I  
[5] did not want to have this prejudged by the  
[6] members of the Council, and you hear basically  
[7] Lieutenant Hardy's, you know, pitch, to make  
[8] this decision.

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** So I guess the  
[10] decrease in pay is to affect the retirement, but  
[11] is the retirement not based on the past 10 years  
[12] of --

[13] **CHIEF KING:** No, it's -- the problem is  
[14] is that our retirement system right now, you  
[15] have to have 10 years of service to be vested,  
[16] but the retirement -- the retirement is -- and  
[17] Lieutenant Hardy and Priscilla, correct me if I  
[18] misspeak -- it's calculated off the last two  
[19] years of service.

[20] So if Lieutenant Hardy's pay, or any  
[21] employee that's retired --

[22] **MS. MURPHY:** Last five years.

[23] **CHIEF KING:** Five years? I apologize.  
[24] Thank you, Priscilla.

[25] But if that is modified in any way, it

[1] **CHIEF KING:** For service? He's got  
[2] twenty years.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** No.  
[4] Additional.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** No.

[6] **CHIEF KING:** Oh. Then he has --

[7] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** How long to carry  
[8] to the end?

[9] **CHIEF KING:** Is that September?

[10] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** I'm going to say --

[11] **CHIEF KING:** When is your birthday?

[12] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** The anniversary day  
[13] is October. My birthday, which Medicaid would  
[14] come in, is August.

[15] **CHIEF KING:** Right. That is what I  
[16] need covered is from now to August.

[17] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Yeah. Eight months.

[18] **CHIEF KING:** Eight months. Thanks.  
[19] And that's the crux of the matter.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I understand.

[21] **CHIEF KING:** It's a decision that I  
[22] don't have that authority to make.

[23] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** You mentioned a  
[24] physical -- being able to have a sworn  
[25] officer --

[1] affects his bottom line. Does that make --

[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes, yes.

[3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I have two  
[4] questions. First, what would be the difference,  
[5] how much of a salary reduction?

[6] **CHIEF KING:** Right now, it really will  
[7] be up to the Council what the position, because  
[8] the only position I can -- I can reclassify him  
[9] is the jailer position. He's currently at a  
[10] lieutenant. He's my highest-paid lieutenant  
[11] that I have, so there will be a significant  
[12] change, sir.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, I mean do  
[14] you have a dollar amount, what the difference is  
[15] going to be?

[16] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Approximately, not  
[17] exactly, but approximately \$30,000.

[18] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** \$30,000 --

[19] **CHIEF KING:** Yes.

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- a year?

[21] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Yes.

[22] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, sir.

[23] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Yes, sir.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** And how many  
[25] years are we talking about?

[1] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am.

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** -- versus a  
[3] nonsworn officer. Would he be able to perform  
[4] motorcycle duty?

[5] **CHIEF KING:** No, ma'am.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Bicycle duty?

[7] **CHIEF KING:** It would deal with the  
[8] equipment that he has to carry, ma'am. I don't  
[9] really want to get into the details.

[10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Okay.

[11] **CHIEF KING:** The doctors have basically  
[12] -- we've given them a job description of what it  
[13] takes to be a sworn officer and we've given them  
[14] a job description of what it is to be a jail  
[15] supervisor. I've given them both job  
[16] descriptions, and the doctors have said, "He  
[17] does not qualify for this job description. He  
[18] does qualify for this job description."

[19] If you want a recommendation, ideally,  
[20] if we could find a way -- and the problem is  
[21] probably Murray's going to, you know, bite my  
[22] head off. But ideally, I can't look at this man  
[23] in the face and say, "Hey, thanks for 23 years  
[24] and, you know, we can't give you till eight  
[25] months." But that is a decision that you-all

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[1] have to do because I don't have that authority.  
 [2] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** So the question  
 [3] is to maintain the pay but at a different  
 [4] status?  
 [5] **CHIEF KING:** That basically would be --  
 [6] I think that's what we're asking.  
 [7] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Yes.  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** What you're  
 [9] talking about, it looks like \$20,000 that it  
 [10] would cost the City, basically.  
 [11] **CHIEF KING:** Basically.  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** After 23-and-a-  
 [13] half years, I mean it's no brains.  
 [14] **CHIEF KING:** That's -- that is the --  
 [15] But I don't want to be talking for you.  
 [16] I'm just presenting the situation as it lays.  
 [17] And I will tell you, this is not the  
 [18] only case we've had in the city, and that is one  
 [19] of the challenges that we have. I am sorry. I  
 [20] hope he doesn't get upset about it, but, you  
 [21] know, I'm riding this issue to -- this is an  
 [22] exact example of the weaknesses that we have in  
 [23] our retirement program. Anita Redman (ph) was  
 [24] another one, was a prime example. She medically  
 [25] could not -- she could not retire.

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Is the disability  
 [2] that you have now related to work?  
 [3] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Related to my job?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Uh-huh.  
 [5] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** I have a -- I have a  
 [6] heart condition and I have Parkinson's Disease,  
 [7] and that restricts a lot of police work.  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I understand.  
 [9] That's fine.  
 [10] **CHIEF KING:** So if y'all can help me  
 [11] resolve this situation in an amenable way but  
 [12] also take this as an example. And as you're  
 [13] discussing the employee benefits and the  
 [14] employee manuals, please keep this case and  
 [15] Anita Redman's case as an example of the things  
 [16] that I ask you, I beg you to try to resolve.  
 [17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Well, we need to  
 [18] take care of the people who take --  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Absolutely.  
 [20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- care of us.  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Mr. Weed --  
 [22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I know what I  
 [23] want to do.  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** -- is that  
 [25] feasible to do?

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Can we just make a  
 [2] motion, Mr. Weed?  
 [3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, it depends on  
 [4] what you -- what would you like to do for this  
 [5] gentleman?  
 [6] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I mean the  
 [7] preference would be -- obviously, he's going to  
 [8] have to drop down ranks to a jailer, but to  
 [9] maintain his current pay, as a jailer, to enable  
 [10] him until -- whatever --  
 [11] August of next year; is that correct?  
 [12] **CHIEF KING:** I think if you allow me to  
 [13] maintain -- allow me to make the jail supervisor  
 [14] position, at least for the next budget year --  
 [15] well, beyond; I think it will go beyond, you  
 [16] know.  
 [17] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Till August. One  
 [18] month.  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** -- at his pay,  
 [20] and then as we change, once he retires, then you  
 [21] can reclassify or you can re-look at that  
 [22] position and adjust it down. If you allow me to  
 [23] do that, that would be a way out.  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** So that would  
 [25] require a budget adjustment of \$20,000?

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[1] **CHIEF KING:** No, sir, because his  
 [2] position is already budgeted. I think you're  
 [3] okay there, sir, because I'm not replacing the  
 [4] individual. I mean Lieutenant Hardy is still  
 [5] here and he's --  
 [6] - - -  
 [7] (Brief, inaudible discussion at Council table.)  
 [8] - - -  
 [9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** This Council has voted  
 [10] once before to let somebody take a different  
 [11] position and keep their pay. And if you  
 [12] remember --  
 [13] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- Miss Connie  
 [15] Rocheline (ph) went from the City Hall to the  
 [16] library at a lesser pay but the Council voted to  
 [17] give her the option to get a different position  
 [18] and keep her same salary. So I just thought I'd  
 [19] give you that for your information.  
 [20] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Mayor, there  
 [21] are some things I think this Council probably  
 [22] needs to discuss.  
 [23] Could we move to go into executive  
 [24] session?  
 [25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You can certainly do

[1] that to deliberate.  
 [2] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I make a motion  
 [3] we go into executive session --  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Well, I just  
 [5] did.  
 [6] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Oh, second.  
 [7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** For personnel  
 [8] reasons --  
 [9] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** For personnel  
 [11] reasons.  
 [12] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- to deliberate upon  
 [13] the evidence you just heard.  
 [14] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll, please.  
 [16] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [17] Alexander?  
 [18] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
 [19] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
 [20] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
 [21] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
 [22] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
 [23] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [25] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You agree with that,  
 [2] sir?  
 [3] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Yes, sir. I agree  
 [4] with it. Thank you very much.  
 [5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Do I get a  
 [6] second?  
 [7] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Second.  
 [8] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [9] Alexander?  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
 [11] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
 [13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
 [14] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
 [15] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
 [16] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [17] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
 [18] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We didn't have  
 [19] discussion, and I just wanted to say because  
 [20] it's less than a year before retirement, you  
 [21] know, I'm happy to say yes.  
 [22] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [23] Spangler?  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
 [25] **CHIEF KING:** Thank you very much. I

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
 [2] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [3] Spangler?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
 [5] ---  
 [6] (Council went into Executive Session from  
 [7] 9:55 p.m. until 10:15 p.m.)  
 [8] ---  
 [9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We come out of  
 [10] executive session and we're going back into  
 [11] regular session. We did come to a conclusion,  
 [12] and I'm going to have Miss Donna make a motion.  
 [13] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I preface this  
 [14] by saying that we do not want to set a precedent  
 [15] for this.  
 [16] But in light of the evidence that was  
 [17] presented and there is a viable position  
 [18] available for you, this Council would like to  
 [19] authorize a lateral move as jail supervisor at  
 [20] the current rate of pay, and that would be  
 [21] contingent upon Lieutenant Hardy retiring on  
 [22] August 30th, 2009.  
 [23] **CHIEF KING:** Thank you very much.  
 [24] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Thank you.  
 [25] **CHIEF KING:** I really appreciate it.

[1] really appreciate that.  
 [2] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** More than you know.  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We got to take  
 [4] care of the people who take care of us.  
 [5] **LIEUTENANT HARDY:** Thank you, sir.  
 [6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** John, do you have  
 [7] anything else?  
 [8] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, sir. Unfortunately,  
 [9] I do.  
 [10] Sir, I really appreciate this. This  
 [11] has implications throughout my department and I  
 [12] think throughout the city, that the City will  
 [13] take an individual like Lieutenant Hardy and  
 [14] help him through this. This is pretty serious,  
 [15] I mean the situation. But he's a great  
 [16] employee, he's given a lot to the city, and we  
 [17] appreciate it.  
 [18] I guess the first couple of items --  
 [19] and I'll try to cover these very quickly.  
 [20] We've been checking, Mayor, and I think  
 [21] I took some input from members of the City  
 [22] Council has directed me to check, to have  
 [23] regular patrols at Star Towers both daytime and  
 [24] nighttime. We've been checking the location on  
 [25] a regular basis at least twice a day. We have

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[1] made one arrest in the daytime of somebody who  
 [2] was trespassing, but we've been checking that  
 [3] daily.  
 [4] I put in a policy our officers working  
 [5] off-duty jobs, if they decided they're going to  
 [6] use a police car to work an off-duty job, to  
 [7] provide the City a reimbursement for the fuel  
 [8] costs. In the last month, we've collected  
 [9] \$1844, basically calculating the fuel usage per  
 [10] hour of a car basically at their site where  
 [11] they're at. So we collected and we turned that  
 [12] in to the City.  
 [13] Since the price of fuel is obviously,  
 [14] you know, fluctuating, we're taking basically an  
 [15] average of the fuel cost for that month and then  
 [16] calculating. If the officer does not want to  
 [17] pay, though, then he doesn't have to use a  
 [18] patrol car; he uses his own personal car. And  
 [19] we felt that that was a reasonable  
 [20] accommodation.  
 [21] Several other departments -- Alpharetta  
 [22] is looking at this and Woodstock, and they're  
 [23] looking at this, and we instituted it. And so  
 [24] far, we've provided the city the first month's  
 [25] worth of collections.

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[1] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you very  
 [2] much.  
 [3] **CHIEF KING:** We got two -- a total of  
 [4] two reserve officers. Well, the first one is on  
 [5] duty now. He's basically a police officer that  
 [6] has been trained. He does not get paid. So he  
 [7] comes, does 20 hours of service for the city.  
 [8] And we've got a second one getting ready to  
 [9] graduate from the police academy. He's an EMT  
 [10] also.  
 [11] We use them for special events or when  
 [12] we have an event that's coming up. We call  
 [13] these guys in and they help us deal with, for  
 [14] example, Doraville Days, those kind of  
 [15] situations.  
 [16] But they have give a minimum of 20  
 [17] hours per month to maintain their reserve status  
 [18] with our department. So we got another one  
 [19] getting ready to graduate from the police  
 [20] academy.  
 [21] We're looking -- at the request of one  
 [22] of the members of the City Council and a check  
 [23] with the Mayor, we've increased our patrols on  
 [24] Woodwin off Tilly Mill. Basically, the current  
 [25] signage requires that there's a restriction of

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[1] trucks. And maybe this is something that --  
 [2] it's something that y'all could probably take a  
 [3] look at obviously based on the comments that you  
 [4] got at the last Council meeting.  
 [5] Currently, the trucks are not allowed  
 [6] to turn off of Tilly Mill onto Woodwin from 7:30  
 [7] to 9 o'clock and from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m. Perhaps  
 [8] this is an opportunity for y'all to re-look at  
 [9] that and maybe modify that, whether to not  
 [10] allow.  
 [11] And I do not know legally what  
 [12] restrictions, if you can make it more  
 [13] restrictive. I think you can make it more  
 [14] restrictive, but Mr. Weed will probably have to  
 [15] study that issue if you give him the direction  
 [16] to do that.  
 [17] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Because that  
 [18] intersection is in the county, do we have any  
 [19] control over that?  
 [20] **CHIEF KING:** The key is a lot of this  
 [21] is going to be solved when the si- --  
 [22] The current signage I believe was  
 [23] installed by us. I do not know if it was  
 [24] installed by the County. But the current  
 [25] signage is right at the intersection, and I

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[1] think the intersection --  
 [2] I don't know where the actual city-  
 [3] county line is, and I think --  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** But there is a  
 [5] sign also on Woodwin going around to the mosque  
 [6] area?  
 [7] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am.  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** So there is a  
 [9] sign in place.  
 [10] **CHIEF KING:** We could control it coming  
 [11] from the city out to the county. We could  
 [12] probably control it that way, but I do not know  
 [13] -- I have to see where our actual line is.  
 [14] Although if the annexation goes  
 [15] successfully tomorrow, this will be another  
 [16] opportunity here to make -- you know, because I  
 [17] heard Mr. Spangler gave -- you know, he talked  
 [18] to me and talked to the Mayor a little bit about  
 [19] some of the things that perhaps we can do there.  
 [20] And this is an opportunity that if we perhaps  
 [21] make it more restrictive to keep those trucks  
 [22] from using that intersection.  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, at this  
 [24] time, Chief, I'd like to ask Mr. Weed if he can  
 [25] -- in case the annexation does not go through,

[1] if he can have something by next Council meeting  
[2] that would restrict.

[3] **CHIEF KING:** The issue, sir, is if the  
[4] annexation does not get through, we could  
[5] potentially control the traffic coming from  
[6] Woodwin Road out into it. But if the intersec-  
[7] tion is not in the city, I don't think we could  
[8] control that, sir.

[9] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** But you just  
[10] said that you thought we put those signs up.

[11] **CHIEF KING:** But remember, sir, the  
[12] City has had a reputation of putting a lot of  
[13] signs that did not have an ordinance behind it.  
[14] And we've been trying to fix it. I mean all of  
[15] you-all have been working very hard to reduce  
[16] some of the signage that had no legal authority  
[17] behind it.

[18] I would recommend, sir, that before you  
[19] take that step, let's look and see where the  
[20] city limits is and if those signs cover the city  
[21] or cover the county.

[22] I know we can control one way. I don't  
[23] think -- I'm not sure about the other way, sir.

[24] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Well, perhaps  
[25] Mr. Weed can find out.

[1] They had four robberies last night in the  
[2] McElroy area outside the city limits. We're  
[3] trying to help them, but we got to take care of  
[4] our own, so we're --

[5] And the same descriptions: two to four  
[6] black males, one of them actually posing as a  
[7] police officer assaulting and robbing folks in  
[8] the Jasmine Apartments. It is just -- it's an  
[9] area that is going to take a lot of work.

[10] And then tonight, at Colony Square  
[11] Apartments in the city, we had what appears to  
[12] be a home invasion. Two black males went into  
[13] an apartment and apparently were in the process  
[14] of robbing the Hispanic family in there. Two  
[15] black males ended up shooting the man of the  
[16] family and killed him. He died tonight.

[17] This is very worrisome. We got our  
[18] hands full. That's why I asked the officer that  
[19] was working here to go out to the scene to help  
[20] and I had Captain Atkinson to help with the  
[21] crime scene.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Was that on  
[23] Aztec or --

[24] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am, off of Aztec  
[25] Road.

[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** We'll figure it out.

[2] **CHIEF KING:** Fair enough, sir.  
[3] Shallowford Road. You're familiar with  
[4] these rental houses that we have on Shallowford  
[5] Road, and they've been causing a lot of  
[6] problems. We had an incident at 3415 where two  
[7] individuals got into an altercation. Alcohol  
[8] was involved, and one individual assaulted the  
[9] other one with a bottle initially and then  
[10] pulled out a knife.

[11] Second individual. The initial victim  
[12] pulled out his own knife, they got into a fight,  
[13] and the initial attacker was stabbed and died  
[14] later on at Grady.

[15] The initial victim. I know this sounds  
[16] a little kind of twisted, but he's at Grady  
[17] recovering from his injuries and it looks like  
[18] he's going to make it but the initial attacker  
[19] died as a result of the wounds that he suffered.

[20] It is basically a rental house on  
[21] Shallowford Road, 3415.

[22] We still have an issue. You know,  
[23] we're trying to work with Dekalb trying to get  
[24] them to increase their level of patrols on the  
[25] McElroy Road area. We got a challenge there.

[1] Unfortunately, half of that complex is  
[2] in the city, half of it is in the county. And  
[3] it's things like that that just causes all kinds  
[4] of headaches jurisdictionally because the first  
[5] thing you have to determine is is this in the  
[6] city or is this in the county and keep my  
[7] fingers crossed.

[8] Either way, I mean these four armed  
[9] robberies last night have an impact on our  
[10] community because it is our residents, our  
[11] citizens were traveling through that area to get  
[12] to parts of Doraville. And we're not getting a  
[13] lot of -- a lot of help. And I know Dekalb  
[14] County is up to -- they're busy, but we're not  
[15] getting a lot of assistance there. And we take  
[16] this personally because one of our employees,  
[17] you know, husband was shot, and there's still no  
[18] leads on that case. Pretty disappointing.

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Now, on that  
[20] Colonial Square --

[21] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am.

[22] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** -- have we  
[23] apprehended?

[24] **CHIEF KING:** No, ma'am. We're working  
[25] the crime scene. We are on the lookout for two

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[1] black males. I've cancelled all the people  
 [2] working extra jobs and I've got one person --  
 [3] well, a couple people coming in to help.  
 [4] I have my canines. Apparently they had  
 [5] a lookout of somebody going into the wooded  
 [6] area. So we're trying to search that area,  
 [7] trying to see if we can apprehend them.  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Do you think  
 [9] it's the same as Jasmine?  
 [10] **CHIEF KING:** Ma'am, I don't know. The  
 [11] similarities are very similar, but it's  
 [12] something that, you know, we're working. It's  
 [13] very premature. I don't even know. As soon as  
 [14] I'm done here, I'm going to leave and --  
 [15] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Are we talking  
 [16] about Jasmine on Winters Chapel? Because  
 [17] there's several of them.  
 [18] Last night; right?  
 [19] **CHIEF KING:** No. This is the one  
 [20] that's on McElroy.  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** But I mean last  
 [22] night, wasn't there one -- one in Jasmine just  
 [23] recently, the one at Winters Chapel? Was there  
 [24] a Jasmine --  
 [25] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am, there was one

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[1] there, but the three other incidents were in the  
 [2] McElroy Road area.  
 [3] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Okay.  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** On this, because  
 [5] it's so close to the city or even within the  
 [6] city, is there a description that we can put out  
 [7] on the --  
 [8] **CHIEF KING:** Sir, right now, it's very  
 [9] -- I got detectives interviewing the victims. I  
 [10] don't have a good lookout yet.  
 [11] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Is it beneficial  
 [12] to put that out on the neighborhood list or is  
 [13] that not beneficial?  
 [14] **CHIEF KING:** I will tell you that right  
 [15] now, Dekalb has only provided us -- you know.  
 [16] And we try not to flood the  
 [17] neighborhood web sites with, I mean, "two black  
 [18] males." I don't think that's productive,  
 [19] because then what we will have is every time  
 [20] somebody sees a black male walking down the  
 [21] street, they're going to be calling the police  
 [22] to say, "Hey, this is the guy."  
 [23] If we have something particularly that  
 [24] helps narrow down that, yeah, we will share. I  
 [25] mean I will get my direction from the Mayor as

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[1] far as how me wants me, you know, to push that  
 [2] information.  
 [3] My recommendation is only do that if  
 [4] there's actually something that people can call  
 [5] us.  
 [6] But right now, I've got the majority, a  
 [7] good portion of my manpower basically working  
 [8] the crime scene right now and interviewing  
 [9] victims and witnesses.  
 [10] I'm very sad to bring you this kind of  
 [11] news, but we are in a tough period right now  
 [12] especially with this economy, and Dekalb County  
 [13] is very limited on the resources that they can  
 [14] apply to the areas of the county. Everybody's  
 [15] got some very focused priorities.  
 [16] But we're going to concentrate on  
 [17] answering those 911 calls, trying to do -- when  
 [18] we're not answering calls, we're going to be  
 [19] doing as much proactive patrolling as we can,  
 [20] continuing the search, for example, of Star  
 [21] Towers and make sure that that doesn't become a  
 [22] haven for derelicts or homeless folks.  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Are we going to  
 [24] be taking any extra particulars on Wednesday  
 [25] after the election? Because I know there was

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[1] alerts went out from Homeland Security about  
 [2] things that's a potential after the election.  
 [3] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, ma'am. We are  
 [4] working contingency plans.  
 [5] I honestly don't think that Doraville  
 [6] is going to have an issue. We're Doraville.  
 [7] We're a suburb.  
 [8] I mean, you know, the metropolitan --  
 [9] you know, downtown Atlanta might have some  
 [10] issues but, you know, Doraville, we're pretty  
 [11] calm. I mean I don't think people are going to  
 [12] riot because one candidate wins and another one  
 [13] loses. I just don't see that as a likely  
 [14] scenario.  
 [15] I'm more worried right now about  
 [16] catching these armed robbers and these  
 [17] murderers.  
 [18] Mayor and Council, that concludes my  
 [19] report unless you-all have any questions or  
 [20] comments about my report. Thank you very much.  
 [21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Thank you.  
 [22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thanks, John.  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Thank you.  
 [24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You got anything,  
 [25] Murray?

[1] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Very quickly,  
[2] Mr. Mayor, I'd like to apologize to Councilman  
[3] Spangler and the Council if I seemed a little  
[4] tense in answering the Councilman's questions.  
[5] He's got every right to ask me questions, and I  
[6] will endeavor to answer them.

[7] We're all working very, very hard. I  
[8] know the Chief is proud of what he does and  
[9] Priscilla is proud of what she does. Your staff  
[10] loves this city. I'm proud to be here. And so  
[11] we're working very hard to do it, and we'll just  
[12] keep working harder.

[13] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** I have a  
[14] question, Mr. Weed.

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, ma'am.

[16] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Sandy Springs/  
[17] Johns Creek, we offered them -- have we already  
[18] got that out to them and have we got a reply  
[19] yet?

[20] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No, ma'am.

[21] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We were going to  
[22] find out how much it was going to cost for the  
[23] additional coverage first so we could set a  
[24] rate.

[25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Right. I've been

[1] resolve some issues that we got the moving  
[2] tractors everywhere.

[3] And also to Priscilla that helped a lot  
[4] with the coffee and everything during the car  
[5] show. We had donations coming in, and she  
[6] worked overtime trying to help us with that.

[7] And Bob Spangler and his wife helped a  
[8] lot with the show.

[9] It was very successful. I think the  
[10] car show worked well with the rest of the city  
[11] events and the road race. And I'd like to on  
[12] behalf of the Kiwanis Club thank the Mayor and  
[13] Council and the city for allowing us to help  
[14] out.

[15] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you very  
[16] much.

[17] - - -  
[18] (Applause)  
[19] - - -

[20] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** For the record, I  
[21] was home in bed that day so don't thank me.

[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you, Tom.  
[23] Next? Bonita?

[24] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** No. I was just going  
[25] to say thank you, but Tom did.

[1] looking into that and haven't been able to --

[2] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Okay.

[3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- get a straight  
[4] answer yet. I'll keep working on it.

[5] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** I understand.

[6] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** And I do  
[7] remember that because I thought we were going to  
[8] offer them 60 to 80.

[9] **ATTORNEY WEED:** We're going to get  
[10] there, I think.

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** We need to make  
[12] sure we make money at it.

[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Citizens comments.

[14] **MR. HART:** Stephe's not here, but as  
[15] the acting president-elect of the Kiwanis Club,  
[16] we were going to thank the Mayor and the Council  
[17] for Doraville Days, particularly Pam.

[18] You were a Godsend, I mean, you know --

[19] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Well, it was  
[20] all of us.

[21] **MR. HART:** -- and working with Brian.

[22] And particularly the Mayor. The Mayor  
[23] and I worked as chairmen of the car show. We  
[24] had to work through a lot of details, and the  
[25] Mayor worked closely with us in trying to

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Mr. Noonan.  
[2] **MR. NOONAN:** John Noonan, 4316 Winters  
[3] Chapel Road.

[4] Is the city still over budget?  
[5] Can anybody answer that?

[6] - - -  
[7] (No response)  
[8] - - -

[9] **MR. NOONAN:** So I guess we don't know.  
[10] Seeing as we've had all these problems  
[11] about being over budget, why in the world would  
[12] we want to spend \$150,000 on sidewalks that are  
[13] actually in a county right-of-way?

[14] This doesn't make any sense at all.  
[15] It's fiscally irresponsible. You want sidewalks  
[16] in a county right-of-way, go to the County.

[17] Since we're on the topic of fiscal  
[18] responsibility, we just approved an MIS  
[19] contract. What's the total cost of that  
[20] contract?

[21] - - -  
[22] (No response)  
[23] - - -

[24] **MR. NOONAN:** We approve --  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We don't know.

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[1] **MR. NOONAN:** -- a contract and we don't  
[2] know how much it costs?  
[3] I think the guidelines are if it's over  
[4] \$5,000, it needs to go out for bids; correct?  
[5] Anybody?  
[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes. You're right.  
[7] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** I think there  
[8] was some gray area, though.  
[9] Go ahead.  
[10] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Two things. What the  
[11] ordinance says is that it's a twofold rule.  
[12] One, anything over \$5,000 should go out for bid.  
[13] There are four exceptions to that. One of them  
[14] is the Council determines it's a sole-source  
[15] agreement. My understanding is that was the  
[16] Council's intention to treat MIS in that  
[17] category, and they've acted accordingly.  
[18] With regard to how much the contract is  
[19] for, it is an hourly-rate contract so there's  
[20] not a total. You could probably kind of get a  
[21] good idea about how much it's going to be based  
[22] upon what they paid last year, which I was  
[23] something in the \$80,000 range, but I'm not the  
[24] budget person.  
[25] **MR. NOONAN:** Is this a not-to-exceed

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[1] contract?  
[2] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No, it is not a not-to-  
[3] exceed contract. Had it been -- having a  
[4] contract that went beyond the scope of a single  
[5] calendar year, let's say it was a two-year  
[6] contract or a five-year contract, then state law  
[7] would have mandated that the total amount of the  
[8] contract in the calendar year of adoption and in  
[9] every calendar year renewal would have had to  
[10] have been listed. So that would have been an  
[11] amount not to exceed.  
[12] But right now, it's a flat hourly-rate  
[13] contract, which means however many hours the  
[14] person works.  
[15] **MR. NOONAN:** So I guess we can assume  
[16] that MIS is going to work the full year for  
[17] under \$5,000?  
[18] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I wouldn't know that,  
[19] sir.  
[20] **MR. NOONAN:** I've made my point.  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you, John.  
[22] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** On the sidewalk  
[23] thing, I've made the motion, the Council passed  
[24] the motion unanimously to spend up to \$150,000.  
[25] Later, when we realized we were having budget

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[1] issues, I took that off the table as part of an  
[2] overall spending package that would save a lot  
[3] of money but that overall spending plan didn't  
[4] go anywhere.  
[5] But basically right now, we still have  
[6] \$150,000 allocated for the Central Avenue  
[7] sidewalk --  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I don't know --  
[9] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** -- until such  
[10] time --  
[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- that we're going to  
[12] spend that much on Central Avenue.  
[13] Anybody else?  
[14] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** Charles Livingston.  
[15] Several Council meetings ago, we had a  
[16] discussion about judges and solicitors and so  
[17] forth throwing out ordinances and fines.  
[18] I can't remember, John, if you had any  
[19] that were in your traffic fines that got thrown  
[20] out? I think it was just ordinances.  
[21] But we had this discussion, and, as I  
[22] recall, the conclusion of that discussion was  
[23] that the Mayor and Murray Weed would meet with  
[24] said judges and solicitors and talk to them a  
[25] little bit about the fact that they're working

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[1] for us and see if we can get this worked out a  
[2] little bit, and I haven't heard anything about  
[3] it. Have you-all met?  
[4] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I had an individual  
[5] meeting with the judges with regard to the fine-  
[6] and-forfeiture schedule last week, but I didn't  
[7] feel comfortable talking about --  
[8] I have to make appearances before these  
[9] judges, as a lawyer and, therefore, I have to  
[10] tread lightly. So when the Mayor and I have an  
[11] opportunity to have that conversation when the  
[12] weight of the Mayor is there, that would be a  
[13] more appropriate way of doing that.  
[14] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** So you do plan to do  
[15] that in the near future?  
[16] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Yes, sir. Absolutely.  
[17] But I'm not going to do that alone, though.  
[18] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** Well, I would like to  
[19] make sure that you don't do it alone. I would  
[20] like to go myself as an observer.  
[21] Is there any reason I cannot do that?  
[22] **ATTORNEY WEED:** That's up to the  
[23] Council, but I wouldn't advise that, sir.  
[24] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** Well --  
[25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** You can trust us or

[1] you --

[2] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** No, I don't think so.

[3] I don't think either one of you are tough

[4] enough. These people work for us.

[5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, sir, you've got a

[6] legal right to go talk to them yourself. The

[7] Council can't prevent you from doing that.

[8] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** I'd really like to go

[9] when you guys go so I can see what you do and

[10] what you say --

[11] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, I --

[12] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** -- because I don't

[13] think either one of you are tough enough with

[14] these guys. I really don't.

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Well, sir, you've got a

[16] right to go talk to the judges at any court, and

[17] I would advise you to do that.

[18] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** I'd like to see you

[19] guys get tough with them. You know, I think

[20] you-all -- they've got you buffaloes. They're

[21] not doing what we need.

[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I think they're doing a

[23] good job.

[24] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** How can you say that

[25] when they're throwing out our ordinances?

[1] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** Okay. Well, they work

[2] -- that's fine. They work for us. And I don't

[3] think that you need to, you know, be soft-

[4] footing it around these people. You know, we

[5] need to lay down the law.

[6] And I would very much like to go with

[7] you guys, but if I can't, I'll go up by myself,

[8] but I sure would like to do it.

[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

[10] **ATTORNEY WEED:** If this is helpful --

[11] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Thank you.

[12] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- I've got a trial

[13] tomorrow at 1:30 in Judge Duncan's courtroom,

[14] and we'll see how tough they are. You're

[15] welcome to attend.

[16] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** I got to go out of

[17] town tomorrow as soon as I vote. I'm sorry.

[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Come on up, Ben.

[19] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** If you have another

[20] one, I'd like to do it.

[21] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I'll be there. You're

[22] very welcome, and we intend to seek the full

[23] force of the law and we'll see how tough I can

[24] be.

[25] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** All right.

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I've been up. I've

[2] listened to them. I think they do a good job.

[3] Why don't you go up and listen at them

[4] a little bit?

[5] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** By the time -- by the

[6] time John's guys, John's gals go out and they've

[7] stopped four or five times and given warnings

[8] and done all the proper things, these people

[9] need to be fined. And then they get up there

[10] and they throw them out. How can --

[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Not all of them.

[12] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** -- they be doing a

[13] good job?

[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Not all of them.

[15] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** I know not all of them

[16] but --

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** They don't throw them

[18] all out, no, sir.

[19] **MR. LIVINGSTON:** I think it's -- from

[20] the information I get, it's close to half of

[21] them.

[22] You indicated no, you got to tread

[23] lightly with them. They work for us.

[24] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Sir, they work for you.

[25] They don't work for me.

[1] **MR. CRAWFORD:** I'll take a chance that

[2] I break the microphone. Ben Crawford, 3959 Red

[3] Oak Drive.

[4] And first thing I'd like to do is

[5] invite everybody Thursday night at 7 o'clock for

[6] the Planning Commission meeting, and it's going

[7] to be this Thursday.

[8] And then Scott's not here tonight, so I

[9] guess I'll ask City Council this question -- the

[10] planning guy went home -- then also Mr. Weed.

[11] There was some discussion about looking

[12] at C2, C1 and C2 along with M1 and M2, and where

[13] are we on all those four ordinances at this

[14] point?

[15] **ATTORNEY WEED:** M1 and M2 was duly

[16] advertised and adopted.

[17] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Right, okay.

[18] **ATTORNEY WEED:** And C1 and C2, we have

[19] completed our second draft of that.

[20] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Okay. All right.

[21] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Scott asked me about it

[22] tonight and he wanted to add two more

[23] definitions to that section --

[24] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Okay.

[25] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- which I haven't seen

[1] yet. So he and I will be in communication  
 [2] tomorrow, and hopefully we'll be able to turn  
 [3] that out by tomorrow afternoon.  
 [4] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Is that to go along with  
 [5] the draft definitions, too, that were in our box  
 [6] over there?  
 [7] **ATTORNEY WEED:** All the definitions are  
 [8] in M1 and M2.  
 [9] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Those ones that were in  
 [10] the Planning Commission's box, were those the  
 [11] total definitions for the -- for an ordinance or  
 [12] were they for just specific sections? I didn't  
 [13] get a chance to look at it yet.  
 [14] **ATTORNEY WEED:** I'm not sure what you  
 [15] got, so I don't know.  
 [16] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Okay. Well, that's --  
 [17] **ATTORNEY WEED:** It might have been  
 [18] something that Scott --  
 [19] **MR. CRAWFORD:** And then --  
 [20] **ATTORNEY WEED:** -- generated, so I --  
 [21] **MR. CRAWFORD:** -- I wanted to bring up  
 [22] one other thing, and I know that we've already  
 [23] gone through this whole M1 and M2 thing.  
 [24] But the other question is, there's no  
 [25] -- and this is, I guess, directed to you,

[1] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Motion to  
 [2] adjourn.  
 [3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
 [4] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Second.  
 [5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Call the roll.  
 [6] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [7] Alexander?  
 [8] **COUNCILMEMBER ALEXANDER:** Yes.  
 [9] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Bates?  
 [10] **COUNCILMEMBER BATES:** Yes.  
 [11] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Fleming?  
 [12] **COUNCILMEMBER FLEMING:** Yes.  
 [13] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Pittman?  
 [14] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Yes.  
 [15] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember Roche?  
 [16] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Yes.  
 [17] **CLERK BLACKMON:** Councilmember  
 [18] Spangler?  
 [19] **COUNCILMEMBER SPANGLER:** Yes.  
 [20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
 [21] ---  
 [22] (Meeting concluded at 10:45 p.m. the same day.)  
 [23] -o0o-  
 [24]  
 [25]

[1] Mr. Weed. There's no reason why a city has to  
 [2] have M1 zoning in it, correct?  
 [3] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No.  
 [4] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Or any kind of zoning?  
 [5] **ATTORNEY WEED:** No.  
 [6] **MR. CRAWFORD:** The city can decide what  
 [7] kind of zoning they want anywhere within their  
 [8] city.  
 [9] **ATTORNEY WEED:** Correct.  
 [10] **MR. CRAWFORD:** So if we have a small  
 [11] city and we decide we don't want to have heavy  
 [12] industrial M2 zoning in it or even, for that  
 [13] matter, M1, then we can decide as a city not to

 [16] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Except for the existing  
 [17] that's there. We can say that stays there until  
 [18] a change of use or something like that. Would  
 [19] that be correct?

 [21] yes, sir.  
 [22] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Okay. That was it.  
 [23] **COUNCILMEMBER ROCHE:** Thank you.  
 [24] **COUNCILMEMBER PITTMAN:** Thank you.  
 [25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you, sir.
